Working to Improve the Lives of all New Zealanders

We all know to run good businesses and community organisations we need to set goals and targets. This is true even in our own lives, whether it be setting personal goals or vocational aspirations, having clear targets of what you want to achieve means you can measure your success or how far you are from reaching your goals.

This is no different to Government, and it is imperative we know what we are wanting to achieve so we can regularly measure how well we are doing and what we need to continue to do to improve the lives of New Zealanders.

Nearly four years ago the Government set 10 challenging targets for the public service to get better results from taxpayer's money. These are referred to as the Better Public Services targets.

These targets are keeping ministers and agencies accountable and are helping to reduce long-term welfare dependency, support vulnerable children, boost skills and employment, reduce crime and improve interaction with Government.

We are the first administration to set public targets to be measured against, and our progress is reported every six months. The latest update confirms we are heading in the right direction.

An example of these targets in the Education sector is where we have seen more young people getting the qualifications they need to go into employment or on to further study. In 2008, just 68 per cent of 18 year-olds had NCEA Level 2 or equivalent. Provisional 2015 results show 84.4 per cent of 18 year-olds achieved NCEA Level 2 or equivalent last year – on track to pass the Governments Better Public Services target of 85 per cent by 2017.

National has been focusing on improving performance in the schooling system to ensure every child has the opportunity to succeed. We want every young New Zealander to have the skills and qualifications they need to successfully participate in the modern economy.

However, despite crime in New Zealand falling to its lowest rate since 1978, our rates of family violence are appallingly high.

Last year alone, 100,000 incidences were reported to Police – around one every five minutes.

The National-led Government is taking action across the board to better protect families and victims of family violence.

Ministers from across 16 portfolios have come together to form the Ministerial Group on Family and Sexual Violence, which will oversee a whole-of government strategy for addressing family and sexual violence.

Within the justice part of this work, we're overhauling our family violence laws. Almost 500 individuals and

organisations made submissions on our discussion document. We're exploring options and will look to make announcements around our changes soon.

But it's not just about the law. We have improved judges' access to information in family violence cases by improving information sharing regulations.

A new disclosure scheme has also been created to make it easier for police to release a person's violent criminal past to a concerned partner or friend. This gives people the ability to do something to help protect their loved ones.

We are looking at introducing a new standalone strangulation offence that would have a maximum penalty of seven years' imprisonment.

National has been working hard to make Kiwis safer in their homes and communities. We're making good progress and will continue our relentless focus on preventing and reducing family violence.

Kaitake Community Board

Well the warm weather continues, WOMAD has been and gone and as I write this Easter is looming over the horizon. Looking at the long-range forecast it appears as if the incoming wet weather will be over by Good Friday, so I do hope campers can stay warm and dry.

We have closed off the consultation period for the 'Oakura - A Growing Community' project the Community Board has undertaken in conjunction with a local Focus Group. The discussion document was out in the community for 16 weeks and we have been hugely impressed with the number of people who have submitted their ideas and perspectives on how they best see our community developing. We have received feedback from well over 100 folk. On behalf of the Board and Focus Group thank you for all your feedback and excellent ideas.

It has been a challenging community-engagement exercise but, nevertheless, a very important step in our resolve to provide local input to council officers as they go about the important business of reviewing the District Plan. While the Board and Focus Group have no decisionmaking ability in that process we are hopeful our work will be taken seriously. We have all been impressed with the way we have been able to work in partnership with council officers to get to this point. Our next step will be to appraise all the information we have received and develop a document for council officers. This will be presented as a formal response from the Kaitake Community Board. It is important as well to pay tribute to members of the Focus Group who have made so many important contributions to the project. These folk all have very busy lives and have made a community commitment that is quite outstanding.

Recently I attended a Ministry for the Environment workshop about the government's proposals to improve the management of fresh water in New Zealand. The aim is to support local communities to identify and test solutions that meet their own challenges, but within a national framework. Everyone understands that fresh water is our greatest natural and economic asset and in the past 30 years water pollution has reduced from point of source discharges from factories, local body sewerage schemes and dairy sheds. However current management is not working in dealing with the more difficult problem of diffuse pollution. This includes nutrients, pathogens and sediments from intensive farming and from urban stormwater run-off. The proposals are works in progress to put in place proper measures to improve water quality and prevent any further deterioration of our lakes, rivers and aquifers. A large group from throughout Taranaki gathered for the meeting and three of our district's four community boards attended. Personally I was alarmed to find only one Taranaki Regional Councillor there and no NPDC councillors present. Improving the management of our fresh water is a long-term task and with the further devolution of decision-making to territorial authorities through regional and district plans in land use and resource consenting it is imperative decision-makers have an in-depth understanding of this critical issue.

