

In July this year two Year 12 students, Adam McLoughlin from New Plymouth Boys High School and Rachael Neville-Lamb from New Plymouth Girls High School will be representing their schools, the province and New Zealand when they attend NASA's United Space School (USS) in Houston Texas.

Forty students worldwide are chosen to attend the school each year.

Held on the campus of the University of Houston Clear Lake Extension, the Space School is situated adjacent to the NASA Johnson Space Centre and is a NASA sponsored programme.

The experience in Texas is one that will see Adam and Rachael introduced to all the various facets of human space flight. This is very much a hands on type of programme and is delivered by NASA astronauts, scientists and engineers as well as some international cosmonauts based at Houston.

Both students agreed this is a once in a lifetime opportunity and are thrilled to have been selected by their schools. The application process required them to outline the kind of things they had done for their school and what they are studying. They also had to explain how visiting USS would benefit themselves and their community. To this end, one initiative they would like to do once they return home would be to visit local Primary and Intermediate schools and share their Space School experience.

Before arriving at Space School there are assignments and required reading to be done. Once there the students are interviewed and divided into one of four teams. Within these teams they then have the task of planning a mission to Mars. This could involve a range of things such as, getting to Mars and back. They must complete assignments and presentations which are graded and at the end of the course there is a graduation ceremony. The students get the opportunity to tour the nearby Johnson Space Centre where they will see and visit things like the three mission controls and the neutral buoyancy lab.

Although there is plenty of time devoted to study there are social occasions planned too. On the first Sunday in Houston a 'Cultural Fair' is held and Adam and Rachael will be expected to make a dish native to their country as well as perform a cultural type item.

They are billeted in Houston by people that work for NASA so they will certainly be immersed in everything 'space' while there.

I asked them both what is it that they most are looking forward to at USS. Rachael, who says she has been interested in space all her life, said "I'm looking forward to meeting all the people and because I like the topic, just all things we will get to see and do."

Adam agreed and said, "I'm looking forward to the whole experience. It is also an opportunity to make connections with people. The staff and other people we meet could in the future, be valuable contacts; you don't know where this experience could lead."

In the short term the next few months leading up to their space school experience are going to be very busy for the pair with the usual Year 12 workload and the preparation for their trip.

As well as this Adam is still busy fundraising. He has some ventures already in place but he is also hoping to secure some funding from local businesses. Rachael meanwhile when she is not at school is busy training several times a week for the Oceania Asia Pacific Inline Hockey Championship to be held in New Plymouth in April. Here she will be competing with

the NZ Junior Women Inline Hockey team against Australia. Finally I asked them both what their future plans entailed. Adam says he plans to join the British Navy and do engineering whilst Rachael is looking towards a Medical Science career. The opportunity of visiting the NASA United Space School will I'm sure inspire them to both achieve much when they enter into their chosen career pathways.

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Real Tart Pottery Challenge

Every year during the month of February, Real Tart hosts a pottery challenge exhibition to encourage Taranaki potters to extend their skills beyond their regular work. The winner is chosen by a public vote over the duration of the exhibition and receives a solo exhibition hosted by the gallery. This year's challenge entitled 'Flora & Fauna,' was won by Cecily Bull's arum lilies.

On Saturday 6th March, a few enthusiastic pyromaniacs under the guidance of Bev Rea and Christina Rutherford conducted a pit firing at the club rooms. Pit firing is a primitive firing method using saw dust and wood and results in earthy colours and interesting, though unpredictable, patterns. Sometime during the afternoon of the firing, even though the fire was kept well under control, some neighbours were sufficiently concerned about the smoke to advise the fire-brigade, who sent two kind gentlemen in a 'big red truck' to investigate. After confirming that all was under control, they were

given a complimentary tour of the Vicarage for their troubles! The club continues to be active with monthly activities to inspire members. The evening activity for April will see members learn more about making porcelain pinch pots. Porcelain is a particularly fine clay body, often used for delicate pieces, firing at around 1300°C. The next public class, teaching either hand-building or wheel work, will run on Tuesday evenings from 7 - 9 pm, from 22nd April to 27th June inclusive. Classes are held at the club rooms behind the Vicarage, 288 Courtenay St. In addition, the club will be hosting a public raku workshop on Saturday 22nd May to teach the art of traditional Japanese raku firing. Information on either of these may be obtained from WITT under the community education section. Members will hold their annual Mothers Day Market Day from 10am on Saturday 1st and Sunday 2nd May at the Vicarage. The annual AGM will be held on Thursday 27th May at 7pm. 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New Artworks around the Local Area


Several new and quite different artworks have appeared in our local area over recent times.

