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

Hello everyone.

After years of planning, the new rubbish collection system is a couple of months away from starting.

The new system will see households in the collection areas using branded plastic 60L bags for general rubbish, a 60L crate for glass recyclables, and a 240L wheelie bin for all other recyclables.

Not only are we getting rid of plastic supermarket bags for the recyclables but we will also be able to recycle more plastics than before. Currently we can recycle only types one and two plastics, but from 1 October that expands to types one to seven.

The aim of the new system is to reduce the amount of material that goes to the landfill, which would mean cost savings for all of us. We have a lot of room to improve as 65 per cent of waste from households can be diverted from the landfill!

Bin delivery

The first sign that people will see of the new collection system is the delivery at their homes of the recycling bins and branded rubbish bags.

This delivery will be completed by the end of September - so if your property is charged a targeted rate for rubbish collection and you haven't received your bins yet, don't worry, they're coming!

To help you out, the bins will be accompanied by a calendar (showing which week is for collecting glass and which for general recyclables) and other information.

The bins can't be used until 1 October though, when the new collection system starts.

While this new system will make it easier for us to get the most out of our recycling, it isn't the full answer to responsible waste management. From 1 October it will be up to each of us to use this system to its fullest and recycle as much as we can from our homes, as the collection system will only be as good as the effort we put into it.

New Zealand Benefitting from **Major Sporting Events**

Taranaki is a region that constantly punches above its weight and it is no exception when it comes to major sporting events.

We have fantastic facilities from the Sandfords Event Centre, TSB Stadium and Yarrow Stadium and when it comes to major international sporting we make sure Taranaki is front and centre. Right on the back of a hugely successful Fifa Under 20 World Cup, it was recently announced Yarrow Stadium will be host to the All Blacks v Argentina in 2017.

On a national level we are home to the winners of the ITM Cup 2014, and am sure there will be some very large crowds supporting our home team this year. Being able to attend these major events in our backyard not only contributes to making this region a great place to live but the spin off for local business is hugely beneficial for our economy.

The Governments backing for major international sporting events continues to create opportunities for Kiwis not only at home but also overseas.

The first half of the year has already seen New Zealand host the ICC Cricket World Cup and the FIFA Under-20 World Cup, which were successes both on and off the field. The Black Caps became the first New Zealand cricket side to reach a World Cup final during a summer which captivated the population. New Zealand's GDP was boosted by \$110 million and over 2,000 new jobs were created as we showed off the country to an audience of over a million people.

The FIFA Under-20 World Cup was just as successful. Over 300,000 New Zealanders got behind the tournament by attending matches and visiting fan zones.

Attention now turns to rugby after the Highlanders and Hurricanes contested the first all-New Zealand Super Rugby final since 2006, with the Highlanders emerging victorious.


The All Blacks have already begun their build up to the Rugby World Cup in September and October by playing their first-ever test in Samoa. It was a great atmosphere and chance for New Zealand to strengthen ties with its Pacific neighbours.


We are investing \$3 million in marketing New Zealand exporters to the world through the New Zealand Story programme and the Rugby World Cup. The New Zealand Story is a toolkit which helps exporters from all sectors gain a competitive advantage by building a strong, consistent profile of New Zealand in international markets. It means translating the strong All Blacks brand into long term economic benefits for New Zealand.

The momentum from 2015 is set to continue with the announcement of the 2017 British & Irish Lions tour schedule. More than 20,000 Lions supporters visited in 2005 and the 2017 tour is expected to attract a similar number. No doubt the benefits will be felt across the country.

National is committed to attracting more of these events to New Zealand, giving sports fans, tourism operators and other businesses a chance to show what a great country this is to visit and do business in.









Kaitake Community Board

Did you know there's an important decision looming on the NPDC councillors' horizon? That is the upcoming representation review. The council is required to review its representation arrangements at least once every six years. A review must be publicly notified by the council no later than 31 August in the year before an election - that's August this year!

Consequently council is taking a fresh look at the structure of its elected membership and the way they are elected. This affects the total number of councillors, whether they come from a ward or 'at large' across the district, where the ward boundaries are drawn, and whether or not there are community boards.

