# Wearable Arts success(es)

A few basic materials and a lot of number-eight wire ingenuity paid off for four Omata contestants in this year's Taranaki Daily News Fashion Art Awards.

Veteran wearable art contestant Sandra Lewis won the "Open Off The Wall" section with her "Dress Circle" design made from preserving jar rings, while New Plymouth Girls High pupils Anneke Brouwers (from Omata) and Hannah Dodd took out the student prize in the same category. Their quirky design was based on the famous Hundertwasser Kawakawa toilets. Students from Omata School's Room Two won the "Farm Fantastic" section with their outfits made of recycled gumboots and silage wrap, and the black and white puriri moth

created by Room One pupils earned a finalist position in the "Glow Time" section. Sandra has entered the Taranaki awards every year since it began in 2001, and has collected five trophies in

that time. The mother of two became involved with Wearable Arts eight years ago after being inspired by her daughter Tammy, who entered a competition one year. "It is my hobby and I will keep going until the ideas run out," says the avid recycler. Her work has also been



accepted for the Nelson Wearable Arts awards six times, and two of those have been bought for the Wearable Arts collection. Other successes include a win and two runner-up places in Auckland's Trash to Fashion awards, in which Sandra has entered four times. The recently released latest edition of *The* World of Wearable Arts book showcases some of the best pieces of work worldwide and features two of her pieces. "It was an absolute thrill to get into the book," Sandra says.

#### KAITAKE COMMUNITY BOARD

Our last meeting held no surprises and we had no guests, so it was very short and now there is only one more before Christmas.

I attended the hearings for Reserve Review and was pleased to see Tracey Lusk present a passionate request on behalf of the community to keep the Linda St tennis courts. It takes time and energy for folk to make these presentations so the community can benefit – generally few are aware of the personal input involved. Thank you Tracey.

The Committee listened and I believe the outcome is just what is needed – a combined effort by Council and Community to keep the courts as a reserve and in reasonable condition.

I also attended the Policy Committee meeting reporting on the first draft of the Campground Review. Al from Oakura Campground spoke of the investment and work to keep our Campground up there with the best, including its Qualmark rating. Be assured the Board is adamant the camparound is going to stay. How the grounds are administered is still to be addressed, but I feel sure the outcome will recognise the asset this beautiful beach is to the Oakura community and indeed New Zealand.

I saw some very wet surfers at the Campground this Labour Weekend, happily wading between the kitchen and tents with frying pans in their hands and smiles on their faces. Even in the rain it's a great place to be.

I attended a meeting of a couple of the businesses in the CBD who have issues with the angle parking being taken away. Understandably, change is always difficult, but in this instance it has to happen to allow the upgrade to take place. Transit NZ set the rules and the community have asked for a change to allow better pedestrian walkways, more space for children to ride to school and more attractive surroundings for the village. So far it looks great and many have told me how helpful the workmen and women have been.

Council officers have listened and while trying to please everyone is an impossibility, they are working hard to make it fair for all. The latest changes due to the weather are finishing the mountain side of the road first and on the residential sea side, businesses will retain the angle parking until after Christmas and about mid-February work will resume on the final piece.

Businesses on the sea side feel 30 minute parking will help them. How the rest of the community feel about it is to be canvassed by those businesses. If everybody buys into it then it can be considered.

the rural community and because there just were no gumboots in last year's rural section," says Ms Aylward. Their piece depicted a rural couple all dressed up for a night out after a hard day's work. All gumboots used were worn out, as was the teacher by the time the outfits were finished! Ms Aylward says the project took a whole term to complete and involved lots of team-work. "All the children in the class contributed. They were divided into groups which did a specific job. Materials were donated by the school community." Room One teacher, Tracey Gurnick says a puriri moth flying into their classroom provided the idea for their design. "Some of the children in the class had not seen a puriri moth before and were so intriqued by it I decided to include the native aspect of the moth and as they had just done symmetry in geometry, it was appropriate to incorporate that as well." The moth's wings were decorated with koru made by the nine and tenyear olds.

Oakura costume designer Gail Kircher entered two pieces in the "Off The Wall" category. "From The Ocean She Rides" was inspired by childhood memories of riding along the beach on her pony and from the whitecaps of waves. Her second piece, "Bound to Earth", was a work commissioned by international storyteller Lesley Dowding. The headpiece depicted roots and trunks of trees as seen on the windswept western coast.

Other entrants from Oakura included Debbie Aston with her "Off the Record" bra, her 12 year-old daughter India with an outfit made from ties and Eloise Stephens (11 years old) with her "Fairy Liscious" costume.

