

Hi folks!

Christmas is just a handful of weeks away – and I can't wait! I really enjoy the Christmas season as it's a chance to step back from the daily rush and spend time with family and friends.

And because there is no place in New Zealand that can beat it, I'll be relaxing at Oakura Beach with the family again this summer. If you see me on my daily run along the beach, don't hesitate to run with me for a chat!

It's fantastic news that, just as summer arrives, the Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE) has awarded Oakura Beach Blue Flag status for the third year in a row. Both Oakura and Fitzroy/East End are standouts in this regard: While there are 3,450 beaches and marinas in 41 countries with Blue Flags this year, our two are the only accredited beaches in the wider South Pacific. Not only does that give us a leg-up in the eco tourism stakes, but it's great for locals to know that their favourite beach has been judged environmentally sound by an independent group.

One thing we are working on – along with Taranaki Regional Council (TRC), the Department of Conservation and the Taranaki District Health Board – is the water quality of Waimoku Stream. We know there's a problem with E. coli in the stream, and TRC is monitoring the situation closely. However, FEE has said this does not affect Oakura's Blue Flag status. One thing that will be done this year is to cut the stream's channel right across the beach rather than letting it travel along the beach (as it has done on occasions in the past), so that the stream's water reaches the sea quickly and gets diluted as soon as possible. We're also all working on other mitigation issues to improve the Waimoku Stream environment.

We have a lifestyle here that is second to none, and our goal is to manage our landscape so that future generations will also be able to enjoy the very things that we cherish about our coastal areas.

Dear Editor

I wish to clarify one point from your article in the last edition regarding the storage of sewerage at Shearer Reserve. Sewerage will not be stored at the site for any significant length of time except in emergencies (such as power failure). A large separate emergency storage tank is provided for this purpose.

During normal operation, sewerage will be contained in a separate "wet well" which is emptied multiple times over a 24 hour period – more frequently during the peak inflow hours of morning and early evening, and less frequently during the guieter inflow hours of the afternoon and overnight.

Meanwhile, the contractor has completed construction and the site will be grassed for summer. Landscape planting will be carried out next autumn.

When it comes to Oakura's storm water system, remember this simple message:


Only rain goes in the drain!


"Whatever washes into the roadside drains ends up in the Tasman Sea," says Manager Water and Wastes, Brent Manning. "Detergent from washing a car, gravel and dirt from waterblasting, and rubbish swept along the gutters will all wash onto Oakura Beach and into the sea – so please take care to let only rain go into our roadside drains."

One tip is to wash cars on lawns to let the detergent and water soak into the soil.

Plastic drink bottles, chip packets and other litter cause a particular problem in Oakura. When a big rainfall arrives, all of the litter is washed into the storm water system, flushed through the drains and left scattered along the beach.

"Please dispose of rubbish in the bins provided – and if the bins are full, take your rubbish home for disposal or recycling," says Brent. "Rubbish on the beach is always unsightly and presents a danger to wildlife, so keep in mind that everything loose will end up in the sea."







The Year in Review

It is now that time of the year when we are getting either reruns or reality TV shows on television in an effort to provide entertainment until the Christmas Shows make an appearance. For me, looking back on the last 12 months as a new MP balancing my time between New Plymouth and Wellington, it has been a steep learning curve. Serving on select committees, attending procedures and caucus meetings, as well as being present in the debating chamber accounts for the majority of my time when the house is sitting. Locally, I have hosted eight visiting MPs, including the Prime Minister John Key and the Minister of Finance Bill English, as well as a number of morning teas for community groups.

It is also a time to look back at what has occurred during the past 12 months since National was elected. If you are viewing the parliamentary year as a "rerun" you will see that whether you're a small business owner, a graduate looking for a job, or someone at home making ends meet, this economic downturn has been tough. This has been a worldwide recession but it has been felt very much at a local level.

Faced with the worst economic downturn in decades, the National led Government took the necessary steps to support jobs and families, and created the environment that gave businesses the confidence to maintain and create new jobs.

