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
Rebecca Ripia, mother of two has seen the need for a home based care facility and is aware of the benefits this could bring, as her eldest son also attended in-home care when Rebecca was working full time.

Rebecca and her many friends and associates have chatted about the lack of child minding facilities within Okato and how beneficial it would be to have these available.

Rebecca understands the need for families to have the flexibility of working and parenting and with this facility nearby it can alleviate the stress of working to structured deadlines as Rebecca can work around each individuals' needs and working hours. "I am pretty flexible," says Rebecca "and with having juggled work commitments and childcare myself I totally understand where parents are at in regards to this."

The organisation Rebecca works with has been operating for a number of years and allows people the option of choosing "homes" rather than a childcare centre. The programme she will be following is family directed using in-home and community learning settings. The programme also focuses on nurturing the child and building respectful relationships between children, families and Rebecca.

Hours are negotiable and the days available are Monday to Thursday 8am –5pm. (Fridays are negotiable). This does not mean your child has to be in care for the entire day, you may wish to opt for just a few hours, maybe to fit in with milking times. An option of after school care can also be provided if the need arises. Another advantage is there will be no charge to the parents if your child is sick or if you have a planned holiday coming up. Fees are \$6 per hour, however subsidies are available if applicable to your family.







Each child is given their own hand book which is similar to a diary, with daily recordings of their day – what activities they have been involved in, achievements, photos and much more. Rebecca aims to utilise the facilities available within the Okato township which will include walks to the domain, visits to our community library, outside play at their fully fenced section which includes a sandpit, swing, trikes and maybe even collecting the fresh eggs from their chooks. They can also do some home baking, play with the playdough, read books, puzzle time or get creative with some paint! The only thing you will need to provide is food and clothes, nappies and bottles if required.

Rebecca is situated in Okato, therefore nice and handy for drop offs etc. Contact number (06) 752 4501. From here, if applicable, subsidies can be discussed with the organisation Rebecca is involved with, as well as hours, days etc.



Father Garty:

Man of God and people's priest

Okato's resident Catholic priest, Father Francis Garty, celebrated his 90th birthday on 7 September with 240 parishioners, fellow priests, family and friends, who hailed from as far away as Auckland and Bluff. To mark the occasion, I talked to Father Garty about his life. Father Garty's family roots are in Ireland. His grandfather, Patrick, came out to



work in the Central Otago goldfields, via Australia, in 1886, becoming one of New Zealand's earliest pioneers. Patrick married in Dunedin and one of his sons, Thomas, became employed by the railways there as a tablet porter, responsible for implementing a safety system which prevented more than one train occupying a stretch of line at the same time. It was while he was there that he married Margaret. After a time, Thomas's work took him, with his growing family, to the tiny settlement of Karioi, near Ohakune in the King Country. There, on 7 September 1920, Thomas and Margaret's fourth child was born, joining brothers John and Eric (who became known as Dick) and sister Margaret (or Peg) to complete the family. The baby boy was baptised Francis Patrick Garty.

When Francis, or Frank as he became known, was two years old, his father was transferred to Pukerua Bay, about 30km north of Wellington. Frank duly completed his primary education at Plimmerton and Pukerua Bay Primary Schools. Father Garty's outstanding memory of those days is of the marvellous skills of his female teacher, who was responsible for teaching all aspects of the curriculum to students ranging from Primer 1 (New Entrants) to Standard 6 (Year 8) in the single classroom that was Pukerua Bay Primary School. Tragically, Frank's father died in December 1931 when Frank was only 11 years old, and Margaret and the children had to move from their railway house in Pukerua Bay to Plimmerton, where Frank completed his Standard 6 year. His primary education had been conducted entirely at secular schools.

In contrast, between 1933 and 1937, Frank's secondary education was completed at St Patrick's Marist College in Wellington. It was there that he developed his love of sport. He earned a place in the school's first fifteen rugby team and was involved in boxing, cross country running and tennis. More importantly, the school supported his Catholic faith and, having thought quite a bit about pursuing the priesthood, he was accepted by the archbishop as a candidate for the ministry late in his fifth form year, 1937.

So it was that early the following year, at the age of 17 and a half, Frank found himself travelling on a series of trains and the Wellington-Lyttleton ferry on the long journey to Mosgiel, 15km south of Dunedin. There, he entered Holy Cross College, committing himself to a seven year course of long days, hard work and strong discipline, punctuated by games of soccer and handball for fitness and pleasure. Having entered the seminary, he never had a doubt that he was in the right place and, on 12 November 1944, he was ordained at St Mary of the Angels Church in Wellington. Now it was time for Father

Francis Garty to take up his ministry – to, in his own words, "serve and assist the people."

He has taken very seriously indeed his promise of obedience to the archbishop, and his priestly duties of offering the mass, baptising his flock, teaching (for years he spent about three hours every week day, plus travel, teaching Religious Education in state schools), praying and visiting. Father Garty says that getting to know people of all faiths and helping them if he could has been a great joy and one of the most rewarding things about his ministry. In every community he has served, and especially in those communities that surround Mount Taranaki, he has earned the love, friendship and respect of many and has been an inspiration to Christians of all denominations. His first appointment was to Lower Hutt (1945-1948). Following that, he served at Reefton (1948-1954), Linton (1954-1955), Manaia, his first parish as Parish Priest (1955-1959), Hataitai (1959-1962), Levin (1962-1967), Kaponga (1967-1977, 1986-1998) Waitara (1977-1981), Opunake (1981-1984), Brooklands (1984-1985), Marton (1998-2002) and, since 2002, Okato. As a result of his selfless ministry, he received the Queens Service Medal (QSM) for his services to the community from Dame Cath Tizard, the then Governor General of New Zealand, at Government House, Wellington, in 1993

Father Garty has been nominally retired since 1998, but he continues to serve his people with the same passion and dedication with which he started out. "If I had the choice again, I would do the same," he says. And now, seventy-two years after entering the religious life, he rises in the very early hours of each morning to pray, celebrates mass every day and continues to take to the road in his little red car to visit parishioners, friends, family and people in need.

However, this story is not complete without further acknowledgement of Father's family, "I had a marvellous mother and father," he comments, warmly, "and my brothers and sister were very important to me." Sadly, he counts off the deaths of his mother in 1946, John in 1985, Dick in 1999 and Peg in June of this year. Now, he is the only surviving sibling. His nieces and nephews and their offspring remain though, and they all hold their special places in his heart, as he does in theirs. Over the years, he has celebrated many significant occasions - births, baptisms, marriages and funerals - with and for both immediate and extended family. It must have been a great joy, then, to see them arrive from so far a field to help celebrate his special day.

Thank you, Father Garty, for your friendship, your leadership and your work in our community. We at TOM, together with the Okato community, wish you health, happiness and fulfilment always.



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Community say protect Waikirikiri Lagoon

The students want the public to understand the initiative behind this project and the importance of retaining its integrity. They are very pleased with the fantastic support from the local community and hope to maintain this.

A gym for Okato – you can help


Coastal Taranaki School recently took up the offer of a substantial amount of guality secondhand gym equipment.
