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

Remembering



Hi everyone

I hope you all got a chance to watch the information forum we held on the Māori electoral ward two weeks ago.

If you missed the live stream on our website, we have a recording available on newplymouthnz.com. It's worth looking at as we heard from a variety of people about the benefits of having guaranteed Maori involvement in the democratic process and what it could mean for our district.

We held this forum to help people make an informed choice in the referendum on whether or not New Plymouth District should establish a Māori electoral ward for the next two election cycles. We were fortunate to have former Race Relations Commissioner Joris De Bres among the speakers, along with Bay of Plenty Regional Council Chairman Doug Leeder (who shared his experiences of the council having three seats for Māori councillors), and Treaty of Waitangi educator and WITT counsellor Margaret Smith.

What they had to say is worth listening to, and I hope you take the time to consider their points.

Regardless of how you intend to vote, please make sure you get your vote back to the Council before the deadline of noon on Friday next week (15 May). If it gets to a few days out from the deadline and you haven't voted yet, please drop your voting papers into the Civic Centre rather than posting it, to make sure your vote gets counted.

The result of this referendum will have a significant influence on the shape of our democratic process for the next six years, so please make sure your voice is heard.

Kaitake Community Board

The Kaitake Community Board made an extensive submission to Council's draft 2015/25 Long Term Plan. KCB certainly supports Council's intentions to make prudent decisions in the process of signing off its ten year plan. We understand the reasons for such an approach and agree that this is a valid course of action to address the efficiency of council delivery of its very comprehensive range of services and activities.

However KCB maintains this intention must be characterised by a circumspect, systematic planned approach because of the need to carry out the difficult task of weighing up different community's needs in the overall scheme. We congratulate council on its extensive consultation processes for determining needs over the next ten year period but emphasise there must be a balance between qualitative and quantitative decision-making. Council's role in making decisions for every community to help create better places to live and work can neither be overly influenced by a numbers game nor by councillor's voting on a particular pre-determined platform.

While there is not enough space in this TOM column to provide a full reproduction of our submission here is a general précis of our submission.

The community requires the Oakura Public Library to be open for more hours and be more flexible with its opening

Oakura is the only urban area in the NPDC without a public toilet. In fact we understand it is the only urban area on a highway in Taranaki without a public toilet. Therefore we requested (yet again) that funding is provided in the LTP for the construction of a public toilet in the Oakura CBD.

There has been a number of residential constructions on the eastern side of upper Wairau Road during the past ten years, all which have attracted a council development contribution but there is no footpath. There are many children in upper Wairau Road who travel daily to school and due to the dangerous nature of the Wairau Road intersection many parents choose to take them there by vehicle. If the footpath was extended along in front of the ten new houses on the eastern side of the road with a curb extension included at a safe position south of the intersection children would be able to walk and cycle safely

In response to a submission the KCB made during the 2010/11 Budget process, council allocated funds for the development of a Recreation and Community Facility Study for Oakura. The Oakura Structure Plan in 2006 and the Community Halls Review in 2009 identified the inadequacy of recreational facilities in Oakura as an issue and committed in the action plan to undertake a recreational study. The study was to identify community demand for recreation activities, and appropriate locations for them. Consequently the study made a number of recommendations to council in May 2011. While some of those recommendations have been progressed, many have not and the KCB submits that these be included and prioritised in the Long Term Plan.

On the Council's own proposals it sought feedback and the KCB supported:

No reduction in water reticulation maintenance budget. We believe this is a shortsighted and artificial attempt to try and achieve a lower rates increase.

A 50% remission in sports club pan tax payments but we believe there should be an allowance made to all community groups (e.g. schools) and suggested if the remission is only for sports organisations it is undemocratic.

Regarding the introduction of evening parking fees in New Plymouth we veiwed this as a 50/50 dilemma. There are points both for and against the proposal that the KCB couldn't resolve as as our understanding in this city CBD area of interest is inadequate. Therefore we made no recommendation on this issue.

We did not support a reduction in the community development budget as we believe it is a core council service, and strengthening and connecting local communities is being proposed as key council direction for the next thirty years. However the processes the council uses to currently address community development requires a strategic overhaul.

In regards to other community funding we supported the reduction of funding of \$100,000 in the first two years and by \$400,000 in the third year. Once again the KCB believes far more effort should be carried out on reviewing current processes on who can access funding, to establish what organisations view the funding as an annual stipend rather than a specific grant to get them 'up and running', and to establish who is receiving funding when their ongoing costs are really the responsibility of other regional or national organisations.