The show's producer, Lois Finderup says the quality of the 169 entries were far superior to other years. "The art departments

#### Getting on with things that matter...

The political world right now is a flurry. From private investigators tailing the Prime Minister to renegade National MP Brian Connell being turfed out by his own caucus, there certainly is a lot happening. But most people I talk to back in the electorate say too much attention is being paid to such distractions. People in New Plymouth never bombard me with questions over the latest political scandal to hit the news.

#### So what do people really care about?

Most are concerned about the things that really matter – educating their kids, making sure their families and communities are safe and ensuring they have access to good, affordable healthcare. We know these are the things that Kiwis really care about. Opinion polls tell us the same story, ranking public services as the most or second most important issue.

For instance, last month the *New Zealand Herald* Digipoll put health as the number one issue. Why? Because having access to the proper healthcare when you and your family need it is important. Political mud-slinging and the extraordinary behaviour of the Exclusive Brethren is not.

The Labour-led government is getting on with the job of making a positive difference in the lives of all New Zealanders and building the public services that Kiwis have consistently said are more important.

Last month, addressing waiting list concerns, Labour announced that we're to fund 10,000 additional elective surgery procedures every year. This capacity for investment is possible because District Health Boards now have effective booking systems that deliver fair prioritisation for patients. It is not acceptable for people to wait for long periods without being seen and our hope is that that era is now drawing to a close. We inherited a huge backlog in 1999 and have made real progress.

The new funding, some \$200 million, means that we have one of the fairest elective surgical systems in the world, where the people who need treatment the most will get it first, and where someone who is promised treatment will get it within six months.

The expansion of elective surgeries is also possible because of earlier capital and human investments in health. Labour has now built more public hospitals than any other government and hired 5,000 extra doctors and nurses to work in them.

We're not resting on our laurels. In addition to expanding elective surgery, some 22 new operating theatres are being built around the country over the next four years – that's one new theatre every nine weeks.

Dr Brash, meanwhile, has launched another bizarre attack on Mäori, questioning their identity because of mixed lineage. On the face of it, his statements add nothing new or helpful to the debate about race-relations in New Zealand. What is more worrying is the National leader's underlying tactic. His attempt to reprise his gambit at Orewa of using Mäori as a wedge issue should be seen for what it is: a desperate bid to divert attention from his floundering leadership.

National's 47 other MPs know that such a ploy from their leader is only hurting them. They should demand that he start offering some solutions instead of divisive rhetoric. Meanwhile, Labour will be getting on with the things that matter.

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# Perfect pancakes in paradise

The international flavours keep pouring out of Oakura. I had an extremely yummy breakfast the other morning at Snicker-doodles when I was treated to a German pancake made by Rick.

The morning was warm and sunny as I sat and enjoyed the unique experience of Snickerdoodles Bakehouse. I could have sworn all the customers were Rick's personal friends. He knew each one's favourite coffee and even when first time customers came in I'm sure they would have left feeling like a friend too. But back to brekkie . . . A German pancake is a harsh sounding name for a positively divinely soft and scrummy crepe. The pancake is a family tradition and has been served nearly everyday to the family. The pancake is made by baking the batter in the oven where it bubbles up and looks like a soufflé. Upon cooling it sinks down. Snickerdoodles serves it with the perfect quantities of melted butter, lemon juice and icing sugar. Not too much or too little of anything.

The pancake will be served with seasonal fruit when available. Don't be tempted to order two pancakes – one German pancake is an entire meal by itself.

I would recommend ringing the Bakehouse and pre-ordering the pancake if you don't want to wait the 15 minutes it takes to cook, but I loved sitting and talking to the customers and to Rick and Lynette. As Rick says, Snickerdoodles isn't just about great food, it's also about people.

Other brekkie options include pancake stacks, bagels, croissants, the Big Brekkie, muesli and of course, their wonderful All Press coffee.

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## **Gardening with Rosemary Herb**

#### **NOVEMBER CHECKLIST**

#### Vegetables

Continue sowing beans, lettuce, cucumber, courgette, melons, radish, silverbeet, sweetcorn and tomatoes. For continuous harvesting of vegetables, make sowings at three weekly intervals.

Rosemary has been harvesting her new potatoes. It's lovely rummaging around in the warm soil for the waxy tubers, then cooking them with lashings of butter!

#### **\* Trees**

Feed all citrus trees with Butlers Citrus Fertiliser.

Mulch around flower beds to conserve moisture in the soil.

Sow seeds of summer flowers cosmos, marigold, petunias, portulacas, verbena and zinnia.

