hot tips from the Fire Brigade

With the warmer weather upon us the electric blankets are put away and the BBQ is brought out. BBQs are a great way for the whole family to get together at mealtimes but it pays to follow a few simple tips.

- 1 Check for gas leaks around the cylinder valve and fuel line by spraying with a soapy water solution from a trigger spray bottle. If bubbles appear it may mean you have a leak. Turn off the cylinder valve and have it checked by a professional before using.
- 2 Keep looking while you are cooking. Inattention may cause more than just burnt sausages.
- 3 Don't drink and fry, wait until you have finished cooking.
- 4 Do not add flammable fuel to a fire. It may flashback up into the container and explode.
- 5 BBQ outside in a well ventilated area, and always turn the gas off at both the cylinder and the BBQ when finished.
- 6 If you are cooking over an open fire remember to douse the coals with water before leaving and be aware that any unattended fire can quickly spread and grow in dry grass and

Fires along our city beaches often cause problems for us over summer and are generally not permitted by the Council. The main problem is one of safety: hot coals from driftwood fires are still capable of burning bare feet the next day and may lie unseen under a layer of sand. Our beaches should be a safe place for children to play.

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Covering the bases

As Benjamin Franklin once said, "it is a strange anomaly that people will insure their houses, their merchandise, and yet neglect to insure their lives – surely the most important of all to their families, and more subject to loss."

The crucial part of risk planning for your family is to create as much certainty as possible for continuity of family life and lifestyle when you are not there to do that.

If you experience a serious illness or injury, your health may gradually deteriorate before you eventually die. In other instances, the process will be very quick – perhaps through a car accident or the sudden onset of a terminal illness.

For most people however, it begins when you are too sick to do your job, critically ill with major trauma, permanently disabled or terminally ill.

We all like to think we are invincible, but the reality is that we are not. Accidents happen and as we age, our chances of becoming seriously ill or disabled increase. Most people want to make their own decisions about their finances.

If we have families, we need to protect their future. As Winston Churchill once said, "the price of greatness, is responsibility."



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Take a deep breath:

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For many people, stress can be an everyday occurrence. Juggling the work-life balance, money commitments, career pressures, health concerns, deadlines, family and relationship issues, the list goes on.... Stress has a huge impact on our health - we lose our inner balance, feel weak and lacking in energy, irritable and edgy. We may also experience negative emotions such as hate, anger, lack of self-worth, greed, resentment, fear. National statistics say that one in six New Zealanders will experience serious depression at some time in their life.

The typical ways we deal with stress - drugs, alcohol, smoking, medication, eating (despite having their own health risks) are actually counterproductive in that they can worsen the stress and can make us more reactive (sensitive) to further stress.

So what's the solution? Take a deep breath - it's that simple! Proper breathing has proven to relieve physical discomfort, to destress,





to relax the body, calm the mind and transform overpowering emotions. Peter Mittermuller travels the country teaching people breathing techniques in the Art of Living workshops; that are said to eliminate physical and emotional impurities. He says breathing is the link between the mind, the body and activity. "When people are experiencing emotions, such as anger or sadness the breath pattern changes. Using the breath you can harness the mind and gain control of your emotions, giving you so much freedom" Peter said.

Breathe out stress - breathe in joy for life!

The 'Art of Breathing' is a 15 hour inspirational workshop held over four days. The course includes: pranayama (breathing exercises); yogic wisdom; meditation and yoga. Garden of the Month

When I visited this month's TOM garden, a week of sunshine had seen gardeners around town finally being able to venture into their gardens and enjoy all the changes that spring has bought to them. This month's garden was recommended by my husband's work colleague and once I pulled up in my car outside I could see why.

Twenty one years ago Doug and Maureen, the couple that owns this month's feature garden, moved to New Plymouth from Ohura where Doug had been a prison officer. Over the following 21 years the couple settled into life in the city and made lots of changes to their garden. Maureen tells me it's very hard to even remember what the garden used to be like, but one thing that she does remember was the big glasshouse in which the previous owners grew grapes that used to fill a big part of the rear of the property. Although Doug didn't mind the glasshouse, Maureen really wanted it gone so with the help of family members they dismantled it. Where it once stood is now a nice open area of lawn with garden surrounding and it's hard to imagine a glasshouse filling this space now.

There are four distinct areas in the garden and at the rear of the property where the glasshouse once stood is now where Maureen has cultivated a large array of succulents. She has lots of large Agave in pristine condition using their strong shape to great effect. They and the other plants sit on the terraced garden that the couple created, making walls from broken concrete. Maureen recalls that when they were building the walls they would visit sites where houses were being moved and ask to take the broken concrete away. She went on to say her mum who was a great gardener was a big help when establishing the garden.