On a wall of the Fitzroy Surf Life Saving Club's lower changing room, artist Lynda Newman has painted a mural with a definite local flavour. The mural depicts the view of the sugar loaf islands from Fitzroy beach. Mainly painted in blues and greens the mural fits in well with its surroundings

Taranaki Anniversary day saw artists at work transforming a well known local wall. This time graffiti artists painted their colourful and powerful images along the wall outside of what was the local RSA. The wall has in the past been the canvas for various art works prior to the graffiti art. Michael Smithers' stunning dolphin wall that was controversially painted over and more recently the mural with a military theme met the same fate.

The event on Anniversary day is actually the inaugural event for what is hoped to be an annual contest. Quite a few graffiti artists took the opportunity to display their talent on a piece of the wall. They had to incorporate the words Te Ara into their artwork. The prize of \$500 and art space was donated by the building's owners, the Crow brothers.

The public were the judges and could vote by text for their favourite artwork with the artist receiving the most votes named the winner. Artist Blair Mare took out that honour and won the cash.

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TOM Garden of the Month

A picket fence painted a distinctive red drew me to this month's TOM garden and then when I peeked over the fence to look at the garden I was hooked.

This month's feature garden, the owner tells me, is at its best around November-December but here at the end of March it was still gorgeous. There are flowers and herbs everywhere as well as lots of garden art and points of interest at every turn.

Sue and her husband Charlie have lived at this address for over 35 years. As her children got older and she had more time her



interest in gardening just took off and the garden has slowly evolved to the work of art it is today. There was no plan. "I just kept digging," says Sue.

Only a couple of the original plantings remain at the property: a magnolia tree at the front and the jasmine covering the front wall.

Many years ago when the family was clearing bamboo from the back of the section Jodi, one of Sue's sons who was about 14 at the time made an interesting discovery. He came to his father and mother with a live grenade he'd found in the bamboo. The family carefully put the grenade in the vegetable garden and rang the police who sent the bomb squad around. The grenade was then apparently taken to Waiwhakaiho beach and exploded making front page news at the time. It was thought the grenade was left there by previous owners whose sons had returned from the war.

What was once lawn out the front of the house is now gardens filled with small trees, shrubs, herbs and flowers. Brick paths wind through this garden and lead to a shady spot along the front fence line where a seat rests on a chamomile lawn.

Around the back of the house there are again the lovely curving lines of flower beds crush planted and literally spilling over with colour and variety. Hollyhocks are everywhere; these all started from a single seed head of one colour and now Sue has them everywhere in all colours. Many of the plants growing in the garden are from gifted cuttings or seeds. Having worked for many years in garden centres Sue says she knows what to plant and where. She puts the skill of how to make cuttings that she learnt while working at Duncan and Davies to good use in her own garden.

Many of the plants she has are an 'old' variety. One such plant is a favourite of Sue's: 'Mignonette,' a creamy flowering spiral spike with a lovely fragrance. Another favourite is 'Love Lies Bleeding.' Sue has several colours and varieties of this beautiful plant and one particularly eye catching one is a lovely green. She also has an upright variety growing.

You won't find many oranges and yellows in this garden other

than some marigolds in the vegetable patch and a few daffodils. The palette here is all whites, pinks, purples and blues.

I asked Sue how much time she spends in her garden and she said she likes to spend at least a day or two a week out with her plants. There are all the incidental times too; a trip to the mailbox can often end in a 20 minute tidy up session. Sue says this isn't a chore though because she is happiest when outside. In fact she insists her garden isn't a lot of work which is surprising because there is a lot of it. She says years of relentless weeding have paid off as no weeds have turned to seed in the garden and these days' weeding is minimal. She says she is more occupied thinning out the abundant growth because the plants are self seeding and spreading. She was also converted to the 'Ruth Stout' type of gardening after she happened upon a book by the American gardener who puts all her plants cuttings, trimmings, and garden waste chopped up and straight back onto the garden floor creating rich mulch that inhibits weeds. Sue says it took a bit of getting used to as it looks a little messy at first but the crowded informality of her garden lends itself well to this and it's been a real success and creates a rich fertile soil. Sue keeps her garden organic and with the Stout method there's certainly no need for chemical sprays.