Plant new roses using plenty of compost. Water all roses at least once a week. Rosemary's roses have aphids so do check for the little beasties and spray regularly.

#### Lawns

Apply Butlers Lawn Fertiliser when rain is due or water in.

Spray with Turfix for broad leaf weeds and Prickle Weedkiller to control Onehunga weed and stop summer prickles.

The Oakura Fire Brigade has proved they are capable of coming to the rescue in more ways than one.

When Taranaki Outdoor Adventures owner, Tran Lawrence needed more man-power for a job a few weeks back, he called on his mates at the local Brigade to help him out. They quite happily agreed to rustle up the 60 extras needed when the owner of Taranaki's biggest outdoor adventure company got the contract to provide a challenge for a popular reality television programme in Japan. With an audience of about 18 million viewers, the show features a couple of Japanese exboy-band rock stars who dare each other to random challenges that can take them anywhere in the world. Tran says New

Zealand Tourism asked him to help two film scouts find an outdoor activity suitable for the programme. After checking out alter-native venues throughout the North Island, it was decided dam-dropping in Taranaki was the go.

The job involved three days of filming at the Normanby Dam, although the Oakura Fire Brigade volunteers, friends and families were only needed for two.

Committed dam-buster, Seamus Breeze says the experience was brilliant. "You know when something exceeds your expectations. Everybody just let go because of the long drive down there. By the time the film crew got there we were getting exhausted."

Fellow adventurer Greg Newton says it was a great team building exercise and well worth doing as not only did they have lots of fun, but they also got paid for their efforts! All money has gone to the social club coffers and plans are underway for a big family day out.

Another recent unexpected callout involved a spot of PR work last month when National Radio invited three of the Brigade's volunteers to share "an afternoon with Jim Mora". Beach camp owner Alan Rawlinson, builder Greg Newton and TOA's Tran Lawrence talked about their lives in Oakura from their different perspectives. "It was a huge plug for Oakura," says Tran. No job is too much trouble for the Fire Brigade and when they aren't busy fighting fires or being TV stars, they are happy to support fund raising activities. They helped with the doorknock for Plunket recently, raising about \$1300. The committed team presently has about 14 volunteers and is always on the look-out for new members. 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
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#### MUSIC REVIEW by DON JUA

#### Modern Times

Bob Dylan

#### (Columbia/Sony BMG)

You would have to be a world class optimist to think, even for a minute, that Bob Dylan (or anybody else for that matter) was going to write another song to compare with "It's All Over Now, Baby Blue," "Mr. Tambourine Man," "Like A Rolling Stone," "Subterranean Homesick Blues," "All Along The Watchtower" or "Desolation Row." Yet with his last three albums, the Minnesota-born Robert Zimmerman has hit a late career 'high', with critics falling over themselves to praise the old master.

Sure, Dylan will never write anything to rival those early masterpieces, but on Time Out Of Mind (1997), Love And Theft (2001) and now Modern Times, he has put together his best sequence of albums since the mid-seventies.

True, we will never hear another Dylan song like "Positively 4th Street" or "Visions Of Johanna," but there are plenty of tracks on these recent albums that sit very nicely next to the likes of "Quinn The Eskimo," "I'll Be Your Baby Tonight," "Forever Young," "Blind Willie McTell" and "Gotta Serve Somebody."

His 'comeback' album *Time Out Of Mind* is a deep, dark gem, but with the two subsequent albums, some sunlight and humour has crept back into the songs. Both Love And Theft and this new outing seem to have distilled the purest essence of what we now call 'Americana.' Dylan conjures up the spirit of the songs he grew up on, namely the various shades of the blues (from the Delta, via talking blues to Chicago electric blues), trad. folk, rockabilly, string band jazz, rhythm & blues, mountain ballads and classic story songs.

Even Dylan's voice seems to have improved from the shredded instrument heard over a decade ago on his backto-my-roots albums Good As I Been to You and World Gone Wrong.

The musicians in his support crew seem perfectly tuned into the needs of each song, stoking up the heat on R & B and bluesier numbers ("Someday Baby," "The Levee's Gonna Break" and the cheeky rewrite of Muddy Water's "Rollin' And Tumblin'"), but also knowing when to lay back, such as on the marvellous "Workingman's Blues # 2," "Nettie Moore" and the almost vaudevillian "Beyond The Horizon." The big question, though, is why has Bob been searching for Alicia Keys ("Thunder On The Mountain")?

Cleanly produced by Jack Frost AKA Mr. Bob Dylan himself, *Modern Times* is a remarkably fine and consistent piece of work from a gentleman of pensionable years, but as my old Mum used to say, "There's many a sweet tune played on an old fiddle!"