A path winds up through this garden up to a sheltered sunny area that houses the vegetable garden. Doug does all the heavy digging here and takes care of the potatoes while Maureen looks after the rest of the vegetables. At the moment she is growing strawberries, lettuce, silver beet and corn as well as some recently planted boysenberries.

On the south side of the couple's home is a sheltered and shady narrow strip of garden. Here Maureen has a large stand of red clivia that she has grown from seed. There are also bromeliads and a climbing fuchsia on the south wall. In between the large concrete ground pavers lush dwarf mondo grass keeps the weeds at bay.

Round the front of the house is where the main garden is located and this is Maureen's favourite part of her garden. Standing up at the house you have a lovely view of flowers and greenery. A large oval of grass is surrounded by a huge variety of flowers shrubs and trees. Maureen likes flowers of all colours and this is evident in this part of the garden. She has a large variety of roses, many in bloom, and those that aren't yet flowering are all smothered in buds. Amongst the roses there is a pretty pink Bantry Bay, Cottage Maid, Mary Rose and a beautiful apricot climbing rose called Crepuscule. The trees at the front include a pink snowball tree, several Japanese maple as well as a fantastic magnolia that is just finishing flowering, and a healthy medium sized kowhai. Other flowers include violas, cinerarias, iris, hellebores, wall flowers, snapdragons, a purple heliotrope with its gorgeous vanilla scen,t and a large yellow leucospernum. Hostas and miniature agapanthus add to the mix and a large grass hangs over the fish pond softening its edges. It all comes together with a cottage feel. Maureen told me she doesn't like a too formal garden and she likes lawn just to be lawn without plantings interrupting it. A path leading up to the house has a lovely

old wisteria growing over an archway. Maureen tells me they are enjoying the flowers from this as much as they can this year as the trunk has borer and they are not sure how much longer it will survive.

Its obvious Doug and Maureen love their garden and get a lot of pleasure from it. Although Maureen is the 'gardener,' Doug helps with any heavy work or if things need trimming or chopping down. When he is not busy he is in his workshop making beautiful old fashioned turned wood spinning tops. Unlike many great gardens that are hidden away behind high fences or the house itself, this property is situated on a corner with a low fence so almost all the garden is visible from the streets pavement. So their lucky neighbours and anyone passing by also get to enjoy this beautiful garden.

NP Croquet Club


The New Plymouth Croquet club recently hosted their 86th annual tournament and this year it was sponsored by Maurice Betts of Craig's Investment Partners.

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NP Ravens Club

New Plymouth, once again was the venue for another prestigious inline hockey event in 2010. The New Zealand Inter Regional

Inline Championships were held over Labour Weekend at the East end Skating Arena.

Players selected to represent their region came from all over the North and South Island to compete with the main aim of winning the NZ Regional Championship Trophy.

The event is hosted on a rotation basis by each of the four regions with New Plymouth providing the venue for the Central Region in 2010.

The National Regional Championship event has been hosted for fourteen years beginning in 1997, with the Central region winning the trophy three times, the Lower North Region winning nine times and the Northern Region winning twice.

The event has grown as the sport of inline hockey has developed and now provides competition for regional representative players over 10 divisions, from Under 12 years to Veterans. There were 60 games played over the three day long weekend.

The local New Plymouth Ravens players were well represented across the grades with players and club coaches taking part in the event.

Five Central teams finished in first place winning gold medals, these were Under 12, Under 14, Junior Women, Senior Women, and Under 18, the Under 16 and Masters teams finished with Silver with Bronze medals went to Under 20. Senior men and Veterans.

The competition season is now all but complete, however players are now waiting eagerly for invitations to trial for New Zealand teams to attend the Oceania Inline Hockey Championships being held in Carrara, Queensland in April 2011. Trials will be held in December at the Hamilton new skating

NZ team coaches were appointed some time ago with Anna Carrington coaching NZ Junior Women and Sam Beardman coaching NZ 18 & Under.

The popular Ravens School League got underway again at the beginning of the fourth school term with teams playing every Thursday and Friday night at the East End Rink.

The club have five nominations up for Sport Taranaki awards this year with Abby Bridgeman (Junior Sportswoman), Julian Beardman (Junior Sportsman), Under 18 Team (Junior Sports team), Senior Men (Senior Sports team) and Valerie Bedford (Volunteer of the Year). educating youngsters through the school Beach Education Safety programmes on surf awareness and responsible behaviour at the beach.