In regards housing for the elderly (council owned flats) we supported an increase in rents as the best option as we understand this enables council to pick up the government funding grant and is supported by a large majority of the

We reiterated our support for other items in the plan that relate to Kaitake Ward issues. These are the continuation of the duplicate Oakura water main and Tasman Parade upgrade to ensure potable water supply and enough water pressure for fire fighting requirements, the Okato water supply project to help ensure a continuous, adequate and reliable water service with minimal interruptions, and maintaining levels of service on the district's roading network.

It is very pleasing to see that work has finally started on demolishing a substantial section of the closed Okato Primary School. This has been a very long drawn out saga that was quite unnecessary in our view.

Warner Construction have been awarded the gabion basket contract in Shearer reserve. The baskets are to combat the erosion along the side of the Wairau Stream. They took possession of site on 21 April 2015 for up to three weeks and the skate park will not be available during the that time. Hopefully the work will be finished by the time you read this but be aware it may not be so kids keep clear.

During May there will be two meetings (Okato and Oakura) held by council to seek community views on council representation. Currently elected membership consists of:

New Plymouth - 10 councillors.

Inglewood - 2 councillors and a community board (4 members).

Waitara - 2 councillors and a community board (4 members).

Clifton - a community board (4 members).

Kaitake - a community board (4 members).

The mayor is elected 'at large' (all eligible people across the district get to vote).

We believe it it extremely important for the views of those living in the Kaitake Ward to be heard on this issue.

Well that's it for this month. The next board meeting is on Monday 25 May in the Supper Room of the Oakura Hall. All meetings are open to the public so come along if you wish. And don't forget to regularly check the KCB Face Book page for more current information.

Remembering our ANZACS

I recently came across this incredible poem by M. Kemal Atatürk in 1934 as a Tribute to the ANZACS.

THE ANZAC MEMORIAL

Those heroes that shed their blood And lost their lives... You are now lying in the soil of a friendly country. Therefore, rest in peace. There is no difference between the Johnnies And the Mehmets to us where they lie side by side, Here in this country of ours. You, the mothers, who sent their sons from far away countries... Wipe away your tears. Your sons are now lying in our bosom And are in peace. After having lost their lives on this land, they have Become our sons as well.

This time of reflection for our ANZACS is incredibly moving. The freedom and liberties they all fought for are to be honoured. We stand as the Nation we are today because of their bravery and fortitude and for this we will be eternally grateful.

The world is such a vastly different place from 100 years ago, and it continues to change at a rapid pace. It was only yesterday upon reading an article that a drone was used to herd sheep that you are reminded change and progression is constant, but it is how we adapt and approach change that is important. As a Government we face change on a multitude of fronts, and how we communicate and engage with the public is vital. The Government recently established the Rules Reduction Taskforce which will be going to all electorates in New Zealand to get feedback on loopy property rules and red tape. This will be a chance to hear frustrations and ideas for solutions around property rules. I will be hosting a Rules Reduction public meeting on the 8th May 10.30am at the Quality Plymouth Hotel. In Taranaki property development continues to grow, and with the strong DIY nature of Kiwis, this will be a great

opportunity to discuss issues and ideas that will be taken back to Government for consideration.

Next month Finance Minister Bill English will deliver the National-led Government's seventh Budget. Our strong, growing economy, backed by the Government's clear economic plan, is translating into real benefits for New Zealand households and businesses.

We have one of the fastest-growing economies in the developed world. It's supporting more jobs – 80,000 new jobs in the past year. Inflation and interest rates are low. Many are still playing 18 holes of golf in their 80's, many more are playing a regular round of 9 holes in their 80's. It's a tribute to golf that it is a sport that can be played at any age.

Albian Reid took me out for a spin round the course in a golf cart, a fun way to give everyone some cheek. Ten teams of six players were out playing a round of 9 hole Ambrose golf. The weather wasn't really playing ball with damp conditions underfoot and rain threatening but everyone was in good spirits and some great golf swings, drives and putts evident.

Back in the club house many had gathered to catch up with friends and share memories. Fred McGregor, 87 years told me he had been involved with golf since he was 15 years but was no longer able for a game. His playing days spanned nearly 40 years, but back when he was 15 his friend Doug lived on the farm where the Weld Rd golf course was first established. Fred went on to be a farmer on Kirihau Rd where his descendants have farmed for nearly 100 years. Fred and his wife Hazel have been married 65 years and have six children. Fred's golfing claim to fame is four holes in one, all at Kaitake Golf Course - two being on the number nine hole.