Our ReStart package gives assistance to those who have lost their jobs during the economic downturn and with additional assistance given through government agencies, jobs have been created through our home insulation package, and bringing forward infrastructure projects.

We have maintained Superannuation entitlements, benefits for low income families, and Working for Families assistance, as it's important to give people certainty at a time of economic uncertainty.

There are signs that the economy is coming out of the downturn, however, the road to recovery will be quite bumpy and this is reflected in the financial statements issued recently. Certainly, the impact of the recession on the Government's revenue will be felt for some time.

We have already started streamlining the Resource Management Act, which will make it easier to do business. The tax cuts we delivered this year have helped put more money into the pockets of workers and our small business package put in place a range of initiatives to reduce compliance costs, help keep up cashflow, and help businesses retain staff.

We need to continue this step change by cutting the red tape that restricts business growth and prosperity, investing in productive infrastructure, delivering better, smarter public services, lifting education and skills, pursuing innovation and business assistance, and ensuring our tax system promotes economic growth. All of this will be the focus of Budget 2010.

This is my last column for 2009. I want to wish everyone a happy and safe Christmas, hopefully to be shared with family and friends.

Several activities that were in the pipeline last month have recently been completed.

The Blue Flag has been officially raised once again on the Oakura beachfront. The committee is tasked with coordinating the environmental management of the beach and held its inaugural meeting recently.

National experts from The Dunes Restoration Trust held an all day workshop about natural dune form and function along our coastline, and the role native plants play as natural sand binders in dune maintenance or restoration. The Trust was formed in 2007 to continue the work of the Coastal Dune Vegetation Network. Organisations and individuals are involved in the Trust, including regional and district councils, research agencies, forestry companies, tertiary education institutes, iwi, consultants, plant nurseries, and community groups such as Beach Care and Coast Care.

The Trust provides a network for information exchange on sustainable management on dune ecosystems. It also facilitates research on dune ecosystems and promotes public awareness of proven methods for protection, restoration, conservation and sustainable management of them.

Dunes are the natural buffer between the land and sea. Over the past few years there have been regular indigenous plantings along the foreshore with Oakura School students, under the watchful eye of Council and DOC staff, carrying out most of the work. Long-time resident and local teacher, Ray Priest, has been the major influence in facilitating these learning experiences for the children, many of whom may well end up as the next generation of residents here.

Construction of the sewerage project is complete and it is almost ready for commissioning. Approximately 38km of sewer pipelines, including a pumping main from Oakura to New Plymouth and gravity reticulation within Oakura, as well as five pump stations have been constructed. The sewerage will be pumped via the pipeline along State Highway 45, finally ending up in the New Plymouth Wastewater Treatment Plant for treatment along with the city's wastewater. There have been many issues since the project was first mooted, but I am sure most will agree what a demanding task Council and contractors have had in retrofitting this underground network within the existing village. Council has a duty to avoid, remedy or mitigate any adverse effects on the environment caused by activities under its control, and I believe the standard of control technology and containment measures used in the sewerage system to meet that duty are particularly robust.

Meetings were held with the Oakura Hall Committee and with Okato residents regarding the future of Hempton Hall. The Community Board needs to establish how each hall relates to the community's recreation needs. This is part of the process

we are carrying out in developing a submission on the Council's Community Halls Review. The purpose of the review is to look at the existing use of halls throughout the district and outline opportunities for the future use of each hall, improving or rationalising their management and confirming Council's levels of funding; and to document what the users of halls can expect from the Council during the coming years. Prior to the submission close off, an extraordinary KCB meeting will be held to validate our presentation.

On behalf of Keith, Al and Mike I wish all TOM readers a merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year and do spend plenty of time enjoying our great local environment over the coming summer months.

Except for vehicles launching and landing recreational and fishing boats, providing that the vehicle leaves the beach immediately upon the launch or landing of the boat."

Artist surfer adds to growing surf culture in Fitzroy

Recently at Strandon a few new businesses have made an appearance. One quietly getting established in the local area is owned by surfer and artist Brian Clark a local from Oakura, who has opened a surf shop BC Surf Shack.

