




Recently when I talked with Tracey Lusk about her experience in Cyprus with her young son Joe who had won a trip there as a Young Reporter for the

Hello everyone.

We are in the final busy weeks before the Christmas and New Year break. After a cold November I'm crossing my fingers that summer arrives with fine, warm days for us all to enjoy.

Throughout this year New Plymouth District Council has dealt with many big issues, including the recent moves to improve Maori representation on the Council.

Our many projects have included delivering an Annual Plan for 2014/15, developing policies for commercial leases on public spaces and for managing open spaces, sports and recreation areas, developing an integrated approach to managing coastal erosion, continuing to assess public buildings against earthquake standards, and developing a new water supply for Okato.

We are also well into our work for drafting the Long-Term Plan 2015-2025 (LTP).

There has been a fair bit of publicity about the latter, especially around the proposal that NPDC caps its general rates at an average of three per cent over the 10 years of the LTP and what affect that might have on Council services and facilities.

I want to make it clear that no decisions have been made on this yet – and none will be made until after public consultation in the first half of next year.

Between now and then the Council will develop a clear set of proposals for the community to consider, and everyone will have a chance to have their say.

In the meantime, we have a great summer of events ahead of us!

Summer at the Bowl has kicked off with the recent concert by The Seekers at the TSB Bowl of Brooklands. This will be followed by Christmas the Bowl (14 December), Moorhouse and Nomad in concert (15 January – free as part of the TSB Bank Festival of Lights), Sting and Paul Simon (31 January), the short-film festival Tropfest (14 February), Sol3 Mio (28 February) and Womad (13-15 March).

We also have the TSB Bank Festival of Lights starting on 14 December with its very popular Summer Scene daytime activities and On Stage evening performances – keep an eye out for the full programme in your mailbox!

But most of all we have a fantastic environment to enjoy, from our beaches and mountain to the native bush and walkways.

I hope you get out into our wonderful landscape with family and friends this summer and make the most of our great lifestyle here in Taranaki.

# Sewage Spill Concerns Locals

The pump station started discharging sewage into the environment late in the evening of Sunday 16 November. By the time the pump was made operational again on Monday morning an estimated 140m3 of sewage was discharged into the environment – much less than originally believed – and 580m3 was retained in the emergency storage.

NPDC is investigating the cause of the pump failure, and a report is being prepared for delivery to Taranaki Regional Council.

We have brought in the 'no swimming' signs on the advice of the Taranaki District Health Board and will leave the shellfish signs out until 15 December.

### Kaitake Community Board

Well another year is drawing to a close and the festive season is just around the corner. Let's hope the weather shows a dramatic improvement by then! We seem to have had all the seasons rolled into one during the past month or so.

It has been a particularly busy year for your community board. As elected representatives we get involved in many local community issues that need resolving. Some can be fixed as simply as a phone call or email, while others can follow a more protracted course to reach a resolution. It must be said that we do get a degree of quiet satisfaction when something is worked through to a positive conclusion for those involved.

The varied nature of the community board's role means we have to be proactive as well, and anticipate council strategies and policies that may have a future impact on our community. In doing that we frequently assist with the initiation and facilitation of community development initiatives and spend a great deal of time liaising with council officers who are responsible for taking action and reporting back to the decision makers around the Council table.

Several large initiatives have been a focus this year. First, the development of an Oakura Community Emergency Plan is nearing its final phase. The plan will provide a manual for local residents when there is a major emergency event in the community. The national Civil Defence policy is based on all residents being prepared to be self-sufficient for three days following an emergency so the local plan, developed under the able chairmanship of Mike Pillette aims to increase community awareness, understanding, and preparedness about what to do when an event happens. To that end the plan centres on individual and community responsibility and self-reliance.

Another has been the setting up of a focus group to be involved in the implementation of the Oakura Structure Plan. This representative group has been brought together to be involved in all the important discussions related to the strategic development of Oakura. The Oakura Structure Plan was completed in 2008 and this next stage is still in early gestation but is expected to increase in momentum in the New Year. 2015 will see the completion of the Council's 10 Year Plan, the 30 Year Asset Management Plan, and the District Plan Review. These will result in a district-wide blueprint that will have major ramifications for our community going forward.

We have also initiated and supported the setting up of ground leases for sport bodies using the Okato Domain. The leases are for 20 years with a right of renewal for a further 10 years with an initial concessional rental of a dollar per annum. This is a positive outcome for all concerned.

