




# Coastal Karate shines at the NZ Championships

#### Hi folks!

Well we're in the middle of public consultation on the Draft 2009-2019 Community Plan, and the community meetings are well under way.

If you didn't get to the meeting at Oakura Hall on 1 April, there's another one at Hempton Hall in Okato 6.00pm to 8.00pm on Monday 27 April. Everyone is welcome to come along and hear an overview of the plan, and raise any questions you have with the council staff.

This year we're making it easy for residents to discuss any community plan topic with other people around the district. *Talk New Plymouth* is an online forum where you can post your comments and view what other people are saying. If you have questions, a council manager will respond with an answer. Any comments posted on **talknewplymouth.com** aren't formal submissions to the draft plan (read on for the various ways to make a formal submission), but the forum is a great place discuss and debate the issues that are important to you. If you haven't checked it out yet, be sure to have a look!

The lead-up to this Draft Community Plan has been a long and detailed one, with public consultation starting in May last year through workshops, focus groups, surveys and the district-wide community road show where people gave us their views via touch-screen computers. (You may have seen our road show staff in Oakura on 25 August last year.) The draft plan under consideration is our interpretation of what 1,400 people and organisations told us during that pre-plan consultation.

Do you think we have interpreted it right? Does the draft plan reflect what you want for the New Plymouth District in the next ten years? The only way we'll know is if you make a comment on the draft plan before the 1 May deadline.

We've made it easy for you to give us your feedback. You can:

- fill in the submission form in the summary booklet that has been delivered to all letterboxes, or pick one up at Oakura Library
- fill in the online submission form at newplymouthnz.com
- email (enquiries@npdc.govt.nz), phone (759 6060) or fax (759 6072) your comments to us

Community plans are the most important of all the plans a council creates.

They are prepared only every three years, and once adopted we can't make substantial changes within those three years without going through another time-intensive and costly community plan process. So we want to get this right. The only way we can do that is to hear from you on what you support and what you'd like to change. Be sure to "Have your say by the first of May!"

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# kaitake community board

Your Community Board has had a busy time since the last TOM column, dealing with local issues and attending Council meetings and workshops. We seem to start each year slowly but then get busier and busier as the year progresses. There are some positives and some negatives regarding local Oakura village issues.

Let me give the negative ones some air first. A growing number of Village residents are very frustrated with the amount of dog faeces being deposited on lawns, grass verges, the beach, park and campground. It is the clear responsibility of each dog owner to clean up their dog's mess when it is deposited. There are some Council receptacles on the beachfront and we probably need more, but this doesn't give dog owners an excuse.

Council Bylaws are explicit on removal of dog faeces – "The owner of any dog that defecates in a public place or on land or premises other than that occupied by the owner shall immediately remove the faeces from that place and dispose of it in a sanitary manner into a suitable receptacle."

There are also other restrictions on dogs on the beachfront, the CBD and Corbett Park as listed below:

#### Beachfront

That is the foreshore and beach in the area between imaginary lines drawn directly to the sea from the eastern side of the vehicle entrance to the motor camp and from the western side of the end of Wairau Rd. Dogs are banned in that area from 9am to 6pm daily during the period of daylight saving for New Zealand. Dogs may be exercised at large or be present at other times, providing the dog is kept under continuous control.

#### Corbett Park

Dogs shal be kept under leashed control while in the Corbett Park area. That is the area of the Oakura River, beach, foreshore and adjoining land, bounded by the State Highway 45 road bridge, the true left bank of the river (Oakura village side), the eastern edge of the formed vehicle access through Corbett Park on the east side of the river (New Plymouth side) and an imaginary line drawn across the river in a line contiguous with and parallel to the seaward side of the building housing the changing rooms/public toilets.

#### CBD

Dogs must be kept under leashed control at all times in the Oakura Shopping Area. That is the road, verge and formed footpath on both sides of State Highway 45 from its intersection with Dixon St to its intersection with The Outlook. Other public places

No dog is permitted to roam or be at large in any public place unless such dog is under continuous control or leashed control. Dogs are not permitted to roam or be at large on any private land or premises, without the consent (express or implied) of the occupier or owner.'