Shortly councillors will decide, from a range of possible options, which scenario they prefer and this will then go out to the community for consultation. This is a difficult process for our decision-makers as they have to stand outside 'the representation box' under which they were elected to see if 'the box' should be re-designed and how it can be. However any member of the public can make a written submission on the proposal and the council will then consider all submissions and may well change its initial decision as a result.

Representation is always a hot topic. For example during the 2004 review 416 submissions were received and in 2007 another 153 submissions came in. If a person who makes a submission is not satisfied with the council's final determination they can appeal against it. In both 2004 and 2007 there were a number of objections that ultimately led to a Local Government Commission hearing. The Commission has a quasi-judicial role to determine the best representation arrangements for a local authority, and takes into account the original council decisions, the submissions, appeals and objections. In other words the Commission makes the final, binding decision. In both cases the decision finally arrived at was for the NPDC to have a three ward structure - a North Ward with two councillors and two community boards, a City Ward with ten councillors, and a South West Ward with two councillors and two community boards. This is the current

Prior to 2004 the district to the west of New Plymouth was represented by a councillor, but since then some of our community has been represented by the ten city councillors and the rest has been represented by the two Inglewood councillors. In both instances this loss of local representation is due to elections favouring candidates who come from the area where the majority of the population resides. A number of able local candidates have put their names forward for a seat at the council table since 2004 but have never been able to garner enough votes to get elected.

It is not my brief to persuade anyone which representation scenario is the best fit for those that live between the outskirts of New Plymouth and the Stoney River. However I do urge everyone to take the time to get acquainted with the review information when it becomes available, as the final outcome will certainly impact on us one way or another. I expect the Council to decide on its preferred proposal on 11 August with submissions opening around 22 August and closing in early October.

Well that's it for this month. The next meeting of the Kaitake Community Board will be at the Oakura Hall on Monday 17 August at 4.30pm.

Rare New Zealander Visits Matekai Park

The karearea or New Zealand falcon/bush falcon/sparrow hawk has been spotted in Matekai Park over recent months. Not to be confused with the Kahu or Harrier hawk which is larger (twice the size of a female karearea), much more prolific, flaps its wings, glides then flaps while the karearea has a constant rapid wing beat. They have slightly different plumage too.

The karearea is very rare and most people would not have seen one so the fact there is one visiting Matekai Park is exciting. Graeme Churchill is a regular visitor and caretaker of the park, and has been thrilled to witness the falcon there. It's quite possibly a juvenile coming down from the Kaitake Ranges to feed on sparrows.

The karearea is capable of flying speeds in excess of 100 km/h, can catch prey bigger than itself by watching from a vantage point then making a fast direct flying attack. There are lots of great vantage points in Matekai Park!

The karearea, like all falcons, does not build a nest but makes a scrape in the ground, under a rocky outcrop or in an epiphyte. This has likely led to predation by stoats and other mustelids. Other threats to the karearea are loss of habitat, electrocution, being shot by people and more recently in certain areas - wind farms.

Matekai Park is proving to be a very valuable ecological asset to the area with many rare and unusual birds visiting - last year it was the Kaka.

The diversity of trees has made all the difference says Graeme who has been a strong advocate for exotic trees being introduced as a food source for both birds and bees. Banksia, cherry and gum all flower at different times to natives thereby providing a consistent food source for birds and bees. When these trees are flowering and fruiting the masses of tui, pigeon and bell birds in the park is extraordinary. One neighbour noted more than 55 tui leaving the park at dusk. It certainly is worth a visit to listen to and watch, especially the tui squawking and squabbling in the trees. Keep your eyes open for a very rare visit by the karearea.





Adam Page at TAFT

As part of the regional programme in this year's Taranaki International Arts Festival, multi-instrumentalist Adam Page will be playing one show in Oakura. We spoke to him from his home town in Adelaide, and began by asking if he had any previous connection with Taranaki.

"I played WOMAD a few years ago, both solo and with Band of Thousands (with drummer Riki Gooch). It was a fantastic experience. The Taranaki audience was EPIC. I've also played in Taranaki with Mal Webb and The Adelaide Sax Pack. Both were fantastic shows. But aside from performing, I have a strong connection with the mountain. My first time on the mountain was in the early 2000s and I first circumnavigated Taranaki in 2007. It was one of the hardest and most rewarding experiences of my life. Since then I've been on the mountain three more times. It's the only mountain I talk to when I'm on it, and I've been on a lot of mountains."