The board regularly makes formal submissions to Council on a range of policy issues. Our latest was on its draft Significance and Engagement Policy. The purpose of this policy is to provide clarity for the New Plymouth District community on how the Council engages with them in various levels of its decision-making processes. Therefore it is crucial that the policy gives individuals and community groups a direct, transparent route to reach the core of the council decision-making process in a way that cannot be ignored. We believe that this policy must provide the first

line of defence against the risk of decision-making from an organisational perspective.

Currently we are considering our submission on the draft Recreation and Open Space Strategy. This considers a range of issues, including the recreation, sport and leisure needs of the community and emerging trends, high performance sport needs, connectivity and use of open space for community accessibility, regional biodiversity objectives, and local identity and sense of place amenity values.

Next year we will be submitting on the Council's Coastal Erosion Strategy. Council has determined it will take an integrated approach to managing coastal erosion and its plan will be of keen interest to many of us. Generally the public has shown little interest in coastal erosion but over the past few years there has been a major change in the public mind, caused by the continuing urbanisation of coastal beach areas.

Most of issues and actions I have mentioned are closely linked so staying in tune with all of them is most important if we are to have local community input into the final decisions of Council.

Obviously the board is not the only organisation that is out there working for the community. Take a moment to reflect on the excellent job others have done on our behalf this year. Our sporting organisations rely on many volunteers to keep things humming, fire service volunteers consistently practise to be ready for any eventuality, all the CBD businesses continue to provide a fine service for us, we have a great hall (thanks Vicky), a great library, and great early childhood centres and schools. We have committed folk organising the Okato 150th Jubilee next year, others organising the Oakura School 150th the following year, and the New Year's Day Carnival Committee is hard at it. The list goes on and on and on! I acknowledge everyone's immeasurable input that adds value to the lives of all residents and thank you sincerely for it.

On behalf of Keith, Paul, Mike and our appointed councillor Richard I wish all TOM readers a merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year and hope you can spend lots of quality family time enjoying our great local environment over the coming summer months.

The next meeting of the Kaitake Community Board will be in Okato, at Hempton Hall on Monday January 19 at 7pm.

2014 has been a huge year on the political stage with a shocking election campaign, followed by a solid election result. I've met people all over the electorate, some traditional Labour supporters, who just did not want to see New Zealand lurch to the left, with the help of people like Kim Dotcom - and so voted for National's solid performance to continue.

That solid economic management has meant New Zealanders are better off than the people in most other countries in the world. Inflation is low, interest rates remain low, employment is increasing and wages are rising faster than inflation. People are having real opportunity to

None of this is easy, as we all know when it comes to balance our own weekly budget. And with Christmas just around the corner, every little bit helps.

Recently we established the South Korea- New Zealand Free Trade Agreement, which will benefit New Zealand businesses by over \$65 million in the first year alone. Trade relationships are key to New Zealand's success.

We are a trading nation. 85% of what we manufacture is exported. This is critically important for the Taranaki region. Our rural areas, towns and cities depend on a strong export industry to maintain and grow our economies.

The Trans Pacific Partnership Agreement (TPPA) negotiations are important for Taranaki because this agreement has the potential of opening up the lucrative markets of Japan and the USA to our exports, although right now it's looking difficult to see dairy included, which for us is very important that it is.

The TPPA aims to create a regional free trade agreement involving 12 Asia Pacific countries: Australia, Brunei, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Peru, Singapore, the United States, Viet Nam, Mexico, Canada, and New Zealand.

TPPA countries account for 45 per cent of New Zealand's total trade, and 5 of New Zealand's top 10 trading partners are included. The 12 participating economies account for US\$27 trillion in GDP and over 800 million potential customers. The US is the world's largest economy, with over 300 million consumers. A Free Trade Agreement with the US has been one of New Zealand's top trade policy goals for many years.

The National government has been hard at work in its first six years to build these trading relationships. It is what has

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protected us during the global financial crisis and what will keep us as a first world nation, supporting world class education and healthcare, and more jobs and better paying jobs.

There are a couple of important attitudes for us to have this Christmas season. I hope your Christmas and New Year are times of both appreciation and a confident step forward. ### OAKURA COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE

The planning committee met recently to test components of our plan with the assistance of Civil Defence personnel. The desktop exercise involved Civil Defence placing us in an emergency scenario where we had to react appropriately and within the guidelines of our plan. The scenario had us dealing with a tornado that had made landfall at the bottom of Wairau Road at 5.30pm and worked its way in NE direction, finally petering out at the Main Road/Dixon Street intersection — a scenario the village isn't unaccustomed to unfortunately.