A local has suggested that perhaps all residents should undertake one final cleanup of the lawns and verges in front of their properties and then we all should make a concerted effort to change any further unacceptable behaviour by any dog owner. Concerned people can lay a complaint by contacting Council on 759 6060.

There has also been ongoing concern about the number of vehicles on Oakura Beach. Vehicles on the beach are an unpleasant distraction, and have health, safety and environmental consequences. Council bylaws allow vehicles onto Oakura Beach (between the Weld Rd river mouth to the west and the Tapuae River mouth to the east) if they are rescue,

police or Surf Life Saving vehicles; are used to carry out approved maintenance work on the beach; or are used to launch or land recreation and fishing boats. The proviso with launching or landing boats is that the vehicles should leave the beach straight afterward and park in one of the areas provided off the beach.

We have an internationally recognised Blue Flag beach and to retain this accreditation we must abide by their compliance standards, which are examined annually. Environmental Standard 17 states, "Unauthorised driving must be prohibited on the beach." We seek the cooperation of drivers and of anyone who sees vehicles being driven inappropriately. If people have any concerns or would like to clarify what can and can't be done on the beach, they're welcome to contact Council on 759 6060.

On a more positive note, KCB members have lodged submissions on the Campground Review and the Rural Subdivision Review. Members will speak to the submissions at the review hearings. The Board is also involved with the Oakura Hall Committee in preparation for their submission on the Rural Halls Review. The hall has served the community particularly well for many years but it needs development to present a more user-friendly profile. It doesn't meet current needs as it cannot cater for the increasing number of varied use requirements being asked of it. We believe the first steps for future development planning should begin now so that the hall can always meet the needs of the community.

The Board is also very pleased to see that the damaged rock walls in the Okato CBD have finally been repaired. After many meetings and workshops, Council has approved that the draft 2009 - 2019 Community Plan go out for public scrutiny. Copies will be available shortly and we urge all residents to spend some time examining what is planned and to provide relevant feedback to KCB members. The Community Board intends making a submission to the Community Plan Hearing.

We remind you that ordinary meetings of the Council, committees, some subcommittees and community boards are held on a six-weekly meeting cycle. Extraordinary meetings are held as necessary and these are advertised in the newspaper as required. Agenda papers are available for inspection at council offices, service centres and libraries before each meeting.

We hope you all have a happy and enjoyable Easter.

The summer months have come and now nearly gone. It's been an amazing summer in North and Coastal Taranaki with copious amounts of sunshine and still enough rain to keep things looking green. Not long ago I was cycling on the New Plymouth walkway on a windy Sunday afternoon and could nearly feel the change in season that is upon us. It was also evident by the sprinkling of snow high on Mt Taranaki. Then another two amazing weeks of weather stretched summer even further in the place we call "paradise".

But North and Coastal Taranaki are connected to a world that is experiencing a change of season. The government is responding to this change of season through a number of initiatives in our Jobs and Growth Plan. We are putting strategies in place to retain jobs and see the economy come back into growth.

We have recently announced almost a billion dollars of extra investment in State Highway building over the next three years. This investment will provide a double benefit. It will bring economic stimulus to the country in employment and will help improve our transport infrastructure. Both of these things will be essential for economic productivity as we seek to grow quickly again, once the current global recession ends.

It may be difficult to see how building better roads up north will benefit us in Taranaki. If you have an isolationist viewpoint it is hard to see. However, when we recognise we live in a connected world where our industries and businesses use those roads to move their products to points of sale, we can then see the benefit to us all. A better transport network not only means greater efficiency in resources and time, but also less cost in the long run, which filters down to everyone in our country.

The challenges we face in New Zealand transport are complicated by living in a very long, sparsely populated country. This means cost per kilometre per citizen is higher than a smaller more densely populated country such as Singapore where several million people live in an area about the size of Lake Taupo.

Mr Steven Joyce, Minister of Transport, recently said that the government's roading plan would reverse the previous government's projected decrease of 9% in the State Highway budget over the next three years. "It will mean that a total of around \$3 billion will be invested across the State Highway network over the next three years," he said.

Mr Joyce also said that the new draft Government Policy Statement shows investment in State Highway infrastructure continuing at around 33-34% of the total fund over the ten-year horizon, instead of dropping to 22-24% as predicted in the previous government's Government Policy Statement (GPS).-

"This will provide around \$10.7 billion over ten years for investment in the State Highway network," he said, "and that is a much more appropriate level given the importance of the network to New Zealanders."

