### Hi folks!

Well, we finally have had some rain to freshen up the landscape and give our farmers some good news after months of exceptionally dry weather. It's also brought an end to the fire ban, so thank you to everyone for doing your part in helping to keep our homes and natural areas safe during a time when everything was tinder-dry.

While the water restrictions didn't affect Oakura due to the town being supplied from an aquifer, water conservation is a habit that is well worth practicing throughout the year. The less water we use, the less that needs to be treated at the supply plant – which saves money for everyone – and the more that stays in the aquifer for future use.

Meanwhile, the contractors are making great progress on constructing Oakura's reticulated sewerage system. We have four companies working in different areas of the town as they bend their backs to lay the necessary pipes. Such work can create temporary difficulties for residents and visitors, and I appreciate your patience as we continue with this complex but very worthwhile infrastructure project that will bring huge benefits to Oakura.

On another topic, thank you to everyone who has sent in a submission on the draft Budget 08/09. Submissions closed on 2 May and the public hearings will be held in the Council Chamber on 9 and 11 June.

The Council will consider all the submissions on Friday 13 June and make any changes to the draft budget, and then the final version of Budget 08/09 will be adopted on Thursday 26 June.

You are more than welcome to attend any of these meetings and hear the submissions that are made and the debates as they take place, so hopefully I will see you there!

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## GARDENING WITH ROSEMARY HERB May Checklist

### Vegetables:

- Sow broad beans, peas and onions.
- Plant garlic and shallots. Set garlic cloves 2–3cm apart. Shallots 10cm apart with top half of bulb exposed.
- Rosemary has been fortunate enough to have access to wonderful field mushrooms and hopes everyone else has had the benefit of a great muchroom saccon.

### Flowers:

- Last opportunity to plant spring flowering bulbs.
- Dahlia tubers and gladioli corms should be lifted and stored in a cool dry place.
- Plant polyanthus, primula, nemesia, pansies, violas, stock and calendula for early spring flowering.

### Fruit Trees

 Begin pruning fruit trees once leaves have dropped. Paint pruning wounds with Bacseal Pruning Paint to protect the leaf scar and prevent disease.

### Lawns

 Rake over and re-sow bare or thin areas of lawn with Easy Grass or Mow-it-Less lawn seed.

# MP for New Plymouth

### Motorcycle safety package aims to cut high crash

We recently announced measures to reduce the high number of motorcycle casualties on New Zealand roads.

Since 2001, there has been a 28% increase in licensed motorcycles and this figure is expected to grow with predicted rising fuel costs. But, over the same period, there has been a staggering 80% increase in motorcycle casualties.

The package proposes restricting learner and restricted motorcycle licence holders to less powerful motorcycles, changes to the Graduated Driver Licensing System to encourage riders to take up more motorcycle-specific training and the introduction of safer motorcycling practices such as improving the visibility of motorcycle and moped riders to other road users. It also offers further training incentives to novice riders to progress through their licence and puts a cap on the time riders can spend on a learner licence.

Novice motorcyclists face the greatest crash risk. They are paying far too high a price – in 2007, motorcyclists and pillions accounted for 10% of all road fatalities.

In keeping with our intention to shift the focus away from fines to increased demerit points for lawbreaking motorists, motorcyclists will run the risk of 25 demerit points for not wearing a helmet.

The emphasis is on ensuring novice motorcyclists are aware of the increased risks they face on the road and that these riders are well equipped for the responsibility of motorcycle ownership.

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### kaitake community board

On **ANZAC Day** I participated with other Kaitake Board members in the Okato Service. It was another sobering experience for us. The service, which was set up very well indeed by the 85-years-young Oakura resident of many years, Ivor Ellis, attracted a large crowd of all ages to remember those who had made the ultimate sacrifice for us all.