As the exercise progressed, the committee discussed in-depth the sorts of things that would definitely happen and those that were a possibility and how we, in liaison with the Emergency Services, would react to them. It was interesting to note that because the scenario indicated significant damage at the Main Road intersection, this would have hampered the movement of some key personnel. Matt Crabtree, our Fire Chief indicated that if this was to happen he may only have four members of the brigade available to him and because of the storage of gas cylinders at the petrol station, the possible evacuation of a good part of the village would have been necessary. Food for thought for all of us!

After two hours we all agreed that we needed to tweak our plan a little bit and that the roles the committee members play in such an emergency were pretty much established. We hope we never have to put them into practise for real, but not being prepared is not an option for us.

We are putting the final touches to the public version of the plan, and hopefully with the assistance of Civil Defence, this will be available to us in the New Year. In the meantime please make sure you all have your own plan in the event of an emergency, especially enough food and drink etc. for a minimum of three days and we urge you to follow the guidelines in your telephone book. The committee will continue to meet on a quarterly basis to keep refreshed and to work through other emergency scenarios.

#### **CELEBRATING 80 YEARS OF GOLF 28 MARCH 2015**

The first golf course to be used by the Kaitake Golf Club was established on the corner of the Main Rd and lower Weld Rd in 1935. The course was established on the properties of Mr Dave Harvey and Mrs Les Goodwin. It was a 9 hole course and a par 36.

The course was designed by Frank Quin who was a professional at Ngamotu Golf Club. Voluntary labour by enthusiastic members laid out the course and when completed Mr Quin invited Mr D.V. Sutherland (a new member) to try out the course. It was declared a success and only one hole was altered.

The first president elected was Mr Frank Badley. On opening day the Headmaster of Oakura School, Mr Harry Till was invited to open the course.

Wishing her luck in the last contest of the year. By the time this TOM issue appears all will decided - go Kiwi's.





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# Riding for the Disabled

#### – AN OASIS IN THE BUSH

One wet day (not unusual was it!) in November I visited the Riding for the Disabled Group for the first time and was very surprised by how beautiful the location was.

They are located just off Poplar Grove on Alba St amidst native forest and well established trees, gardens and arena. The horses graze along Barrett Domain for which the group has a grazing licence from NPDC. It is a very tranquil and inspiring place.

Riding for the Disabled is a national charity whose core purpose is to provide interaction with horses for children and adults with physical, intellectual, emotional and social challenges and to develop increased ability, independence and self esteem.

The New Plymouth Riding for the Disabled branch has a long history and is one of the biggest branches in New Zealand. The group traces its history back to Omata and the property of a Zym Machnacki (property just outside the New Plymouth boundary above the Herekawe Stream). He ran the Carpathian Riding School more than 40 years ago from this property and following his death left a bequest that has helped establish the Riding for the Disabled – an endeavour Zym was passionate about and many others like him who understood the therapeutic benefits of horse riding. In 1981 land was acquired from the Council at Barrett's

Domain and fundraising was carried out to fence, build an arena, stables and develop the pastures. The RDA was officially opened on 30 October 1982 by the Deputy Mayor Mr Ron Barclay. The group has continued to grow since that day.

An independent committee is responsible for running the charity and it complies with the NZRDA operating standards and values. Volunteers provide much needed assistance with the horses, the children, the grounds and administration. Local businesses and families have also provided much needed funding through sponsorship and community grants. Each of the nine horses has an individual sponsor and the contributions from sponsors help meet the regular costs of looking after these horses. Many of the business sponsors have been involved for a very long time -25 years and currently there are 11 business sponsors.

#### LET'S MEET THE HORSES.

Each of the horses has an 'interesting' past and unique personality to which the riders are matched. The oldest horse is Maiden (23 years), there's also Smudge, Deanna, Cricket, Buddy, Toby, Muddy, Pippin and Peggy. None of them appreciated the wet weather the day I visited!

#### LET'S MEET THE VOLUNTEERS.

Probably could say each has an 'interesting' past and unique personality to which the horses and children are matched! There are more than 35 volunteers so I'll just profile a handful!

Elizabeth Chapman is the Patron and his been involved in RDA for 33 years and has held every position on the committee except Treasurer and has been on the National Council for NZRDA for six years.