Brian who is originally from San Clemente which is about an hour south of Los Angeles has lived in New Zealand for the last 10 years. He and his wife Vincenza along with daughters Leah and Jessica moved to Taranaki two years ago after living in Whangarei for eight years.

Starting the surf shop has been an idea he has had for a while. But this won't just be a surf shop, it will also an art studio, a gallery and a base for the graphic design work he does. Brian completed a BA in Visual Arts at Northland Polytechnic and went on to teach computer graphics at the Poly tech for three and a half years. The shop in Strandon allows him to have the three dedicated work spaces for what he will be doing there.

This isn't the first surf shop Brian has owned, he had one in the US and started making surfboards in 1976. He still likes to surf competitively and recently won for the second consecutive year the over 50's section in the Del Festival of Long boards at Labour weekend. He surfs any length board from a 5' 10" fish through to a 9' 6" long board and his shop stocks boards for both the short and long board enthusiast.

Brian has been steadily getting his stock of clothing and surfboards ready to sell. He shapes and airbrushes at the Strandon site but gets the boards glassed by CSA. The shop has a rustic feel and is more like surf shops of days gone by. This was a deliberate move by Brian who wanted that kind of lived in welcoming feel to the shop, there's plenty to look at too with lots of surfing memorabilia on display. Some of his art work graces the walls and particularly eye catching is an oil painting of a Tahitian woman done in Gauguins style with influences of Manet too. Brian plans to have more art on display as well as doing commission work. A lot of the art he is producing now involves using objects such as souvenirs from the South Pacific. This has involved searching things out at places like second hand stores to find these pieces that were once a treasure to someone but are now discarded, things that perhaps people bought whilst on a holiday in a tropical 'paradise'. The objects that he finds become part of the artwork either as they are or sometimes he paints over them. He described how his style of art came about "The luxury of looking at past representations in art has afforded me the chance to question the meaning of beauty and ideas we hold about paradise" A collection of this work will be the basis of his next exhibition 'Paradise' which I'm sure will interest both surfers and non surfers alike.

The mad keen cycling duo packed their road bikes into cases and headed to Europe for what was their first ever trip to the continent.

It would be stating the obvious to say the reason for the trip was to experience one of the greatest if not the greatest road bike race in the world. The Tour de France is also one of the biggest staged events in the world and to be part of it was a dream come true for Paul.

But the trip started well before any bike was pulled apart and folded into a case, it started with "Uncle Google", the friendly helpful know-it-all of everything. Paul and Trevor spent many long and happy hours researching and planning their trip. Along the way they received many helpful tips from others who had followed the Tour de France and with the magic of the internet they managed to put together a very creditable tour package. Of which, there were no major hiccups on the trip.


The itinerary was an action packed full on two and half weeks starting in Paris.

The plan was simple and that was to follow the tour for a day then shoot off and do their own thing by biking parts of the route and sightseeing then rejoin the tour and be part of the spectacle again. Paul said they did a lot of it "on the fly" and not having children (or wives!) in tow made it easier as they had freedom to do their own thing.

The pair travelled 3000 kilometres in the two and half weeks and got to see what Paul describes as "little" France, that is the smaller villages and back roads that organised tour groups probably don't see. They would often stay in a small village up to two hours away from the Tour de France stage, mainly because everything is booked out close to each stage but this meant they got to experience great hospitality, great food and great scenery (the thousand or so photos would indicate this!).

Everyday Paul and Trevor got their bikes out and did a ride and one particular highlight is biking the notorious Mont Ventoux which is nearly three quarters as high as Mt Taranaki but hellishly steep. They did it in two and quarter hours where as the Tour de France riders do it in one hour! But they did it! They also spent a few hours in the early morning biking around Paris, sightseeing

at all the famous landmarks of Paris. Paul says they were never bored and he would definitely go back again.