Along for the festivities were the two local Kitchen sisters, Ann (Kitchen) and Maureen (Looney). Ann and Maureen and their other sister grew up on the site of Kaitake Golf Club. Their father Duncan arrived in Oakura from Scotland in 1937 and married local girl Nora Bell. The 111

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


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Volunteers Needed for Alzheimers Taranaki

Alzheimers Taranaki is gearing itself up to meet the growing needs of people affected by dementia in Taranaki by providing ongoing support and services. We have a well-established team of Field Workers who offer home visits, support groups and informative talks in the community. We also have staff to manage our day programmes. They, along with their loyal and hardworking volunteers, bring years of experience and knowledge to our organisation and their dedication and enthusiasm never wanes. They give their best for the benefit of those our organisation serves. That is anyone affected by dementia: be it a person with dementia, their carers, whanau, friends, neighbours – it's impossible to determine how many people are affected by dementia but it's clear that it's an increasing number.


Dementia has many causes, the most common being Alzheimers Disease, and it can affect people in different ways. Not only by memory loss but sometimes the development of behaviours that are challenging, such as failure to recognise everyday objects, trouble with planning or making decisions, the loss of social grace (they may become bad mannered or bad tempered), repetitiveness, disorientation and becoming unable to complete simple tasks. And it's not a normal part of aging, although the incidence does increase with age. Early onset dementia can affect people as young as 40 as illustrated in the recent movie Still Alice starring Julianne Moore.

It goes without saying that someone with dementia needs a lot of care and this can be very demanding on immediate family members. This is where our Tuesday/Friday Club in New Plymouth comes into play, providing a place for someone with dementia to spend the day with friends, in a safe and supportive environment, while their carer gets some much needed respite, to recharge their batteries and relax – or simply to catch up on chores.

If you would like to become a volunteer at the club we would love to hear from you. You would be invited to come to the club so that you could get a better idea of what is involved and we could talk about how often you wanted to help out — weekly, fortnightly, or to be 'on call' when needed. Training and support is provided.

We are also looking for new volunteers to help out with fundraising or awareness events, or to be on our board which meets monthly to provide direction and support to the organisation. If you have any concerns about a possible developing dementia, go and talk to your GP about it or contact Alzheimers Taranaki. The sooner dementia is diagnosed, or ruled out (and sometimes symptoms can be caused by some other health issue), the sooner appropriate support can be put in place and plans made for future care.

MOLLY LUMB - NZ DRESSAGE YOUNG RIDER OF THE YEAR

I started riding at the age of six at the local riding school—Clearwater Riding School with instructors Lydia Quay and Jill Tompkins. For five years I rode ponies and made lots of new friends. At the age of 11 I got my first pony G.S. Axsaarshia (4yr old Arab mare). I competed her in Pony Club events such as jumping days, ribbon day and local dressage days up to level two. I then moved on to The Zeus (owned by the West family) and competed up to level three dressage and I placed 4th overall at the NZPCA Dressage Championships. During this time I was being coached by Denise Patterson. After The Zeus we bought Ferro (6 yr old ClydieX) who I trained and competed on up to level three. While riding Ferro I had my first lesson with Vanessa Way and never looked back.

Vanessa Way, my coach of one year at this point allowed me to hack her top horse KH Arvan out during the week and learn a few movements on him with Abbie Deken while Vanessa was over in England training and competing. Just a few days after Vanessa got home from England she offered me the ride on Arvan and to compete him at level five for the 2014/15 season. This soon moved to level six/seven and CDI-Y young riders because Vanessa felt I needed to step up. At the time I had my own 6 year old Clyde X Ferro, that I trained and competed on and as soon as I was offered the ride on Arvan we decided to sell Ferro. We decided to just focus on one horse because of all my school work having to complete NCEA level 1 and 2 in 2014 and 2015. In October 2014 my dad Stephen Lumb broke the news to me that we had just bought Arvan from Vanessa Way and Brooke Hughes with a condition that he stays on the property. This was perfect as I only live 500m down the road! I didn't believe Dad at first but as soon as he said he was 'serious' I broke down into tears and couldn't get a word out - it was a dream come true.

There were good and bad parts to each and every test during Horse of the Year 2015. I was especially pleased with my CDI-Y individual test where Arvan and I scored 68%! In my CDI-Y teams test and musical freestyle I made some rookie rider mistakes but Arvan tried his heart out for me as always. After winning all three tests I was over the moon. Being announced NZ Dressage Young Rider of the Year
