A shout out to Keith Plummer for his years of dedication and service to the community via the KCB - you have helped make Oakura a better place - thank you! Kim



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
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Give Dom a call -



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Focused on the Future for Youth Training and Work

We recently had Got a Trade Week 2016 which is a new initiative launched by Government to raise awareness of the on-the-job training and career opportunities in New Zealand's trades and service industries.

Strong employment growth is forecast in the construction, business services, and hospitality and retail industries. It's important we get the information to our young people that a career in the trades is a great option and will give them practical skills for a productive and growing industry. And of course many successful trades' people go one to make a profitable business from their skill.

Some of our most successful business people have been able to anticipate the future, to identify growth areas and where skilled employers will be in demand. Think back ten years ago and no one would have thought of being a Social Media Manager or a Carbon Emissions Trader. New jobs and industries are being created every year, and the work of teachers and career advisers is to keep themselves and our young people informed of trends that will help them make good career and training choices.

A great website is www.careers.govt.nz which has many helpful tools for young people to discover what resources and opportunities are available. It's about ensuring students understand the demand for future work, where the skills shortages will be and the greatest opportunity for employment.

Job-creating economic growth is the Governments focus, and Statistics New Zealand reported on 17 August, that the official unemployment rate dropped to 5.1 per cent in the June quarter, down from 5.2 per cent in March, and down also from 5.5 per cent a year earlier. More and more jobs are becoming available to our young people.

What it all means is that 105,000 extra jobs have been created in our economy in the last year and 251,000 extra jobs have been created in the last three years.

Added to that, the average annual wage has risen about 25 per cent to over \$58,000 since National came into office

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- that's more than double the rate of inflation over the period (11.9 per cent). The average annual wage is expected to reach almost \$63,000 by 2020.

By any measure, these are positive social and economic numbers. But we have more to do. I can assure you the National-led Government will continue working hard every day to build on this momentum and create a bright future for our young people.

Bullet is a 23 year old Quarter Horse cross Arab. He is a cruisey dude, bombproof and safe but with a cheeky personality.


Bazil is a 9 year old Thoroughbred. He can be a bit grumpy but likes his cuddles too.

I chair the Council's Audit and Risk Committee, the Creative Community Committee and sit on other committees. I am the appointed councillor on the Kaitake Community Board and previously was an Inglewood

Community Board member.

I have lived and worked in this community for most of my life, am married with children and grandchildren. Outside of Council I am an Inglewood Development Trust Trustee and the trust manager, Inglewood RSA treasurer, Moa Mail editor, was a long-time dairy farmer, and now own-operate Fun Ho! Toys.

I ask for your vote. I will represent and promote your views, and work hard for the community.


They're also vital in attracting professionals, trades folk, and encouraging our own family members to move or return to the New Plymouth district making our place a really great place to live and work.

The traditional still image billboard for election campaigning wasn't the picture I wanted to paint of myself to the people who I hope to eventually represent. Creating a living billboard, on the other hand, even with its limitation of exposure, would speak louder and clearer about my intensions of engagement with the people that live in the district of New Plymouth.



At a meeting for prospective candidates, we had been told to make use of the internet medium of social networking. I set up my Facebook profile @louise4NPDC like many others. While Facebook is helpful to spread a word or two and to get some feedback, there is nothing quite like face to face interaction. After experiencing a day sitting out in the open for passer-by's to have a chat and motorists to be able to respond to my hand waves, I knew I had made the right choice.

A 'like' on Facebook is another one of those still images, a symbolic tick. My experience of interacting with motorists was truly wonderful; it is difficult to translate into words. The diverse variety of people that responded and the multiple types of responses indicated to me how unique and amazing everyone is who lives here. The look on people's faces as they saw me, the frowns that turned into smiles and serious looks that ended up laughing, were priceless! I was impressed by the myriad of ways to wave: like the queen, a nod from the bros, a thumb's up, etc.

The conversations I had with the passer-by's were long and meaningful, neighbours so friendly, offering me cups of coffee, it felt like a real welcoming community. The majority of people I spoke to loved living in New Plymouth and were more concerned about knowing councillors and having accessible ways of engagement between them and council





than anything else. I asked one older gentleman who his favourite mayor was and he told me 'Mayor Gilmour' because he was approachable and use to walk down Devon Street every Friday to talk with people.

While the internet has provided new ways to connect with people, there is still nothing quite like building relationships through seeing people's faces, hearing their tone of voice and listening to their words. Deep in conversation we can respond to each other in meaningful ways. This is the kind of councillor I would like to be, one that knows the talk on the street and is trusted to represent those views; the people's advocate.

Margaret Scott, Jan Russell and Colleen Butterfield were busy making statuettes and surprisingly the base materials were a wooden dowel, polystyrene, fabric and tin foil. Once Powerpaint and Powertex are applied they take on a whole different life!

Ingrid Vercommen and Suzanne Cardiff were applying the medium to canvas. Ingrid had achieved a 3D effect and Suzanne had combined the Stone Art medium along with Powertex to create a mermaid and seashore scene.



Greetings to our Coastal, Oakura and Omata communities.

As outlined in the August edition of TOM, students are currently working with parents and whanau teachers to select courses and programmes of learning for next year.

The link between school and future employment is a discussion that parents can begin early (Years 6-7) with their children. By exploring children's interests and abilities, links can be made to career possibilities and then the pathway to achieve their career goal can be planned from school to further training and work.

Some handy hints to assist in this process include: -

When thinking about interests jobs can be categorized in three main areas – jobs to do with people, e.g. nurse, teacher, etc.

jobs to do with things e.g. making, shaping, designing, constructing, repairing e.g. builder, fashion design;

jobs to do with information, e.g. accountant, lawyer, information technology network developer. This is a simplistic tool but nonetheless useful to

begin the career pathways process.

can change as new opportunities arise.

Sometimes young people find the process very scary if they believe career decisions (or any decision for that matter) have to be perfect and that they cannot have any doubt. Discussing how to make the best decision and using a thinking tool like PMI (Positive Minus Interesting) encourages young people to be able to make a decision in the knowledge that plans

Asking friends and family to share career path stories illustrates how job opportunities develop and evolve

Ultimately a decision has to be made. Not making a decision is a decision (by default) in itself, the trick is to be pro-active and commit to the best decision following a robust process.

Although living in the 21st Century demands us all to constantly acquire new skills here is a summary of key skills for the workplace: -

communication/interpersonal skills;

information skills – gathering/sorting/arranging; collaboration with others to solve complex problems; thinking/creative/problem solving skills;

number skills;

language skills;

using technologies to access and analyse information; business and management skills;

the ability to keep learning to adapt to constant change in the workplace.

The Careers NZ website *www.careers.govt.nz* is very helpful for students and parents, it has great information on what jobs entail and the school qualifictions that are needed for entry into the job.
