



St Paul's gains another stained glass window

St Paul's Church in Okato has recently received a beautiful legacy. With the closure of St Nicholas's in Rahotu and thanks to the generosity of a local family, the foyer of St Paul's Church now features a stunning, stained glass

In 1959 the Gibson family - Massan, Alexander (Alex), Donald and Arthur Gibson, had applied to the Rahotu Anglican Committee to have a stained glass window installed in their church in memory of their deceased parents, George and Isabella (Jane). They submitted a proposed design of Jesus with two children created by Miller Studios Ltd of Dunedin, which was approved. However the Faculties Committee of the Waikato Anglican Diocese advised that some of the finished products by Miller Studios had "not been very satisfactory." The family took heed of this information and instead commissioned the English firm Messrs. James Powell and Sons (Whitefriars) Ltd, to do the work. Whitefriars was a well-known glasshouse that had been making high quality glass pieces in exceptional colours for 250 years. The business unfortunately closed in 1980. A comparison with the other, albeit beautiful, New Zealand-made stained glass windows in St Paul's testifies to the wisdom of their decision.


The completed window was shipped to Wellington on the SS Rangitoto and installed above the altar at St Nicholas' in 1961. The final cost was 94 pounds and 12 shillings, which the four brothers shared. To the disappointment of the Gibson family and the alarm of the

manufacturers, it was thought at first that the distinctive signature in the form of a Whitefriar motif had been overlooked. However, it was eventually discovered in the extreme right hand corner of the window. This motif increases the historical and monetary value of the piece.

Due to declining attendances, St Nicholas's Church has now closed and will be sold by the Anglican Church. Because George Gibson had been a lay preacher at Okato and to prevent the window from being lost or forgotten, his daughter-in-law Tansie felt it would be fitting that it to be donated to St Paul's. It was cleaned and repaired by Richard Landers and installed by Master Builder, Rodney Smith at a total cost of \$2,500.

The stained glass window donated in memory of James and Isabella Gibson






Brothers Bernard (left) and Willie Gibson, flank St Paul's newest stained glass window.

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
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Greetings for 2009

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


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Water Restrictions in Place for Okato Residents

20 January 2008

Low water flows in the Mangatete Stream have required New Plymouth District Council to introduce partial water restrictions for Okato residents.

The restrictions mean there is a total ban on the use of sprinklers, irrigation systems and unattended hoses. Hand-held hoses may be used on the odds and evens system: At odd-numbered houses on odd-numbered days, and at even-numbered houses on even-numbered days.

"We have a consent for drawing water from the Mangatete Stream but its current flows are at a level that requires us to introduce water conservation measures," says Manager Water and Wastes Brent Manning.

"It is therefore necessary for residents to keep their water use to a minimum until the partial water ban is lifted."

The rest of the district is reasonably dry, but recent rain has helped freshen the ground and keep the water flowing well in the district's streams.

"However water conservation is always a good idea at this time of year no matter where you live, as a few days of sunshine and wind can change the picture significantly," says Mr Manning.



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Vehicles on Kaihihi Road Beach

Recently there have been a number of complaints about quads and 4WD vehicles racing around on sensitive areas of the beach at Lower Kaihihi Road. Of primary concern is the damage being done to the upper dune area near the marginal strip (the forested area along the cliffs/banks that is administered by the Department of Conservation).

Over the past years, sand has been building up in the area due to a large amount of sediment input down the Stony River (a result of the slips running into the Pyramid Stream). Plants are now colonising the dunes which will increase dune stability and allow them to increase in size.

Sand dunes of this nature provide important habitat for nesting shorebirds such as oystercatchers and terns. These species are extremely prone to disturbance as they nest on the upper shore and their nests are easily run over or stood on. Although currently rare on this particular piece of coast, there is the potential for the arrival of more shorebirds if disturbance can be kept to a minimum. Many shorebirds are found on nearby Komene Road Beach and we hope they will increase their home range.

Dunes also provide protection against erosion to the land behind. Although there is currently an abundance of sand in this area, it generally comes and goes over time. It is important that dunes are allowed to stabilise during times of accretion (when sand is deposited).

By and large, the majority of beach users are very respectful of coastal environments. We have no problem with people using vehicles and quads to access surf and fishing spots as long as they minimise their impact while doing so. At a recent site visit we were disappointed to see tyre marks over a small dune area that is naturally developing. Marram has started to colonise the dune, but vehicles are hindering progress.