I spoke with Emma Crofskey, club captain at the Fitzroy Surf Life Saving Club about the upcoming season and about the award she received earlier this year for 'Taranaki Lifeguard of the Year.' When she attended the awards night she said she had no idea that her club had even nominated her and then went on to say, "It was a complete surprise and an honour to be recognised in that way."

Her involvement with the sport and her surf club duties keep her busy most of the year not just over the summer season. There is a lot to do for the club and this includes diverse roles such as coordinating the TOM Fitzroy deliveries which the club does as a fund raiser. Emma is a keen and successful competitor in the Surf Life Saving women's IRB events where she performs as a crewman with fellow club member Katie Watts as driver. The pair has been a formidable team at National level in this event, taking out top honours five years in a row. This year they haven't been able to start their training as early as usual due to work commitments so won't compete at the North Island event in mid November but will compete in later Taranaki carnivals in preparation for the NZ event which is the last one on the SLS calendar in late March 2011.

When I spoke with Emma she had just returned from overseas where she had travelled to Monaco. Employed by Fitzroy Yachts, she was in Monaco at a boat show where one of the company's luxury super yachts was on display. After the week at the boat show she spent time in London visiting family and then went on to Egypt to the Surf Life Saving World Championship. Whilst she wasn't competing she helped with videoing the New Zealand team and enjoyed their various successes which were huge. She explained that almost every NZ team member came away as a world champion in one or more events. Australian based Fitzroy club member Paul Cracroft-Wilson was there and she saw him win the beach flag title for the New Zealand team. NZ was pipped at the post for overall for first place by Australia by just 23 points.

Home less than a week, Emma was off to the United States two days after our interview for another boat show this time at Fort Lauderdale. I asked her what her role at Fitzroy Yachts is and she told me she manages the interior fittings of the

yachts, acting as a coordinator between the interior designer and the yard. She is no stranger to the world of these amazing super yachts though.

After she finished a five year PE degree at Otago, followed by two years doing her masters in marine science at Auckland, she worked as a deckhand on a super yacht sailing round the Caribbean and Bahamas. New Zealanders are sought after as crew on these boats she says because of their good work ethic and ability to get along with people. One of the boats she worked on was a 75 metre ex salvage tug converted into a luxury cruiser. She worked on the boat for around eight months which she says "was fun but hard work." Cleaning and driving the tender were among a few of her duties and she said a considerable amount of time is spent with chamois in hand polishing the boat.

These days when she's not flying off to exotic locations with her job Emma is happy to enjoy the lifestyle that we have here in Taranaki. Surfing, running her dog on the beach and gardening are favourite pastimes when she gets the time.

It's easy to see once you meet Emma why she was nominated by her club for 'Lifeguard of the Year.' She is so enthusiastic about surf life saving and the Fitzroy club which she says is very family friendly, social and lots of fun. When I spoke with her the club was due to have its annual opening day on the 30th October. Whole families can participate, with junior surf club for children aged from age seven up to thirteen and then anyone over fourteen can sit their lifeguard award and once they pass can be on one of the club's five patrols.

It was one such patrol that was awarded 'Taranaki Rescue of the Year' on the same night Emma received her award. The TOM reported on this mass rescue that took place in post tsunami surf in February. The patrol crew which included Adam Fraser, Jordan Lampe, Daniel Lampe, Marissa Clough, Jessica Lampe and Evie Trolove as well as off duty lifeguard Steve Harris rescued ten people from the surf and guided another 80 or so swimmers into safer water.

Surf lifeguards in Taranaki carried out 5015 hours of patrol and rescued 23 people last season but their main role is to prevent people getting into difficulty and last season's figures relating to that showed that Taranaki lifeguards performed 1779 preventative actions that affected 3781 people.

When you see that SLSNZ statistics show that those most at risk from drowning are aged less than fourteen, things like the Beach Education programme and getting children and their families involved with their local surf club are really valuable tools in keeping young ones safe at the beach.

They raced so well that they won all 12 races, throughout two heats, semifinals and finals in each event for single rescue, mass rescue and tube rescue titles. New Zealand has a proud heritage in IRB racing and the standard of racing in New Zealand held the crew in pretty good stead against the international crews. They were pushed during the races and because of the tough competition at our own national championships they were able to come through."

We are now gearing up for the next group of fantastic people who are wanting to become Lifeguards, to help keep our beach safe for all to swim at.

We also held our open day on the 31st October, which was an awesome day, with slippery slides, tours of the club, IRB rides, demonstrations of canoe, board, and ski racing, with a fun beach flag event. Watch out seniors, there are some awesome juniors coming through the ranks. The day was rounded off by SAR training happening off East End Beach. Everyone got a huge kick out of watching people jump out of the helicopter into the sea and then being winched back up again.