The Tour de France is a huge event with world wide television audiences and hundreds of thousands of spectators. Paul and Trevor would have to wait at the roadside to see the Tour riders go by anything from five hours before the riders were due to go through – such was the interest in each stage.

Another eye opener for the two men was the level of marketing and promotion going on around the actual tour. Buses, cars and trucks are all out hawking their companies goods and on a daily basis you can receive numerous giveaways.

Above all DO NOT ring the directors Ross, Rose, Maryanne or Claire, as they are taking a step back from the front and employing Francoise and Nico; two personable garçon who know their tear-jerking dramas from their chick flicks.

It looks pretty exciting if you take a step back and eyeball the schedule. Faced with a glut of movies that haven't shown EVER in Taranaki, at least not since Chewbacca was negotiating floating mortgage rates, Arthouse did what it does best and just rolled over and faced the wall and said YES, why not? Accordingly, Oakura film buffs will have to tolerate such obscure goodies as an opening night starring Ben Kingsley and Penelope Cruz in an illicit romance (*Elegy*); some call it a meditation on aging and desire, others an apologia for randy older men — all call it Cruz's best performance to date. Hard on the heels of this disturbingly smart story about love and mortality comes Sunshine Cleaning, where the high-school cheerleading captain now finds herself a thirtysomething single mother... persuaded to go into the crime scene clean-up business with her sister. An eccentric comedy drama that is a solid indie effort. Remember Colin Firth? Granny undies? Damp lakes? Large sidies? He makes a comeback in Easy Virtue, written by the creator of Priscilla Queen of the Desert, in a period romantic comedy that takes an under-the-brisket stab at the British upper crust — did I mention Kristin Scott Thomas?

Lest you wonder what is going on here, I will enumerate the lovely fare for you... The girls really enjoyed their trips away to Cambridge, with a huge part of the St Peters school grounds dominated by horses and all things equestrian.



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

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TOM Girlz Garden of the Month –Peas for Tea

This month TOM begins a new column about gardens, and The Girlz Garden Centre will give the featured garden a \$10 garden voucher to be spent at their garden centre. The featured garden may not necessarily be an award-winning garden but it will be one that has caught my eye. It may be a colourful corner or an interesting plant so I hope you enjoy the peek over the neighbours' fence!

Aren't fresh garden peas the epitome of summer and Christmas? Shelling the peas was always a Christmas morning job and, to this day, fresh peas speak of luxury and indulgence to me. Mike Vickers of Hussey St shared one of his first pea pods with me recently when I went along to talk vegetables with him. For Mike has a prodigious vege patch. It is orderly, varied, weed free, healthy and flourishing.

Vegetable gardening has had a bit of a rediscovery lately, but it is a lifetime activity for Mike who began gardening while still at Omata School probably 60 years ago. In those days school gardening was the norm and each child got a packet of seeds, which they took home and grew. A panel of judges came around and appraised each child's efforts and awarded the best garden prize, not that Mike remembers ever winning. As a child growing up back then, every family grew a garden and now Mike's own children grow their own gardens too.

What keeps Mike in the garden is the delight of fresh vegetables, and only when his own are not producing do Mike and wife Val resort to store bought veges. There is also the attraction of heading out to the vege patch and relaxing amongst the potatoes and tomatoes at the end of a busy and often stressful (past tense) day of being a public figure (nine years on Council). This is one of Mike's gardening tips: Talk to your veges to make them grow! I wonder what he said to them?

Deeper down, there is a much more sticky secret to a fruitful harvest and that is burying dead fish carcasses (and probably much more than a fish or two), into which the veges send their roots. I must say the soil was friable, free flowing and the kind you want to run through your fingers, fish scales excepted!

On offer the day I visited were an almighty selection of peas, tomatoes (Mike rates Beefsteak as one of his favourites), corn, gourmet lettuces, iceberg lettuce, beetroot, cabbages, Brussels sprouts, leeks, red onions, Pukekohe Long Keepers (white onions), tiger beans (a yellow bean with purple blotches) and cauliflower (including a cheddar variety — yellow heads and you don't need cheese sauce!). Mike rates new potatoes served with lashings of butter and fresh mint as his ultimate garden



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vegetable. He grows a year's supply along at his son Bryce's place too.