#### From The Pasture To The Future

The Waybacks

#### (Compass/Elite)

Somewhere between a string band and a freewheeling 'jam band,' The Waybacks bring a sense of fun to what is basically an eclectic cosmic bluegrass hybrid.

Not too many bands would dare to cover a Ray Davies song ("Motorway"), an intricate jazz piece by Chick Corea ("Armando's Rhumba") and an English folk song ("The Blacksmith") on the same album, but these guys do and, even better, do it with some panache!

Throw in a pretty dance tune in 3/4 time ("Bluebird Waltz") and a guirky original or two (The Petrified Man" and "Hot Kransky") and you have an album capable of charming any fan of modern day Americana.

From The Pasture to the Future has a crisp production courtesy of former Joe Ely steel guitar master, Lloyd Maines, who is best-known these days as the father of a Dixie Chick.

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


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
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# Taranaki 'be here' 'be surprised'

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### **Acute low back pain**

Nine out of ten New Zealanders can expect to get acute low back pain at some time in their lives. Most of these episodes last less than three months and can be easily assessed by your local pharmacist. Colleen and Catherine have recently attended a training course organised by the New Zealand College of Pharmacists in conjunction with ACC on assessment and management of Acute Low Back

#### The most important points to remember are:


- In a few cases there is a serious cause, but generally the pain is non-specific and precise diagnosis is not possible or necessary. "There are certain 'red flags' that we are looking and listening for," says Colleen. "And of course we will refer patients to their doctor if we are at all concerned," she adds.
- It is important to remember that pain in your back does not mean it has been damaged (unless of course you have been hit by, or have hit, something with great force). Staying active and continuing your usual activities, within tolerable pain limits, helps recovery.
- AVOID BED REST especially for more than a day. There is very strong evidence from research that suggests that not using your back can do more harm than good.
- Getting back to work as early as possible should reduce the risk of your back pain becoming a long term problem.
- Most back pain gets better quickly often within a month.

#### Symptom control

Effective interventions to control symptoms of acute low back pain include analgesics, manipulation and massage.

- Analgesics (painkillers): Regular doses, rather than 'as required' have been shown to provide effective pain control. Paracetamol, aspirin and diclofenac are effective first options. "Taken regularly every day, pain relief is enormously effective for this condition," says Catherine. "We are happy to advise customers about the best treatment for them".
- Manipulation and massage: By trained practitioners in the first 4 to 6 weeks is shown to be safe and effective.

So if you have a pain in your lower back, don't take it lying down – see the staff at Oakura Pharmacy, your coastal community pharmacy.



# "I'm not autistic, I've got autism"

I recently read Ellen Notbohm's book, Ten Things Every Child With Autism Wishes You Knew. She is the mother of a child on the autistic spectrum and her book is worded as if from the child's perspective.


The child explains that autism is one aspect of his/her character, it doesn't define him as a person – he is, first and foremost a child. He has autism, he is not primarily 'autistic'. He asks if you are a person with thoughts, feelings and many talents or merely fat (overweight), myopic (wear glasses), or klutzy (uncoordinated, not good at sports). They may be the first things he sees when he meets you, but they are not necessarily what you are all about.

As I explained in an earlier column in TOM, autism is a spectrum and what one person on the spectrum is good at or struggles with is not necessarily the same for another. This is why autism is often referred to as an autistic spectrum disorder (ASD). The individual in the book continues to explain that if you define him by one characteristic you run the danger of setting up an expectation that may be too low, therefore, he says, if others don't think he's capable of something, why should he try? Although knowing someone has ASD helps to alert us to what kind of challenges they may face and where their strengths

We all like to be valued for who we are as individuals and what we can offer. Let's remember to celebrate each other for who we are.





Twenty three eager macadamia nut collectors arrived at Tony & Therese Waghorn's property on a lovely calm Spring Saturday afternoon wearing suitable nut picking attire, carrying buckets of all shapes and sizes and various apparatus for reaching high into the trees – long poles, garden rakes and hoes...

Tony explained about macadamia nut tree growing, nut harvesting and how the afternoon was going to progress, then pointed us in the direction of the Waghorn and Kerr-Newell plantations. There was a hive of activity as we all

scrambled around under the first trees hoping we wouldn't miss out on the nuts however we need not have worried as there were nuts galore! Hundreds lay on the ground and still more were hanging from the trees. We learnt we shouldn't collect split nuts and that the larger the nut didn't mean it was any better than the small one – sometimes the smaller nuts were tastier. Eager collectors were seen to climb trees for the more productive crops and others were spotted climbing over

fences collecting macadamia nut seedlings for their own plantations!