Our thanks to Sarah Ashworth for her ongoing efforts to get some action on safer speed limits in and around Oakura. She has worked long and hard on the issue. Thanks also to Patti Wolfsbauer for organising a petition on the subject, it has been very well supported. The council's roading team and I met recently with Dan Tate, the senior safety engineer from NZTA, to detail the community's concerns. The outcome was that he pledged his organisation would have a serious look at the issue, focusing on the eastern approach and exit from the village, the Oakura Pa entrance and the Corbett Park-Victoria Road-passing lane area. Doing nothing is no longer an option.

Finally don't forget to regularly check the KCB Face Book page. To date this year we have reached over 14,000 Face Bookers with our biggest uptakes being the Oakura School's jubilee celebrations when a total of 3,200 people were reached.

Well that's it for this issue. Ka kite ano.

A local woman has taken what was once an unconscious response of scribbling notes to a practical conclusion - a published book with the conscious thought of helping the community.


Conscious Living Short Cuts is the start of the life works of C Grace Lewis and the book is being launched here in Oakura at the library on 13 April at 3.15pm.

Conscious Living Short Cuts could seem at first glance just a collection of what we all know instinctively - and it is but how often do we act by reflex rather than instinct? We forget to trust our instincts and C Grace has encapsulated these instincts plus many more valuable tips for a conscious minded, community minded and positive existence. I very much appreciate having these things brought to my conscious mind. For example C Grace suggests rather than grumping at the housework chore give thanks for the convenience of being able to use such wonderful inventions as the toilet, shower and vacuum cleaner!

C Grace had always been a scribbler of notes - if some technique, attitude or game worked in her daily life then she would scribble it down until one day she realised she had piles and piles of notes. Thus a book was born. For C Grace the goal was to do something that supported the community and would be fun for everyone to do in a simple way. C Grace describes it as highlighting all the good things in life (while still being conscious that not every experience is good). C Grace acknowledges there are many good things already in the community and great resources to be found but she describes her book as a handbook that pulls all the good things together.

Conscious Living Short Cuts pools many resources including C Grace's family with husband Donald and daughter Hogan editing the book and son Kaye who helping set up the conscious living website, friends who helped with artwork and design, the family of course being

Oakura can bask in the reflected glory of several locals who had an extremely successful few days in Hastings also, some of whom are past pony club members.

Mathew Dickey placed 1st in the Show jumping Premier Stakes Grand Prix 1.45m and 2nd in the 1.35m. For those not really familiar with the sport, 1st at HoY means nationally first, as in the best in the country. His winning the Tom Gadsby Memorial Trophy was hugely exciting for his family and supporters who have watched Mathew, ex Oakura School Head Boy and Oakura Pony Club rider who not so long ago won the Young Rider National Champion at HoY, as he builds a career while continuing to train his horses, before and after work each day. He is a fantastic ambassador for the sport of horse riding but also for the village he comes from.

Molly Lumb, who still has the odd jaunt around the pony club arena, although as a volunteer coach these days, rode KH Arvan in his last ever event, an emotional retirement after Molly placed Reserve Champion in the Dressage Young Rider.



Speedster's are our Local Heroes

Locally owned and operated IT company Naki Cloud has its heart firmly set in Oakura/Omata. Two of its shareholder/ directors live in the community - Ryan Eagar and Michael Perrett - their children go to local schools and attend local clubs and participate in local sports and activities. Both families are keen to make a difference in their community and one way they choose to do this is by offering the best internet solutions to Oakura residents.

Naki Cloud have done this by building their own high tech Data Centre in New Plymouth and staffing it with trained technicians. What most of us want (and most of us don't really understand the complex world of IT, fibre, broadband, VoIP, IPS etc) is to talk (and by talk I mean ring up and have the phone answered by a human being in our own country, preferably local) to someone (not in Mumbai or Manila) within seconds and not be placed in a priority queue for hours. Naki Cloud do this and who would have thought it would be a point of difference here in Taranaki!

So to understand what has been happening in our streets and neighbourhoods.

Ultrafast Fibre Ltd have built the broadband network (laying underground fibre optic cables) in Oakura (and New Plymouth) - a government initiative. UFF then sell access to that network to broadband providers such as Naki Cloud. Naki Cloud offer an internet and home phone service to customers called Speedster.