The Board has been busy on a number of separate issues since last reporting. Many of those are connected to the **sewerage project**. I am absolutely sure many more sewerage issues will surface (no pun intended) before the project is finally commissioned. The project, now costed by Council at \$24 million, is massive. A locally funded project as big as this probably only happens once every 15 or so years anywhere in Taranaki — it's huge and as it isn't on a specific public excluded site as major works tend to be, but is literally under everyone's feet and often on their private property, the daily niggles that need addressing are never ending. Everyone begins to focus far more as the project approaches their boundary and the ramifications of what is being done really hits home.

There have been mistakes - lack of information and robust consultation in the early stages has caused a number of downstream concerns. Also making the change from constructing the drainage work within properties and to averaging the cost of this work across owners who were connecting, thus making all connecting fees equal, to leaving property owners to arrange their own connection work was not handled well. Straight away there were perceived winners and losers within the new scenario. There have been issues with inground conditions for the main pump station in Shearer Reserve, meaning it has to be raised up two metres from what was originally intended. This means there will now be fewer gravity fed connections. Two more pump sub-stations are now needed - by the NPOB clubrooms and in the Tasman Parade keyhole reserve. Changes as well have been made to original plans in Hall Terrace due to the aftermath of last year's May flood. All of these and other issues cause angst for individuals and groups within the village.

The Board has also been involved in trying to reach a reasonable solution to provide **public access** between the two walkway bridges over the AhuAhu and Timaru Streams. There have been many twists and turns in this issue over the past few years but we are confident that with some goodwill and common sense (and a little time) an acceptable outcome will eventuate.

Currently we are gearing up for **World Environment Day** on 5 June. World Environment Day is observed annually in more than 100 countries and provides an opportunity to raise awareness and promote action on national environment issues.

Sponsored by the Ministry for the Environment, this event provides a catalyst for the community to make a positive contribution to our local environment in some way. Oakura School will be at the forefront of a week of activities this year, and NPDC, TRC, DoC, the Blue Flag organisation and the Foundation for Environmental Education have all offered their support. There will be a series of activities for local folk to get involved with and we certainly hope you do.

Well, that's it for this issue – the next Kaitake Community Board meeting is on at the NPOB Surf Club on Tuesday 22 June at 4pm.

# Original sewerage design retained for Messenger Terrace

Private sewage pumping stations will still be required for many residents on Oakura's Messenger Terrace, following an investigation of alternative sewerage designs by New Plymouth District Council. "In our view the best solution is for these properties to have private sewage

"in our view the best solution is for these properties to have private sewar, pump stations to connect to the new sewerage network."

On 22 April the Kaitake Community Board meeting also heard that the Oakura sewerage project's cost has risen from \$19.1 million to \$24.27m. The increase will be met by raising additional debt.


Mr Manning says there have been a number of factors behind the price rise. A trial dig of the site for the booster pump station on Shearer Reserve had mixed results. In some areas the ground conditions were better than expected; however an aquifer was identified which makes construction of the pump station at the original depth very risky. Also, the general ground conditions made the construction of deep sewers impractical.

"We are now redesigning these areas to meet the demands of the environment," says Mr Manning.

"We are also constructing two additional small pump stations to serve about 18 sections at both The Key and on Messenger Terrace – for 36 properties in total.

"These factors, along with the actual tendered rates of the construction contracts, have led to the increased project cost."

Of the 691 properties able to link to the sewerage system, the owners of 529 properties have opted to connect.

### Hi all from the Big Red Truck.

Please remember to continue apply due diligence and have the hose handy in case of an emergency. The death of Derek Lovell in the fire at Tamahere, Hamilton has been a sombre reminder of what our firemen and firewomen could face in a fire. The Oakura Fire Brigade extend their deepest sympathies to Derek's family and wish a speedy recovery to those injured in the incident. In remembrance of Derek, the Oakura Brigade stood for one minute's silence in full Level 2 uniform.