It didn't take long before everyone was chatting away to the harvester next to them and all seemed to enjoy being out in the fresh air with stimulating company, and at the same time doing something useful and energetic. With buckets fill we headed to the 'nut shed' where Tony kindly operated the husking machine while we set about dipping already previously dried nuts into melted chocolate under the experienced eye of Therese. A variety of methods were used with the wining method being developed by Muriel Livingston.... These morsels were set aside to harden and be taken home later, along with the buckets of nuts ready to be dried out in our ovens at home.

After all this activity, the group retired happily to the Waghorn's lovely front lawn and while soaking up the sun, enjoyed a well earned afternoon tea which consisted of scrumptious savoury and sweet platters of food all containing macadamia nuts in some form or another. Another great Slow Food Taranaki outing! Special thanks to Tony & Therese.

# Finlay Neeson – 2006 Young Achiever Sports Award




Total commitment and a passion for speed has earned Oakura's Finlay Neeson the 2006 Young Achiever Sports Award. No sooner had the talented skier collected his New Plymouth District Council prize, than he was heading back to Mt Ruapehu for more racing. "We had to jump in the car after the awards at 10pm and head back to Ohakune," says mum, Janis. In order to accomplish his dream of representing New Zealand in the 2014 Winter Olympics 13-year-old Finlay needs to get as much time on the slopes as possible. It all began when he learnt to ski on Mt Taranaki as a six year-old and at ten he started racing for the Stratford Mountain Club. "I just kind of got the bug and now would love to become a professional skier," Finlay says. An average New Zealand ski season is only about 50 days and when competing internationally, about 140 days of skiing are needed to ensure a top performance.

Finlay has spent most weekends and school holidays this winter either training or competing with regional Team Turoa and the Mt Ruapehu Alpine Ski Team (North Island representative team). This season's successes include winning the Mt Ruapehu Nordica race series, coming second in the K2 Cup slalom race at Cardrona and being ranked third nationally in his age group. Finlay is waiting to hear if he has been selected for the NZ Whistler Cup team for a third time. "The Whistler Cup is a world class race and is the ultimate for 11–14 year-olds," says Janis. He is also part of the ID (identification) talent group chosen by Ski Racing NZ. Janis says the 17-member team, aged between 13 and 17 years, have been recognised for their potential to be national racers.

The Neeson family heads back to Canada for six weeks when school breaks up in December so Finlay can work on his form and experience competing against other top competitors.

### Hyundai National Champs Return to Taranaki

The 2007 Hyundai National Surfing Championships will be held in Taranaki in January and hosted by Oakura Boardriders. The event is set to take place from the 13th – 20th January and will be the second event of the Corona Crown – New Zealand's premier domestic competition. The event is regarded by many as the pinnacle domestic surfing event and as such attracts in excess of 300 entries from the length and breadth of the country.

The Taranaki coastline is a favourite for many New Zealand surfers. "It provides a good variation of surf breaks, ie; reef, point & beach breaks that can handle a wide variation of wind

directions and provides good quality surf with offshore winds" commented Oakura Boardriders representative Mark Braddock. As such Taranaki provides a great event location with consistent swell allowing the huge eight-day event the best chance of getting quality waves. This will be the tenth time the event has been held in the region second only to Gisborne who have hosted the event eleven times.

Twenty national titles will go on the line come day one of the event and along with these go a number of records for the books. Notably, New Zealand's number one surfer and defending event champion Maz Quinn (Gis) will look to join Wayne Parkes and Iain Buchanan by winning five national titles. Quinn has achieved more than most in the sport and this would be another fitting milestone. "For sure, it is in the back of my mind" commented Quinn who continued "Winning a single title is amazing but to get five and be grouped with legends like Wayne and Iain would be even better". Quinn has not secured a title in Taranaki but rates Stent Road as one of his favourite waves in New Zealand. "If we get to compete at Stent Road for part of the event then that would be awesome" commented Quinn.

With the event being staged in mid January it is anticipated that many of New Zealand's top juniors will return from Australia where they will be competing on the Australasian Pro Junior Series. This will boost the standard of surfing in the Men's and Women's divisions and could produce upsets from several of New Zealand's top up and coming surfers. Many of these top junior surfers come from the Taranaki region and as Mark Braddock points out, events like this are great for the local surfers "For our juniors, to have the exposure both as competitors and spectators to the level of surfing can only be a huge bonus for their development in the sport. It will provide them with the enthusiasm and determination to excel to the best of their abilities".