Jobs and growth are the two critical strategies needed right now in order to cushion people from the worst effects of the global recession and to grow our way out of it.






Sian went door to door on her street Sian Tran-Lawrence asking for items to be donated to the

# Marking the end of an era at Pukeiti

The final act in the celebration of Graham Smith's thirty nine year career as Pukeiti's Curator and Director took place at the recent Autumn Member's Day for the Pukeiti Rhododendron Trust with the official opening of the Graham Smith Walk.

It is timely to recount a little bit of the history of the area. Early on, Pukeiti already had a variety of large leaved rhododendrons including seedlings raised at the Brooklands Nursery by Jack Fairbrother that had come from the wild collections from the last seed collecting expedition from which our iconic Rh. Pukeiti along with Charisma and Rh. elliotii originated. In addition to species donated from existing New Zealand collections other plants were raised from seed obtained from some of the great Scottish gardens.

The first of these were planted in the late 1950's and in Pat Greenfield's book on Pukeiti you can find a photograph of Betty Elliot standing proudly by one of these. John Goodwin set these out and many thought he had placed them far too far from the path little

knowing the grand stature they would attain as we see them today.

So the next big planting was made and included seedlings from the Pukekura Park Rh. macabeanum one of which was named "Ina Hair". The Hairs lived in the Lodge and Ina was daily on hand to greet visitors and to prepare morning teas for staff and working bees.

Graham Smith explained "the 'new' Graham Smith Walk has had a slow, almost sleepy, introduction to the hierarchy of walks through the greater garden. The Valley of the Giants was established in the 1960's and when I joined Pukeiti in 1969 it was pretty raw."

He went on to state "about 20 years ago I was looking through the area between the White Walk and the Valley of the Giants for a possible link track site. Within twelve months we had mapped out the planting sites for the new R. prostitums (R. Pukeiti) and these were duly planted when large enough to compete with the native regrowth. We continued to plant more rhododendron species into the clearings and these included R.s, sinogrande, grande, manificum, a new Vietnamese large leaf species and the late flowering R. excellens from the Maddenia section. These are all growing well and the first flowers have started to appear this past season."

In due course the Valley of the Giants realized the dream even though many of the plants turned out to be hybrids and not what we all hoped they were. Nevertheless today they provide some of the most spectacular displays and match the best of

collections anywhere in the world.

The path that takes you through this area links to the lower walk of the Valley of the Giants and it is fitting that this new development should be named after Graham Smith who can be justifiably proud of his contribution to Pukeiti and particularly the development of the Large leafed rhododendrons which are one of Pukeiti's stunning displays and among the best in the world.

On having the track named after him Graham stated "The large leaf area has always been very special to me and I think it is the most unique plantings of these amazing plants anywhere in the world." On the first sighting the opened track he commented "as with all such projects it is a 'work in progress' and something I am intensely proud of."

At the opening ceremony Trust Chairman Lynn Bublitz addressed the eighty assembled members prior to proceeding down to the large leaf area "It is appropriate that you are all here, especially so that Graham's children are present ..." Both of Graham's daughters were brought up in the early years at Pukeiti.

Graham then led the way for both his immediate and his extended Pukeiti family, who were all enjoying the Taranaki sunshine, to the start of the latest addition the many great walks at Pukeiti. After using a saw to cut the red danger tape, used instead of a ceremonial ribbon, all members followed Graham and his family along the new walk.

A great day was had by all and everyone present was proud to be there to honour the contribution of Pukeiti's longest serving Curator and employee.

#### **Okato Squash Club**

Many of New Zealand's small rural communities are blessed with having diverse cultural and recreational facilities, and the Oakura and Okato areas are no exception. We are able to use first class facilities that are constructed and run on shoestring budgets with thousands of voluntary labour hours. The Okato Squash Club is a classic example of how we are still benefitting from the hard graft put in a generation ago.

The clubrooms and the two original courts were opened in September 1980, constructed within the Okato Domain. During construction voluntary labour hours exceeded 5500. A third glass-back court was added in1999 with more volunteers put back to work. This cost-effective method of construction, coupled with prudent management from subsequent committees and local sponsor contributions, have set the foundation for a successful family-friendly club. The squash committee are keen to keep it that way and make squash a healthy and affordable sport for anyone and everyone.

