

Throughout the year we have had 39 call outs and 2 new members. It is always good to have new blood coming into the service.



Previously "The Waiting Room", Laurent Manderson's café has taken on a new life as Café Lahar. The name was conceived on a trip along Wiremu Road. "There were lahars everywhere and you could see the mountain and the sea. It was full-on Taranaki," Laurent said – "It just summed it up." The café also sports a colourful new sign, designed by Laurent's father-inlaw, Peter Lambert. "They're the colours you get when you're walking back from "The Patch", Laurent told me. The revamped courtyard is looking inviting, the menu is being expanded to include pizzas and other delicacies that as yet remain secret, and a license is on its way soon. There are even plans afoot to erect a screen and get a projector up and running to screen night-time movies over summer. Watch this space!

Directly opposite, Coastal Image has been transformed into Trevor Read's photographic studio. The paint job is glossy black and white, the central window sports his new logo and flanking this, each expansive side window carries three huge, panoramic-style photos that showcase his talent. "I made them really big so that there is good impact from the café across the road," he told me, and the overall effect is stunning. 




The underlying message was that we need to look out for each other, something that CTS students do particularly well as it stands. However, if the habit is instilled at a school age, then the chances of that child wearing a seatbelt when not in their parents' care will increase.

Looking at local statistics, Taranaki road fatalities have halved since 2004, however, what has increased is minor to serious crashes. Thanks to the message from Taranaki Roadsafe and Geoff at RockUp, we can decrease the likelihood of minor to serious injury occurring by looking out for each other and checking our "harnesses".





## Pastor Kevin sends aid to **Zimbabwe**

Call it divine intervention, good luck or what you will, but the timing of aid to Zimbabwe couldn't have been better for Oakura and Okato pastor, Kevin McFetridge of New Zeal Church. He was looking to help deal with poverty somehow in the global sense. All the pieces have fallen into place and now the container of aid should be being unloaded in South Africa.

The first piece fell into place back in September when Kevin went to Zimbabwe with a group of other ministers who are part of the Network of Christian Ministries. This group has contacts in Zimbabwe also and these fellow Christians and business people showed Kevin's group around the war-torn dictatorship. Now that aid is on its way to the country, these contacts will be responsible for distributing the aid.

Kevin and his wife, Angela, took on the project of providing aid to an orphanage called 'Emthunzini Wethemba'. This orphanage has 50 children housed in extremely poor circumstances. So the couple and their parishioners took on the task of providing the basics for these children – that is 50 of everything – blankets, pillows, toothbrushes, pyjamas, soap, undies, etc. The team of about 50 (how coincidental!) worked tirelessly to reach their deadline of mid-October when the container bound for South Africa would leave. And they achieved it only to find that the church in Auckland they were working with had upped the size of the container from 20 feet to 40 feet so this took a bit more filling. In went medical and surgical supplies, mattresses, lights and more.

As you read this, the container should be being unpacked and some very grateful children will be enjoying the things our children take for granted. Kevin feels very strongly that it is his duty to help the less fortunate and through his and others meagre efforts, poverty and deprivation can be alleviated for some, even if temporarily.

Kevin hopes to send another container in the near future and he is very humbled by the way the local community and those from Palmerston North have pitched

in and donated goods for this cause.

## Brett Willis grows organic structures in back yards on the coast

I was enjoying a chai at Café Lahar the other day when Noreen Riordan came in for a snack, saw me and said she had seen an unusual looking igloo-like hut down at Warea. It had aroused her curiosity and she suggested that I could be the one to investigate it. Intrigued, I headed down the road to see it for myself.

I was met by its creator, Brett Willis, who said that he had another one he'd like to show me in the village; one he had built as a playhouse for his and Sonja Jorgensen's daughter, Nova. It was just the cutest thing – a golden sand-coloured, curvaceous, vaulted structure trimmed with corrugated iron

and embellished with strings of coloured beads hanging in the apex above the front door. Hobbiton above ground.

Brett first hit on the idea of making such sculptural vaults about two years ago, when he was working for Kaimai Hydropower, building and repairing the underground vaults that serve as support systems for the hydro-mines. Parts of a vault exert a thrust that requires counter-resistance. When built underground, the ground itself provides the resistance required but when built above ground, it relies on external forces.

Although the concept of vault-shaped buildings dates back to ancient Egypt, Brett is particularly inspired by the 18th - early 19th century Spanish architect, Antoni Gaudi (1852 -1926), who was fascinated by organic forms (forms having no straight lines) and their inner forces, which express themselves on the surface. Interestingly, Gaudi, arrived at a type of structure that came to be known as "equilibrated" – that is, it stood on its own without external bracing or buttressing. In Gaudi's words, it stood "like a tree stands."

The thin-shelled, ferro-cement-covered vaults Brett is building now, however, originate in Mexico. He laminates pine to make arcs, then incorporates driftwood to create interesting forms. He installs windows and doors and then covers the "bones" with reinforcing steel and mesh. Then, he plasters the structure with light-weight cement to keep out the elements and reveal its final form, and paints it in an earthy range of colours.

Brett is now experimenting with building vault-shaped, insulated sleep-outs using curved corrugated iron, incorporated with wood finishes. If you are interested in owning one of either style, phone Brett on 027 717 0888 or e-mail him on wabizumai @live.com.