A phone call to Naki Cloud would be the first phone call you make to access the new fast internet service and Naki Cloud arrange for the UFF crew to come and discuss the installation process with you which involves scoping your property for the best access to your house with the least disturbance. You are then placed in a queue for installation which is currently taking about 8 weeks. The cost to get ultrafast broadband to every home in Oakura village is zero - it is fully subsidised by the government. This government initiative is not always going to be available for free so residents should consider getting fibre installed while the free offer is available. It will add value to each property and of course provide fast internet.

Speedster through the Naki Cloud Data Centre ensures:

customers have continual high speed internet (no diminishing upload and download speeds as more people jump online) top end modem supplied; local technicians who are not call centre operators; no loss of phone connection during changeover; unlimited data; unlimited back up service and help; web hosting; business packages; future proofed network.

Damien Kiss is the Speedster sales manager and along with Ryan is passionate about providing high speed internet to customers in the community - being able to provide a high end product to happy customers is immensely satisfying to the pair. As Ryan points out, he has to live amongst the community and if you don't supply a good product then everyone will tell you in no uncertain terms!

The term Speedster most iconically refers to comic book characters (e.g. Flash) who have super human powers which they perform at super fast speeds. Ryan and Damien may not have super human powers and are not cartoon characters but they have ensured a super fast super reliable internet service for Taranaki people.

Work Day





Around 400 registrants gathered for the weekend of celebrations, travelling from across the country and overseas.

Events included a 'Meet and Mingle' at Butlers Reef on Friday night with the more formal celebrations being held at the school on Saturday morning.

Mayor Andrew Judd acknowledged the significance of the school in today's growing Oakura community. He noted that many small rural schools had closed over the last few decades but here we have one that is thriving. Growing from 16 original students in 1866, to today's role of around 350 students.

Jubilee Committee Chairperson, Claire White spoke about the school 'physically' acknowledging the 15 decades with the installation of 15 art sculpture poles and the planting of 15 Nikau palms in the schools recently developed Enviro Centre.



Saturday night saw a casual "Knees Up' celebration take place at Butlers Reef where 150 registrants were able to continue to 'Celebrate, Reminisce and Connect' with old friends, fellow pupils, staff and whanau.

The schools most senior student in attendance was Colin Cochran. Colin started at Oakura School in 1926 as a 5 year old and was delighted at the age of 96 to share cake cutting honours with the school's youngest pupil Phoebe Bennett, age 5 years. Phoebe represents the second generation in her family to attend the school.

All feedback from the weekend has been overwhelmingly positive and the future definitely looks bright for Oakura School. The school is looking forward to the challenges that the next 150 years will bring.

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JUNIOR CERTIFICATE OF ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

The JCEA is a new academic award that replaced the Certificate of Learning in 2016. It is an exciting opportunity to develop students' knowledge of the NCEA system in the junior school (Year 9 and 10) and help raise the aspirations of students in the junior school.

In a nutshell students get credits when they successfully complete assessments in their Year 9 or Year 10 classes. These credits accumulate and when students have gained 80 or more in their year level they have gained the JCEA qualification. Across subjects students will be offered between 16-20 credits, so we expect students to be offered around 140 credits across all their subjects. Credits can be achieved at an achieved, merit and excellence level. So for example in Social Studies, a student who completes an assessment that could be worth 4 credits can gain these credits at an excellence level.

Similar to the NCEA system, students who complete the JCEA and gain 50 or more credits at excellence level will gain their JCEA endorsed with excellence. Students who gain 50 or more credits at merit level can gain their JCEA endorsed with merit.

Also similar to the senior school, students who achieve endorsed with excellence or merit will receive badges that they can wear with pride!

In individual full year subjects students can be offered up to 20 credits, if a student achieves 14 or more credits at excellence then they will gain subject endorsement at excellence in that subject. If a student achieves 14 or more credits at merit then they will gain subject endorsement at merit in that subject. Special thanks to our Head Prefects for cooking and serving the BBQ – a fine job; thanks also for the support of our Parent Teacher Association (PTA)

NEW ASTROTURF FOR COLLEGE

A project started by our HOD Sport Mr Gayton in early 2014 has now opened.

The \$135,000.00 project has seen four tennis, three netball and one basketball court covered in synthetic turf by the Auckland based company "Tigerturf". The complex also includes a two lane athletic track, one hockey field and a Futsal(Football) field.

The majority of the funding was received from grants by the New Zealand Community Trust (NZCT) and the TSB Community Trust.

This complex is a huge benefit for the College and the local community. Our PE staff will now have an all-weather outdoor facility available for classes and out sports teams will also use the arena for training and game purposes.

Our thanks go to Mr Gayton for the time and effort he put into the fund-raising and to overseeing the construction of the astroturf.