For people unfamiliar with your music, what can they expect from a night with Adam?

"Absolutely the unexpected! The style of performance can be described as multi instrumental, improvised, spontaneous compositions . . . but I'm more inclined to describe it as bearded, musical tomfoolery. I love interacting with audiences (in a nonobtrusive way) and feeding from the energy in the room. No two shows are the same . . . although I will probably play my beard each show. Seriously."

Page has won multiple awards and played festivals worldwide, including the Edinburgh Fringe, Glastonbury and Big Day Out. He's not to be missed at the Oakura Hall on Friday 21 August at 7pm. Markets and Mayhem

As many of you will know I recently travelled to Morocco for a Peta Mathias Culinary Experience and then onto France and Spain for a few weeks.

One aspect of my trip I was looking forward to was visiting producers markets. I have watched many celebrity chefs touring different countries and raving about the markets and for myself, I have enjoyed buying produce from the prime producer.

My first experience of a producers market was in a small village in the Moroccan hinterland called El Kela des Sraghra. It was all very colourful, noisy and aromatic once you have got past the aggressive hawkers who tried to thrust all sorts of gimmicky rubbish on you but should you be brave enough to try and take a photo of them, all sorts of allah's rained down on you!

This first encounter was going well for me, I had developed a good technique of taking photos by holding my SLR down at my waist and shooting from there without being detected and abused. But then we came to the "meat" section - all sorts of dead animals in all sorts of states - carcasses, bits, guts, blood, bones, skins and organs. I had to make a mad dash from the market heaving my "guts" out! And I'm not the squeamish sort!

Our next market was in Marrakech at the indoor Jewish market where our cooking group went with Peta to buy

our lunch ingredients which we were then going to cook in a Riad in the Medina. Not far into the market we had to go past the chicken section - live chickens, dead chickens, bits of chickens - feathers, legs, guts and poop. I bravely put my hand over my nose and with my head down charged through to the fresh vegetables, flowers, and spices. I focussed on these lovely sights but then we had to go to the fish section. This was back beside the chickens. I didn't last inside long enough to see any fish and again went hurtling from the market heaving my intestines out with tears running down my cheeks. Unfortunately standing on the sidewalk in Marrakech isn't always a pleasant experience with not so lovely smells wafting up from the sewers but it was the lesser of the two evils! Nothing would have got me back in a producers market in Morocco after that. In Jeema el Fna, the world famous market of Marrakech we visited a meat stall where the butcher has a five foot brick lined hole (a tandir) in which he lights a fire then suspends a whole lamb from a hook, covers it and leaves to cook for hours. You eat it hot from the hole with cumin infused salt - quite delicious if you don't look at the legs of lambs hanging from the roof! But at least it was outdoors!

In France we spent a week barging along the Canal du Midi and our guide took us to a couple of markets to buy ingredients for various meals and to eat lunch on one occasion. These experiences were much more pleasant and inspiring, not so smelly and no body parts lying around. It made me wish we had similar markets here - there's nothing quite like buying your cheese from a man who passionately believes in his product and enjoys the process of selling it to you.

The fish market in Valras Plage, Beziers was a quick visit for me as the smells had me reliving Morocco but it's fair to say markets in France are 'different' - better than Morocco. We stopped for lunch one day in the village of Gordes whilst a market was in full swing. The village was heaving with stalls, people and cars. We sat and ate our lunch on the only available space - the statue right in the middle of the square and as is the case everywhere in France, dozens of Asians photographed the statue and they now have me stuffing my face with delicious pastries - love photo bombing those Asians!

In Barcelona we ventured into the Magic Carpet Market of Santa Catarina - the Iberico ham displays were awesome and no smell! You can hardly see the shopkeeper for hams. The only market we went to in Paris is being understated



Back it is to Countdown Superstore and mediocrity, but I suppose I won't be running from the store with my hand over my mouth and tears running down my cheeks!