An interesting fact I unearthed while talking to Mike and Val was that their garden (and house) are located on what was once Oakura's tennis courts — more than 50 years ago. They brought in the topsoil and Mike's rubbish has done the rest in producing his bumper crops. Speaking of bumper crops, Mike tells me he once supplied television gardening personality, James Sterling, with a bag of his spuds following the said gardener sampling them at the Taranaki Bowling Open, for which Mike supplied the potatoes.





By Golly that's a Cauli!

Robbie Penwarden of Oakura sure knows how to grow cauli's and all vegetables for that matter. He rang me recently to come and see his gigantic specimen and it was indeed impressive, but you would have to like cauliflower a lot to get through this vege. Robbie says he free flows it and freezes it to use throughout the year.

His giant cauli weighed in at four and a half kilograms and measured 35cm by 40cm. The variety is White Cloud.

Robbie thinks his cauli's grow so well because of the homemade compost he uses and a dressing of blood and bone.





A Little Bit of India in Oakura


Ziji Day Spa has gone a little bit Indian with their specialising in Indian head massages.




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Artistic Flair At Coastal Taranaki School

Any of you who have driven past or head to the junior side of the school will have seen the fantastic wall of art outside the Oxford Road entrance.

This amazing piece of art has been initiated by local artist and Arts Co-ordinator at school, Karla Jorgensen. Whilst looking on the website for funding opportunities, Karla came across the Artists in Schools Programme, funded by the Ministry of Education. "This was the perfect opportunity to see art displayed around the school and brighten up the area," says Karla.

Karla, along with another local artist, Ché Rogers, and art teacher, Sandi Hickey, all had to apply in writing for the application to be valid. "I was over the moon when we were notified that the full \$10,500 had been granted. Ché and I were very excited to work with the students on such an amazing project," says Karla.

The Ministry of Education advisor, Jan Bolwell from Massey, was assigned to the project and was there throughout the process to explain or answer any queries that Karla or Ché had. "Jan was very supportive," says Karla.

Karla and Ché discussed their ideas for the mural with the art teachers and classroom teachers. Teachers then chose two students from each class in Years 4–9 to be involved in this exciting project. The fortunate participants were predominantly chosen for their creative flair, ability to work well, and responsibility within a group.

One of our local Okato home-school students was also asked to participate.

"The aim of this project, besides adding colour to the school, was to teach the students the processes involved in creating a mural and how to apply art on such a large scale. The kids really enjoyed the experience and were very committed," says Karla.

"I thought it was really cool to be able to paint something on the wall, and in the future, if I have children they will be able to see what we painted," says Brittaney Carr, one of the students involved in the project.

Term Two involved Karla and Ché working with students to understand the processes. Students then designed their own patterns for the mural. Patterns were to complement an overall composition based on our environment, culture, the lines and angles within the school, and colour scheme. Ché used ideas from the group, based on these themes, to create the overall layout of the design and rainbow colour sequence.

Term Three was the fun part where the students put their designs and patterns on the wall. Karla relates that the weather was not always on their side, resulting in a delay in the timeframe, and they were granted an extension. Karla also explains that many students worked on the mural outside of school hours and this showed their passion and dedication towards the project. You guys were fantastic.

There are many images relating to Taranaki portrayed in the mural: the lahars, Taranaki surf, black sand and stones, the windwand, an aerial view of the mountain, our coastal students, and more. The patterns designed by the students enhance these overall images representing their own personal views. Students covered such issues as: our responsibility to the environment and the human effect on it, represented by fish and trees and plants; jandals and the star people relate to the human aspects within our community; the gumboots represent the farming aspect; art within our community and the surf were also portrayed as well as other aspects of our scenery. A plaque will be placed beside the mural stating that it was unveiled by Governor General Sir Anand Satyanand on 29 November 2009, along with the artists' and students' names.

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
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