Like flowers, herbs are a firm favourite with this gardener and they are scattered throughout the property. Sue puts many of the herbs to practical use such as the Saponaria or Soap Wort which Sue makes all her shampoo from.



Some interesting carvings and sculptures also have special places in the garden. There's a gorgeous owl that a friend carved from a Totara log and another gift was a statue of St Fiacre who is apparently the patron saint of gardeners. Sue has cleverly placed her garden art so they make points of interest around the property. On a wall at the front of the property is a wreath of twisted tree roots that the family found down the beach. It looks like it has been specially crafted for the wall it hangs on.

If she ever tires of her own 'patch' Sue is often to be found helping son Jodi at his Omata property. Jodi has inherited the green fingers and love of plants from his mother and is developing a seed bank of heirloom seeds.

As we finished chatting Sue tells me that her lovely garden is a work in progress and that "A true garden always has a bit you haven't got to yet. If someone says they've finished don't believe them!"

Steve uses a variety of local, decorative timbers such as NZ kauri, rimu, oak with different finishes. When asked what timber he likes best, this passionate craftsman shares that "each timber has its own elements, unique qualities." He enjoys working with each individual block to create living pieces of art in our homes.

"I enjoy the challenge of reproducing old styles like a recent commission of a Bishop's chair for St Mary's Church, retro and post modern pieces of my original designs. "Travelling overseas has inspired me a lot." "Especially living in the 'designers' paradise city' of Barcelona and crafting custom furniture for the rich and famous in London workshops." he shares. 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
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Junior and Senior Club Champions at our end of season prizegiving held at Stumble Inn & Café.

Namdokmai Northcott proved to be the Top U14 Girl in Taranaki. Liam Cole took out the equivalent Top U14 Boys Trophy. Their performances represent an outstanding effort as they require consistent winning performances across both land and surf disciplines at each of the Carnivals. Not only were they rewarded with the above mentioned trophies, both were chosen to represent Taranaki in their age group. Without a doubt these two kids are role models with many of the younger athletes aspiring to reach the levels they have in the coming years.

Also worthy of mention: 12 kids represented East End at the U14 Ocean Athletes championship at Mt Maunganui in late February. Despite a tsunami warning cancelling the last day, they made nine individual finals and one team final. Best results were: 4th in the U12 Mixed Beach Relay, and 5th place by Jessica Tarrant in the U11 Girls Beach Flags final. A great effort by the entire team.

Winter training will commence soon at the Bell Block pool. This gives the kids a chance to retain their fitness and have some fun in the water over the cooler months. Fitzroy Surf Club at the National Surf Lifesaving Champs

A small but determined team headed to Ohope Beach for the 2010 National Surf Lifesaving championships recently. Fitzroy finished up with one gold medal, two silvers and three bronze to round out the three days of competition.

The U19 Women's canoe crew of Marissa Clough, Evie Trolove, Jess Lampe and Madeline Wells fought hard through three rounds each of the long course and short course canoe events at the championships to make it through to both finals. The races were long and the surf non-existent as they came through for a bronze in the long course event and silver in the short course.

It was a good weekend on the sprint track for the Fitzroy sprint team. Paul Cracroft-Wilson started off the medal tally with a bronze in the Open Men's beach sprint with Steve Harris coming through for 5th in the final.

The sprint relays were looking good with both the Open Men's and U19 Men's advancing through to the next rounds. Unfortunately the U19 team of Isaac Robinson, Steven Haami, Jordan McCormack and Scott Murfitt had to pull out due to injury, but the Open Men's team of Harris, Cracroft-Wilson, Robinson and Haami held out for a bronze in the Open Men's final.