# 2008 New Zealand Angling & Casting Nationals

Partner, Grant and I, with our son Jacob, journeyed to the 2008 New Zealand Angling & Casting Association (NZACA) Nationals in Kaitaia a few weeks back. It was a long journey to say the least, although we broke the trip in two and stayed the night at Ruakaka, just south of Whangarei. The next day the rain started on the way to Kaitaia and by the time we got there, it was bucketing down. So we forewent the tent for three days, opting instead for a cabin at the Ahipara Motor Camp at the south end of 90 Mile Beach. The locals were saying *it doesn't normally stay around this long*. With extreme cabin fever and water everywhere, we were tossing up whether to come home, but the rain eventually dissipated and we were able to get out and do a bit of exploring and even get a fish in.

At the AGM I was fortunate enough to be voted in as a full executive member of the NZACA.

We celebrated registration with a couple of beers and marked a few potential hot spots of the Far North. It was absolutely p—ing down again. We had changed camps for the night and were not at all happy – our new tent got quite a hammering although it didn't get wet on the inside. We moved back to the Ahipara Camp as soon as it got light on the first day of the fishing, hence we had a late start, but the weather got better and we decided to fish not too far away from the base. A few small Kahawai and Hiwihiwi made our catch tally for the day and we headed to the weigh-in to sign in at the end of the day. There were literally hundreds of fish, with some big Trev's around the 7kg mark and a few big Snapper around 8kg.

The plan for the next day was inspiring as we were to drive an hour and a half up to Great Exhibition Bay, getting there at about 7-ish. It looked good, but with a big swell we headed to some rocks down a short track. As soon as we got there Grant nailed a 4kg Snapper. Ten minutes later he got another about the same size and by 2.30pm Grant had caught about 15 Snapper and a good Trev'. My count was absolutely 0 and 13 sets of gear had been donated to the Pacific Ocean. I'd had enough and to top this off, when we got back to the car park, I realised I'd left my rod spike down on the rocks so back I went.

Back at the weigh-in there were literally tons of fish being weighed in, most of which went into huge chilly bins that were going to the Marae and local food bank.

The casting event was held on the Saturday morning in a sodden paddock, but the 60 or so casters didn't seem to mind and all seemed to enjoy the day, especially a northern Wairoa man getting a record cast of a massive 218 metres.

The prize giving and dinner that night were all good, with me getting at least something, coming second in the casting event.

A drive out to the Karikari Peninsula the next day saw Jacob and Grant out-fish me again. After 10 days, 2250 kilometres and no fish for me, home was calling so we ambled back the following day.

### Oakura Pony Club News

On 12 and 13 April a team of six pony club riders representing North Taranaki went to the Timberlands event in Tokoroa. Four of the team had clear rounds in the cross country and those four scores helped move the team from third to first place overall! At the conclusion of the event the teams had a mounted parade and prize-giving (see photos). Each winning team member received an engraved silver cup and matching horse covers as well as the large team trophy.

On 15 April two Oakura Pony Club members, Kirstie McLean and Bronte Alder, competed in the Taranaki Secondary Schools Association (TSSA) team's dressage, representing Sacred Heart Girls College. Each team member had to ride two different dressage tests and were placed individually and as a team. The two Sacred Heart teams came 3rd and 5th and overall (placed individually) Kirstie came 2nd in both tests and Bronte came 4th.

On 19 April the Bolstad Family very kindly hosted the Oakura Pony Club End-of-year Gymkhana. The gymkhana started with flat classes (testing things such as pacing and the manners of the ponies) and was followed by a mixed show jumping, cross country and obstacle course. It was a fabulous day – lots of fun with fantastic Oakura weather – which concluded with prize-giving and a shared lunch.

### **TOM** had some other questions for this outstanding young sportsperson . . .

### What does it mean to be sportsperson of the year?

It's great. I was up against some pretty good female riders, all older than me, including Sarah Walker, our Olympic representative.

### How did you achieve this?

I think the World title went a long way toward it as I'm only the fourth Kiwi ever to win a World title in BMX, but I have been pretty consistent this year and gave the boys a run for their money all year.