Merle Troy is the Head Coach and has been involved since 1997 and Head Coach for four years. Merle manages the programme and mentors the volunteers. All riders are assessed by Merle and Fran and then an individual riding programme set for each rider.

Angela Sands is the Assistant Coach and has been involved since February 2014. Her job is to work with the horses, manage the riding programme and mentor the volunteers. She is currently training to meet the NZRDA qualification. Judith Heeley is the Vice President of the committee and has been involved since 2003. She is known as the 'horse woman' and has been riding (and still does) horses for most of her nigh on 80 years! Apparently she is the comedian in the group also (possibly one of many)!

Jenny Pool has been involved as a volunteer for about 18 months. She wanted to be around horses after a long absence but without having to own a horse and RDA satisfies that need. Smudge is her favourite horse.

All of the volunteers have a desire to help make a difference in the lives of others and along the way they get enormous personal satisfaction. The smiles, feedback and comments from the riders and their families make it very worthwhile. A volunteer working with the children or horses needs to have a good empathy for disabled children and or horses, a reasonable level of physical fitness (the walking tracks are long and varied) or if not this then administration, fundraising skills, or cleaning tack, doing gardening but generally a desire to work within a group of caring people - age no barrier.

Unfortunately I didn't get to meet any of the riders because the day's session was cancelled due to the weather. There are 64 riders with a waiting list for further riders.

Riders are referred to the school by health professionals and each rider is assessed by therapist Fran Newsome. A goal plan is formulated and reassessed along the way for each rider. Some riders have low needs, some have moderate needs and others are more physically disabled. Their goals may be strengthening of muscles and more control of muscles by being led on a horse or they may be able to canter independently and jump small hurdles or they may just socialise with a horse.

Many different groups of people are associated with the school such as medical students (physiotherapists, occupational therapists) and Gateway students studying towards their equine certificates.

I have discovered that RDA is definitely not a group of people taking kids for a nice stroll around on a pony but rather a highly dedicated group of volunteers who are providing a very specific and enriching therapeutic equestrian programme to children (and adults) with a wide range of disabilities. While everyone does have fun in the multifaceted facility, no one loses sight of the end goal of rehabilitation.

There are many ways we as a community can be involved and the school would love your help: be a volunteer fundraising personnel, horse skills, children skills, cleaning,



and gardening or through sponsorship. If you have a spare hour or two each week that's all it takes. You can leave bequests to the RDA or make regular donations. They have 2015 calendars for sale for \$10.

### **Crop Swap**

We are quickly coming to our last crop swap of the year which will be on December lucky 13. Dee Turner, lecturer at WITT will be speaking on permaculture. So if Crop Swap Oakura is something you've been meaning to do please join us at 4 pm at St James Church Hall. This should be a good one! A few of us are away over summer so if Aileen or Mary decide to run a swap in January they will let you know on Facebook, email, or, if you are not on our contact radar, you will need to watch out for a poster at the 4 Square notice board. Probiotics, as a show and tell topic at November 8th's swap drew a good crowd with lots of stories to tell and things to show. As well as stakes for the garden, seedlings and some veges, kAfirs and sour dough's were present. The idea of ingesting these foods that team with beneficial bacteria and yeasts is that you keep a healthy gut because they start to grow in it. This is the idea of probiotics. A healthy gut flora lessens the chances of bad bugs growing just through competition for space! The acidity level is also changed by good bacteria and so inhibits bad bacteria. Gut microbes produce enzymes that we don't. These enzymes help us to digest food. If we cannot digest certain foods we don't get food value out of them.





Willie Klever, enthusiastic to share news at November 8 Crop Swap about what she called her flowering "penis lily." Apparently it has a pretty flower but smells like a dead horse unless you perform surgery and cut off the long, sticking up appendage. People were warmly invited to come and view her handiwork!

(That is just toooo scary.)

We may even get an aggravated gut and exhibit allergies. Bugs add bulk so their cells add to dietary fibre in keeping you regular. Vitamin K and some B vitamins come directly from gut flora so we need to think about keeping our gut healthy and restocked, especially after a course of antibiotics. If you are not really into these hippy type SCOBYs, symbiotic communities of bacteria and yeast, you can just buy probiotic powder or yummy chewy tablets from the health food shop. We are so lucky to have antibiotics and having access to them is fantastic. I would never suggest to anyone to ignore a doctor's advice to take an antibiotic. I would always however encourage someone to restock their gut afterwards, or even at the same time if you have enough time delay between doses, with a probiotic.