The New Plymouth District Council has also been fielding complaints about the issue and we have been in discussion with them about solutions to the problem. A simple option to reduce disturbance to the upper dune area is to block off vehicle access. This is something that we do not wish to do! We have agreed with the Council that we will monitor driver behaviour on the beach but will be forced to close access if vehicles continue to disrupt sensitive habitats within the area. We ask the locals to assist us to prevent this from happening. Please:

- 3 Refrain from driving/riding on the upper dune area and areas colonised by plants.
- 4 Discourage others from driving/riding over these areas.
- 5 If you see people using the beach irresponsibly, record registration plates/vehicle details and notify DOC at 759 0350 or 0800 DOC Hotline, 0800 362 468 after hours).
- 6 Educate others about the effects of vehicles on sensitive dune areas.

Okato Eyesores

You will undoubtedly be aware of the appalling and deteriorating condition of Okato's former primary school and of the doctor's surgery, both government-owned properties. In an effort to have the situation rectified Jim Lawn, on behalf of the Okato Community Trust, has written to Members of Parliament Shane Ardern (Taranaki/King Country), Chester Borrows (Wanganui), Pita Sharples (Maori Affairs), Anne Tolley (Education) and Jonathan Young (New Plymouth).

The Trust has placed a petition and copy of this letter at local businesses, to remain until the end of February. If you agree with the sentiments expressed in the letter, please call in at one of the local businesses and sign the petition. You may sign a petition only once or you will invalidate your signature.

The letter reads as follows:

Dear Member of Parliament,

Congratulations on your electoral success in November and we wish you every success in helping govern our country.

We, on behalf of the Okato Community and others, would like to bring to your attention the deplorable situation the last Labour Government brought to our once pretty little town with the closure in 2004 of the Okato Primary School and reconstructing and integrating this school on another site with the Okato College.

We believe this action by the Labour Government, and its failure to remedy the same, contributed to the Labour Party losing the New Plymouth electorate by some 100 votes.

The old primary school building, as well as the old doctor's surgery (another deteriorating, government-owned building), are government assets surplus to requirements and are supposedly to be now earmarked for Treaty settlement. With the deterioration of these buildings and therefore a rapid loss of value, this will cost the New Zealand taxpayer more to fund a Treaty settlement.

Surely it would be more advantageous to the New Zealand taxpayer that recipients of any Treaty settlement and the Okato Community to have these old buildings sold and removed; with the resultant bare land maintained or sold as farmland, residential development, or used as a park and the monies received from sale put into a fund for Treaty settlements.

On the edge of the school property is the town cenotaph honouring those who fought in war, of which some paid the supreme sacrifice for our country. In close proximity is a roundabout erected in memory of our early settlers and pioneers who would be appalled and greatly saddened to see how their early work and great sacrifice for this community and their country is not being shown the appreciation it deserves by those who have governed our country in recent times.

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The Travels of an Extraordinary Bear

Rainbow Teddy is an extraordinary bear who has travelled all the way to Kharikhola in Nepal to befriend a little boy. Lesley Dowding has written a children's book, "The Travels of an Extraordinary Bear" about his big adventure. It is illustrated with photographs taken on location by Inglewood businesswoman Robin Drake. Robin, with plantsman and avid trekker Allan Jellyman, established a charity in 2004 called "The Band Aid Box" which provides funds and volunteer support for the medical, dental, optical and educational needs of Kharikola village and surrounding areas where Rainbow Bear has gone to live.

Every year, members of a volunteer medical team including doctors, nurses, a dental surgeon and a pharmacist pay their own fares to fly from New Zealand to Nepal. Then, carrying the medical supplies they've brought with them, they trek for up to three days to join their Nepalese counterparts for a 14 day medical clinic held in Solu Khumbu, a remote rural health post 2,300 metres above sea level in the Everest region. A group of trekkers from New Zealand accompanies them and is part of the sustainability plan: they carry a separate allocation of medical supplies and help to set up the clinic. In April 2009, a new team will be setting off for the 5th consecutive year. And this time, there will be an exciting first for education in the region: Sarah Davey, an international

educator who specializes in teaching English as a Foreign Language and develops related programmes, will conduct English enrichment workshops for teachers in Kharikhola and its surrounding villages. Lesley and Robin's book will be making the trip too, to be translated into the local language. Robin says that the trust is indebted to Lesley for the gift of her story, which she has also narrated for an audio CD that accompanies the book. The container of aid varied from food and medical supplies to new underwear and bedding. The response to us from Zimbabwe was one of exceptional gratitude.



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
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