### What do you have coming up?

I am off to the World's again at the end of May. This year it is in Taiyuan, China, which is about an hour's flight south of Beijing. This year I will race in two bike classes, my 20" in which I won my age group last year and the other is on my new 24" cruiser. Dad went to the track in China about a month ago and said it was not the best place to hold it but we will cope.

### What are your current goals?

To do well in both classes in China. Next season I want to race in the super class series again with the boys. I'll be at the older end of that class so should be up in the top five riders. You race for cash in the super class!

### Still On Top – The Greatest Hits

Van Morrison (Exile/Universal)

A glorious recording career spanning over forty years and dozens of albums (several of which are genuine classics) leaves the novice buyer the near-impossible task in settling on a Van Morrison "starter pack". Few artists have built up a more impressive body of work than the artist often referred to as "Van The Man", but having split his output across several companies, his previous label-specific collections have been somewhat restricted in range.

As the first compilation to cherry-pick highlights across five decades, Still On Top has effectively taken the anxiety out of buying Van Morrison. This non-chronological, two-disc set includes Van's first R & B infused recordings with Them ("Gloria", "Here Comes The Night"), his everpopular 'one-off' hit for Bang Records "Brown Eyed Girl", tracks from his Warner Bros masterpieces ("Moondance", "Tupelo Honey", "Into The Mystic", "Saint Dominic's Preview") and his later gems ("In The Garden", "Tore Down A La Rimbaud", "Irish Heartbeat" and "Celtic New Year"), to name but a few.

Hardcore Morrison fans will quibble about a personal favourite or two that has been overlooked for this selection. For example, I would have had to find room for "Cyprus Avenue" or "A Sense of Wonder", but then what would be left out? Striking a deft balance between the hits and the mystical Celtic soul that entrances all true Morrison followers, this represents great value for money and will get rid of that record token that has been stuck in your wallet since Christmas!


Still On Top is a superb introduction to the work of Van Morrison, but also be aware that all serious music fans must one day scale the mountain that is Astral Weeks, the 1968 album that fuses poetry, folk and jazz in equal measures and is one of the enduring masterpieces of modern music.

The harvest was expected to reach the winery and begin the process of becoming wine the following Tuesday.

### **Fantails find their way indoors**

Last month a local lady rang me to say she had been busy trying to shoo a persistent fantail out of her house. She would shut it out one window and it would come in another so it really wanted to be inside she thought. Not such an interesting event surely, but the funny thing was that very same day two other people told me of fantails coming inside that week and then it also happened at my house. Why now at this time of year, I wondered? I contacted the Ornithological Society to see if they could shed any light on the matter and on the status of fantail numbers, and this is what Paul Scofield, curator of Vertebrate Zoology, Canterbury Museum, told me.

You may be aware that a fantail in the house is a portent of bad luck in the Mäori world. It is indeed an interesting observation that fantails enter houses more in autumn. There is little doubt that insect numbers do decline in the autumn and this may be partially responsible but also remember that the recently fledged chicks have just become independent and they are probably less timid than their world-weary parents.

How can *TOM* readers tell the difference? Fledglings can be recognised by their scruffy unkempt appearance, brownish not yellow chest and by the presence of a line of small beige or light orange dots on the outer wing, in contrast with the smaller white dots of the adult.

The recently completed *Atlas of the Bird Distribution in New Zealand - 1999-2004*, published by the Ornithological Society of NZ, suggests that fantail distribution (especially in the South Island) may have increased not declined. The truth is that fantails are not well adapted to the cool New Zealand winters and during especially cold winters (like the last couple) populations may become locally extinct. It takes a few warm winters for populations to build up again. Why is this if the fantail is native, you may ask? Well, we now believe that fantails have not been in New Zealand for very long. Fossil evidence suggests that they, like pukeko and harrier, are in fact recent immigrants (in the last 1000 years or so) to New Zealand from Australia.

I would be interested to hear from anyone who notices whether the fantails coming inside are indeed fledglings or perhaps have a theory of their own. Email me at kim@thetom.co.nz