Being proactive when well by taking a probiotic to keep your system healthier is a good idea. It was great to see so many different home grown varieties of probiotic at the crop swap. Happy holidays! Stay well and have fun in the garden this summer.

Joe was the only student from Taranaki to travel to Cyprus along with delegates from Wellington, Tauranga and Auckland. 70 delegates from Portugal, France, Montenegro, Malta, Romania and New Zealand met in Nicosia the capital of Cyprus for a four day workshop.

Joe tells us of his experience:

### Perhaps if we start with a short introduction on how you won the trip - the photos and their meaning.

I was told about four days before the entries were to be entered that the competition was low on entries from NZ and that there was a high chance of winning the prize of going overseas. I decided to do the photography entry and produced in the end a strip of eight photos involving litter around the school. My main thought of the strip was our goal, and tried to show what we wanted to achieve here at Omata.

# How did it feel to win a trip to Cyprus and what is your interest in: Photography; Environmental issues like rubbish and recycling?

I was told that I had won the trip about a month later (when I'd almost forgotten that I had entered) in front of

the school and parents of students in our weekly assembly. I couldn't let off too much excitement but I had an uncontrollable smile and didn't know what to say. I have quite a bit of interest in photography and I feel a good feeling whenever I take a good, professional looking photo. I don't know about it as a job but I think taking photos and making videos of the enviro situation to open people's eyes would be cool.

### What are your impressions of Cyprus and would you go back there again?

Definitely go back again. I loved the heat, food, culture and feel of the city, Nicosia, where we were staying and did most of our conference work. I guess after going to the workshop I did notice the rubbish, but it all seemed to be pushed away in the corners. Not piled up or anything but it was there. Cyprus is also half Turkish controlled and half Greek. There is actually a patrolled wall that you can walk up to and touch but not cross without your passport.

# Describe your experience being involved in the four day workshop - The fellow students you worked with; The locals you were involved with; The organisers/coordinators/speakers of the workshop.

All of the students that won the trip were all really awesome fun and keen to know about NZ! Most countries can speak English now so it was easy to talk and communicate with them. They were all around the 13-17 year old range but there were a couple of 22 year olds and a 12 year old girl. We weren't involved with many locals but they were keen to talk to us. The main organiser, Michael Lerides was very cool. He was good to talk to and he seemed like a father to all of us kids. Haha. He would be taking videos of us and putting on music, buying us food. Lots of food!

### Could you tell us about the area/city you stayed in and how did it differ from Oakura?

It's a very pedestrian-friendly place. All the cars drive slowly around people and there are lots of walking only areas like all the shops. That meant all us kids could walk off and buy food or shop in our free time. We had lots of free time in the afternoons also.

### Tell us some interesting facts about Cyprus that we probably wouldn't know.

Half of the island is Turkish and the other half is Greek. This is because the two countries are very close but neither are connected. The Turkish side is so so so much different from the Greek side in many ways. All the buildings look different, different language, different food and different religion. Though one thing they have in common is that there are lots of cats - everywhere. Some are sick and hungry but others are healthy and looking for food.

### What have learnt about environmental issues such as littering, recycling?

That there are lots of organisations that are set on getting rid of the rubbish and litter and together they cover all the bases. There are ones set on marine litter which is very serious everywhere because it can travel very far in the water. They also focus on litter in streets and landfills.

# How does Cyprus compare with Oakura/Taranaki/New Zealand? Is there something you learnt in Cyprus that we could change here?

Definitely all the pedestrian areas. I think it would be awesome to have some part of Oakura to be made into a space for everyone. Maybe the road that goes along the beach by the skatepark and campsite.

#### What would you recommend about Cyprus and why?

The heat! If you love hot weather like me the heat there is awesome. It's not heavy and it goes through the evening so it's nice and comfortable. And everywhere in Cyprus there is air conditioning if you need to escape. And free WiFi everywhere too!

#### What was your favourite experience in Cyprus?

Swimming in the sea. Some beaches are blue and flat like glass and some have nice swells for surfing and others just totally smash you, if you like that.

#### What sort of food did you eat and did you enjoy it?

There is lots of pork and lamb over there and also nice desserts that are sweet and satisfying and also healthy - said the guy!

# Has your trip changed how you view littering and do you think environmental issues will be something you continue to be interested in in the future?

I don't know if I'll focus my career and life on it but it could be a good hobby to have and do.

in 2013 gaining 159 credits and a NCEA Level 2 Certificate, with an Excellence endorsement.