The biggest upset of the weekend came from two Fitzroy competitors during the Open Men's Beach Flags event. Event favourite Cracroft-Wilson and Harris made it through to the final two athletes, but a slight stumble from Cracroft-Wilson stunned the crowd and saw Harris come through to take the gold medal and national title in only his second year of competition, with Cracroft-Wilson having to settle for silver. At the conclusion of the event, Cracroft-Wilson was named in the New Zealand team to compete at the World Championships in Turkey later this year.

Fitzroy Surf Club at the New Zealand IRB Champs

East End and Fitzroy Surf Lifesaving Clubs finished one and two at the recent Surf Lifesaving IRB national champs at Waipuu Cove.

East End took out the overall club honours for a second year in a row with Fitzroy placing second overall, 14 points behind. Fitzroy Surf Club finished with a tally of six gold and two silver medals at the event.

Fitzroy's premier crew of Chris Scott, Jaron Mumby and patient Nicky Askew took out the premier assembly and single rescue titles, adding these golds to the Teams Race gold won with team mates Jeremy Burton and Kent Fraser. Burton and Fraser also won a silver medal in the Mass Rescue event. Scott and Mumby are looking at retiring from racing after 14 years as one of New Zealand's top premier crews, amounting 30 New Zealand titles and competing for the New Zealand team in 2003.

Fitzroy's female crew of Katie Watts and Emma Crofskey cleaned up in the women's division winning the top female crew title for a 6th year in a row with their haul of three gold medals and a silver. Watts and Crofskey started the first day with silver in the Tube Rescue event, just behind their rival crew of St Clair from Dunedin. The roles were reversed for the Mass Rescue, Assembly Rescue and the coveted Single Rescue events with the Fitzroy girls edging out St Clair in each of these events to reclaim the overall female crew title.

Fitzroy have not finished out of the top two clubs at the National IRB champs for six years and hope to continue this run, thanks to the support from the Pelorus Trust and Sporty's Café and Bar.

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New Plymouth Surf Rider's Club

A busy month for the Club which saw us retain our Surfing Taranaki Inter-Club title. Held at Back Beach on a beautifully fine day with light winds and good three foot surf, the competition drew team entries from NPSRC, Waitara Board Riders, Christian Surfers, Oakura and Opunake Board Riders. The event consists of teams of eight with each member competing in individual heats gaining points for their final position and then an eighty-minute Team Tag session. Each competitor can catch as many waves as they like but must indicate to the Judges which two they wish to be scored on by raising both arms above their heads at the end of the ride. They then paddle into shore and tag the next member of the team. Final results:

- 1st New Plymouth Surf Riders Club (59 Points)
- 2nd Waitara Bar Boardriders Club (47 Points)
- 3rd Christian Surfers Club (42 Points)



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Sustainability at Fitzroy Kindergarten

As global warming and environmental issues are becoming more and more of a problem for us all, we think it is important that our children have an awareness of this and learn more about how to look after their environment. We have put it into our 2010 Strategic Plan where "Teachers, children and whanau develop an understanding around sustainability, applying their new knowledge to their surrounding environments."

We initially wanted to start recycling, and purchased a bokashi bucket, so we could compost any food scraps the children had. Children are encouraged to help dig the compost into our Kindergarten garden, and use the juice for watering, all the while experiencing the growth cycle as plants evolve from flower to fruit or vegetables which then can be picked and eaten. We have feijoas, strawberries, tomatoes, mandarins, apples and cape gooseberries growing at present.

We also have invested in a blue recycle bin, and our children are being encouraged to sort paper, cardboard, plastics and glass. It has been so amazing to see how much our general rubbish has decreased by doing this. Children are often heard saying "Can we recycle this?"

The Kindergarten has also purchased some fantastic books on sustainability, and the children are learning more about recycling and understanding it from a global perspective. Some of the books are about saving animals from extinction, and offer suggestions as to what could be done to help with this. We encourage children to look after their very own creatures, as they experience metamorphosis through the monarch butterfly and frog cycle.

Furthermore, we are seeing our own families embracing it in their own ways. One of our parents came in and made recycled paper with our children. Others are helping with the gardening and outdoor environment. Children have been cooking with our produce from the garden. Fantastic! It is so important to all learn together.