The Club's annual membership structure ranges from full senior membership (\$160) to social memberships (\$80). We also have discounted subs for couples (\$260), 18-19 year old students (\$100), families (\$300) and juniors (\$40). All members except juniors have free key access to clubrooms and courts, and can play at any time the courts are not being used for club purposes.

The Okato Squash Junior Programme is run by the Club's second highest ranked player and local vet, Peter Morgan. (As a point of interest the highest ranked player is 17 year old Daniel Charteris.) The Junior Programme runs during Terms 2 and 3. The players are divided into two or three groups for coaching, dependent on ability levels. Last year we had juniors as young as six years old, and all players showed great improvement throughout the year.

During the 2008 season Okato hosted a Taranaki Junior Tournament, a Taranaki Secondary Schools Tournament and a National Secondary Schools Tournament, all involving our juniors. Junior club nights will begin the first Monday of Term 2 at 6.00pm, when we will have registration and a fun night for all those interested.

Okato is only ten minutes down the road from Oakura. Come down and join us. Your body will thank you for it!




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# Your April Checklist

Sow seeds of beetroot, broccoli, broad beans, cabbage, carrots, onions, spinach, radish, Swedes and turnips. Enjoy the rich supply from the garden this season.

Continue planting spring bulbs. Deadhead roses as autumn flowers finish and give existing roses a side dressing of fertiliser. Lift and divide crowded perennials. Plant pots with autumn and winter flowering annuals such as pansies, primulas, polyanthus, stock, antirrhinums and bulbs.

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# Recipes From Around the World

#### **Blueberry Banana Pie**

Tahiti is a beautiful country and we are very lucky to have a native Tahitian living within our village of Oakura. Robin Green is the mother of three beautiful girls, and is married to Oakura native, Kelly Green. I was able to catch up with Robin and her family near Okato recently while picking blueberries. Their family picks blueberries every season and freezes them to use throughout the year. One of their favourite recipes is a Blueberry Banana Pie.

I tried this recipe with the blueberries I picked, and it was not only delicious but also made a beautiful presentation!

1 cup plain flour

½ cup self raising flour

1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp ground ginger

40 gm butter, chopped

95 gm (1/2 cup) soft brown sugar

125 ml buttermilk (regular milk can be used)

200 gm blueberries

2 ripe bananas

2 tsp lemon juice

1 Tbs raw sugar (or soft brown)

Preheat oven to 200 degrees. Spray pizza tray with oil.

Put flour and spices in bowl. Add butter and brown sugar. Rub until similar to breadcrumbs. Make a well, and add milk little by little until a soft dough. Roll dough on lightly floured surface until about 23 centimeters diameter. Form the edges into a rim. Spread blueberries over the dough. Slice bananas and toss in lemon juice. Lay bananas on top. Sprinkle with sugar .

Bake 25 minutes or until base has browned. Serve immediately and enjoy!



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

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#### Snapper, Skin on with Lemon Orange and Lime Rub

Snapper fillets - skin on and scaled

Orange, lemon and lime zest

Sea salt, fresh herb, i.e. rosemary, mint,

Olive oil

Balsamic roasted tomatoes with sea salt and thyme

Cut the snapper fillet to size if large and score 2 slashes into the skin.

Mix the citrus zest with 1 tablespoon sea salt flakes and 1 tablespoon chopped herbs.

Work the rub into the snapper skin and leave to marinate for minimum 10 minutes in the fridge.

Heat a heavy based griddle or pan and wipe with olive oil.

Sear the snapper, skin side down, on medium/hot heat for 2 minutes. Turn and griddle for 1 minute.

Serve the snapper with roasted tomatoes and salad greens.

#### Roasted Tomatoes

Halve ripe tomatoes and lay face up on the tray. Sprinkle with sea salt flakes and fresh ground pepper.

Fleck with the faintest hail of sugar.

Drizzle balsamic vinegar across the tomatoes and some olive oil.

Drape with plenty of fresh thyme and roast in a 170 degree oven for 30 minutes.

tight, just as well there were some adults around to enjoy this!!!!!!!!!


