Kaitake Community Board

As daylight saving and longer evenings brings the community out and about in the village and on the beachfront it provides an opportunity to catch up with other village people one hasn't seen that often during the winter months. The whole community seems to slow down somewhat and get into some serious outdoor leisure time as the first snatches of summer begin to unfold and embed back into our lives again. The boardriders and the surf club are back in business, there are more visitors staying at the Oakura Beach Holiday Park and it can be quite difficult getting a park up in the village. There are far more folk using the beachfront and that brings me to the question of dogs.

We are very lucky to live in a very dog friendly place. It's a great environment for a family pet and there are many pretty special dogs in our community. But we need to bear in mind there are some important responsibilities for all owners. As we walk our pet along the village streets, on the foreshore, the beach, through the campground or on other reserves there is a clear expectation to clean up when it defecates on the ground. This is the same ground over which other walkers and beach goers use. Unfortunately there is a large amount of dogs' business being left where it has been deposited and is not being cleared up by the owners.

We all need to step up and ensure this objectionable practice ceases. There is a Council Bylaw that covers this particular issue. It states: The owner of any dog that defecates in a public place or on land or premises other than that occupied by the owner shall immediately remove the faeces from that place and dispose of it in a sanitary manner into a suitable receptacle. Council can impose a \$300 fine for the transgressing owners.

The Bylaw also states that: dogs are prohibited from the foreshore and the beach in the area between imaginary lines drawn directly to the sea from the eastern side of the vehicle entrance to the motor camp and from the western side of the end of Wairau Road. Dogs are also totally banned from Shearer Reserve playground. While this prohibition is treated in a relaxed way during the colder months it is certainly worth remembering that these areas are no place for a dog when it is crowded with other users.

Well that's it for the grizzle! There's a great deal happening on the local government front at the moment and your community board's energies are being stretched in a range of ways and directions. More about that next month. The next board meeting is on Monday 10 November in the NPOB Surf Club at 4.30pm. All meetings are open to the public so come along if you wish.

Opportunities for Us All

New Zealanders have given National a strong mandate for the next three years and we intend to work in the interests of every New Zealander.

Over the past six years we have been transparent and straightforward about our decisions and the direction we have taken. We will work tirelessly on Christchurch's rebuild, finalise unsettled Treaty of Waitangi claims, and work on a referendum for a potential change to the New Zealand flag.

Welfare reform will continue to be a priority, as will health. New Zealanders want us to support the most vulnerable children in our society. We will continue to help people move from welfare to work because full-time, sustainable work is the best way to lift families out of poverty. There is enormous opportunity over the next few years to get more jobs and higher wages for New Zealanders.

We'll continue to spend taxpayers' money wisely, build surpluses, and responsibly manage the country's finances.

This is a remarkable country and there are enormous opportunities for us all.

Classical Guitar

From the classical guitar studio of Dominique Blatti - local classical guitar teacher and performer.

Born in Switzerland, I started to learn the classical guitar at nine years of age, under the tutelage of Senorita De Cruz - a wonderful Spanish lady and talented musician.

Later on, I entered the Geneva Conservatory but didn't complete my studies, having opted to join my parents on their migration to New Zealand. I committed fully to the playing and the teaching of the classical guitar in 2000. I have been a member of the New Plymouth Classical Guitar Society (*http://npcgs.weebly.com*) since 2003 and am now the president.

Together with Ross Townsend, the other classical guitar teacher in Taranaki, I am part of a two guitar duo called 'Guitarra' (www.wix.com/guitarrataranaki/guitarra) which has regular private and public performances. I started and conduct a couple of guitar orchestras: Con Tempo, adults mainly, and a youth group. In 2011, I initiated and organised the inaugural Taranaki Classical Guitar Summer School (TCGSS) (www.taranakisummerschool. weebly.com) which was first held in January 2012, and was a resounding success. Featuring some of the world's finest classical guitarists, this event brings together educators, students, professionals, amateurs, composers and luthiers, to New Plymouth for six days and nights of intense, fun and rewarding learning. The second TCGSS was held in January this year and was an even bigger success. Plans for the 2016 event are already well underway.

My next project for 2015 is to start a national youth guitar orchestra for gifted students under 18 years of age.



Sharing the music.



The first thing one has to learn to become a good musician is how to play your instrument properly - obvious right? Well sadly, it is surprising how neglected this approach is, especially in guitar teaching. I believe the most important thing to develop in a beginning guitarist is a solid technique. It is astounding how often the technical training is completely ignored, which regrettably means that a lot of students end up developing bad habits.

These bad habits will seriously hinder their progress and indeed their ability to make the music they play (even simple chords) sound good. Frustration will set in and the student will give up altogether. Simply put, if you are going to invest in music lessons, it is much better to learn to play the guitar correctly first time round and from a guitar trained tutor - I believe doing so will reap rewards in the future. It is all about laying the foundation that the student can then build upon, to become a better guitar player, regardless of the musical styles.