A lot has been happening in the way of up skilling our lifeguards. We have had nine Lifeguards pass their Marine VHF Radio Operators Cert, ten Lifeguards attend Intermediate Guard training, and three Lifeguards attend Motor Workshop (trained to look after rescue motors). There have been First Aid, Oxygen and defib refreshers, and seven Lifeguards are working towards getting their Instructor Award.

We have 14 lifeguards working towards their IRB Drivers Award, which involves a minimum of 10 hours driving time each.



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NPBHS perform well at Chess National Championship

This year the NZ Interschool Chess Finals were held in Christchurch over the first weekend of the September school holidays and the Chess team from New Plymouth Boys' High School travelled to Christchurch to represent our region. The combination of timing and venue presented the team which included Alan Ansell, Jacob Tomlinson, Tyler Stewart and Jesse Watt with a few logistical and financial difficulties compared to past, North Island based events but the boys worked hard to raise funds.

In the months leading up to the event, in addition to fund raising, the boys also prepared hard by playing chess at school and participating regularly in tournament play on club nights at the NP Chess Club on Tuesdays from 7:30 pm. One week before the Interschool finals the boys also took part in a full day rapid-play chess tournament organised especially by the Club and kindly hosted at NPBHS. The tournament was well supported by club members, providing a real test for the boys, who nevertheless performed very creditably.

After all the preparation and fund raising efforts, the Christchurch earthquake, occurring just three weeks out from "kick-off", provided a bit of a scare. Enquiries just two weeks out revealed that, while our accommodation was still standing, the plumbing was malfunctioning and the tournament venue itself (Christchurch Boys' High School hall), was still awaiting final engineering clearance. Fortunately these issues were resolved in good time and in the end the earthquake caused no real disruption to proceedings. Despite the venue and possible deterrent factor from the earthquake, altogether 32 teams, across the three divisions, Primary, Intermediate and Secondary, had made the trek South (with St Joseph's School, Stratford, representing Taranaki in the Primary and Intermediate divisions) as well as eight South Island teams also participating.

In total 12 teams contested the secondary schools division, with top seed and runaway 2009 champions, Auckland Grammar, the hot favourites for gold. This year NPBHS were seeded 4th and hoping to improve on their somewhat disappointing showing last year, when they finished in 11th place in a field of 14. Play was scheduled to take place over seven rounds, with five rounds to be played on the Saturday and two on the Sunday, with each player having about 30 minutes to make all their moves in each round. The NPBHS team was on 19 points at the conclusion of the first day's

play (from a maximum possible of 40), roughly in the middle of the pack.

After a quiet day, seismically speaking, we experienced three really decent, and quite unnerving, aftershocks on the Saturday evening - so we then had a small insight into how the poor citizens of Christchurch city had been suffering. Fortunately we had a relatively "quiet" night and the boys must have found their sleep and the much later start on Sunday morning restful, because they started the day with a 6th round clean sweep of bottom seeded Opotiki College (Bay of Plenty). This 8:0 result catapulted the team well up the rankings so that they were drawn against the second seeds, St Paul's Collegiate from the Waikato, in the 7th and final round, with a realistic chance to win silver or bronze medals if they played well.

And they did play well, managing a 6:2 score, with wins on three boards. This left NPBHS on 33 points, in second place, but, incredibly, tied with three other teams (St Paul's Collegiate, Westlake Boys' High - Auckland, and Palmerston North Boy's High)!

A nail biting few moments followed, while tie breaks were calculated to decide the winners of the Silver and Bronze medals (Auckland Grammar having once again won Gold, this time with the incredible score of 49 points, having dropped just 7 points over the 7 rounds). The Silver medal was awarded to St Paul's and the Bronze to Westlake Boys' High. The boys were disappointed to come so close to winning a medal, only to miss out on tie break. However they can be justifiably proud of their performance - as a Taranaki supporter, I know I am - which was a vast improvement on 2009, and they might also feel some moral claim to Silver, with a convincing 6:2 victory in the final round over the actual Silver medal winners, St Paul's Collegiate. Next year they will surely have Auckland Grammar in their sights!

The boys are grateful for the support they have received: from the members of the NP Chess Club, particularly Errol Tuffrey and David Notley, who gave regular coaching sessions throughout the year at NPBHS; from Mary Porteous, Teacher in Charge of chess at NPBHS; Pip Campbell at NPBHS, who made many of their travel arrangements; and generous sponsorship from an anonymous benefactor whose father was a keen chess player with a leading role in establishing the New Plymouth Chess Club; and from, not least, their parents!

It was a pleasure to take on the role of "camp father" for the boys, and