My thorough method of teaching builds a strong foundation which better prepares the student for the higher grade. Topics covered during the lessons include musicianship, musical knowledge, practice strategies, theory and of course music reading. When you learn how to read music it opens doors to a whole world of sound, across the centuries. Music reading helps to deepen you as a musician. You may want only meat and spuds right now, but someday you might like to taste a juicy tomato . . . and who knows what you might want to have for dessert!

The students develop their playing skills by exploring a wide variety of music, discovering the versatility of the classical guitar with solo and ensemble playing; ensemble playing is one of the best ways to improve musical skills such as keeping rhythm, playing without stopping, listening to others while concentrating on a part and making new friends!

Students may want to learn for enjoyment and personal enrichment, but for those who wish to, participation to competitions, performances and exams are all available.

Trinity College London offers graded exams for a wide range of instruments and singing, from Initial to Grade 8, and diploma exams for advanced students. Their exams offer the choice and flexibility to allow candidates to play to their strengths, enabling them to gain recognition for their own unique skills as performers. Trinity College London is an international examinations board offering exams in over 55 countries worldwide.

Playing a musical instrument has many benefits: it increases the capacity of your memory, refines organizational skills, boosts team skills, teaches discipline and perseverance, enhances your coordination reading and comprehension skills, fosters self expression, creates a sense of achievement, exposes to cultural history, sharpens concentration, promotes social skills, and promotes happiness in your life and those around you.

With its rich, warm tone and its versatility, a well played classical guitar weaves a tapestry of excitement and emotional impact - never intrusive yet always suggestive.

Many great artists have dedicated their lives to the classical guitar and have believed it to be the most beautiful and expressive instrument ever invented. Some are composers, some are players. Segovia, Taregga, Sor, Giuliani, Pujol, Barrios, Williams, Bream, Russell . . . all these artists in one way or another greatly expanded the reach and enhanced the reputation of the guitar. A good first step of course would be to listen to a few of these artists, and see what happens to your concept of what the guitar is capable of.





WHAT'S ON TOP

Recently New Plymouth Boys' High School had its annual Awards Dinner where we celebrated the successes of the students in academic sporting and cultural endeavours. The boys strive to be awarded the Tiger Jacket and out of all the recipients we honour the Dux, the best sportsman, the best performing artist and the best team or group.

Crop Swap Meetings a Wealth of Information

The jury is still out on whether I should feed my family raw milk or not. Su Hammond's talk on raw milk (Crop swap October 11) was good, as were the testimonies from a keen group of raw milk drinkers that were there, but as a microbiologist I am still not convinced. Su wasn't there to convince me though. She's a friendly, hard working, honest woman who was just there to talk about what she's into. And, FYI, after raising four kids, working hard on the farm and getting a cheese and raw milk business off the ground, this raw milk drinker is as healthy and as energetic as a spring chicken! Su's certified organic farm supplies milk for Fonterra. So the cows' milk that she takes three mornings a week is tested the other two when it goes into the vat. She is also particular about cleaning teats before milking to get rid of E.Coli nasties.

Supplying the container the milk goes out in, means that Su can sterilise these metal buckets when not in use. Customers pay a bucket fee so they can leave with raw milk in something that Su knows is clean. This is something to keep in mind if you are filling your own containers from a self help raw milk vending station. Plastic containers generally can't get clean enough; use metal, pottery or glass. It's taken three years for Su's farm to become certified as organic. This process costs money and can take longer or shorter depending on the history of pesticide use, residual stuff found in soil screening etc. So Su's raw milk is pesticide free.

Raw milk, by definition, is also pasteurisation free. This process kills the bad microbes but also the good. These good bugs are the ones that can help with the digestion of milk. People who can't digest the lactose or bovine proteins in milk get an allergic reaction or may produce allergic symptoms. One of the women at crop swap had a nephew who could drink the raw milk at her house but got stomach cramps if he drank milk from the supermarket. True to say that supermarket milk hardly resembles milk. It is thin and tasteless compared to the flavour rich creamy liquid that raw milk is. Some even scoop the cream from the top of raw milk and use it separately as it is too rich to drink. Drinkers at crop swap said raw milk could last for about a week in your fridge. Su has been breeding her milking cows from A2 bulls. The A1, A2 debate is about genetics, saying A2 cows produce proteins that suit human consumption better. That's another debate in itself, as is the issue of the impact of dairy farming on the environment.

We as humans are the only mammals that are never weaned. If we had veges from calcium rich soils and gnawed on the old bone or two perhaps we could avoid the milk debates altogether!

Come swap ideas and garden goods with us.

Saturday November 8 is, as well as the normal swap, a Show and Tell on Probiotics. If you have any type of kafir or sour dough or yogurt etc. bubbling away please bring a bit along to show, talk about, taste or share.

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
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
