Dale Copeland, Taekwondo-Do Exponent, Earns Her Black Belt 4th Dan

Taekwon-Do is one of the most systematic and scientific of the traditional martial arts. Its predecessor, Taekyon, was developing in Korea throughout its 5000-year history, initially as a way of training body and mind, but the movements and patterns that make up Taekwon-Do were devised by General Choi Hong Hi while he was a prisoner during World War II. The discipline shares some features with other Oriental martial arts and has gained something from the styles practised in the countries surrounding Korea, but the philosophy and symbolism of Taekwon-Do are unique. It has become a means of self-defence, a philosophy for living and a way of life. Back in 1999, however, Dale Copeland simply believed that her daughter needed some self-defence skills. Because Toby was too young at that time to drive herself to a place where

her daughter needed some self-defence skills. Because Toby was too young at that time to drive herself to a place where she could get them, Dale began driving her twice a week to Oakura, where Mr Murray Smith was running an International Taekwon-Do club. Not one to waste time or an opportunity, and recognising furthermore that "everyone needs a group of friends and people with whom to share a common interest," Dale joined too. Under Murray's tutelage, she and Toby gained their yellow belts and when the club closed down they travelled further, to the Taranaki Taekwon-Do Club in New Plymouth. Toby has long since moved away from home but Dale has been practising Taekwon-Do for 12 years now.

Fellow club member and newly promoted 5th Dan, Kirsten Livingstone says, "I have never met anyone who is so fanatical, and who has embraced the 'Art' of Taekwon-Do with such a passion," adding that Dale demonstrates all five tenets of Taekwon-Do: courtesy, integrity, perseverance, self-control, and indomitable spirit. These are the attributes that have facilitated Dale's rise through the ranks to a position more elevated than she would ever have dreamed of.

During the weekend of 28/29 August, she was put through her paces to prove her worthiness to be promoted to Black Belt 4th Dan. Over months, she had worked on her strength and fitness — sprinting, doing press-ups and squat kicks three or four times a week, and doing gym work twice a week. She had practised her moves and learned four new sequences, though only three were required. "One of them has 68 moves," Dale shudders. "That's a lot of learning!" And to achieve an additional requirement at this level, she had written a 153-page thesis, which analyses Taekwon-Do's 24 patterns or tul.

Dale's formal practical assessment, which took place at the end of a two-day long Master class, was in front of a panel of International Taekwon-Do Federation judges, including

an Australian 8th Dan master. A sizeable audience of Taekwon-Do exponents and others looked on as she put on an impressive display of patterned sequences and techniques, self-defence, sparring, and board breaking. And so it was that Dale, a few days short of her 68th birthday, earned her Black Belt 4th Dan certificate, the stripes that are the distinguishing mark of her seniority, Life Time Membership of Worldwide Taekwon-Do, and even more kudos amongst her peers.

I ask Dale, "Where to next?"

"I don't look to the future," she replies." I just want to keep training and learning and moving upwards for as long as I can." Which is exactly as I would expect!

Skiing is in the Blood

Local boy, Lenny Binsbergen, a 10 year old who attends Coastal Taranaki School, has done fantastically well in the local and national ski champs this winter, securing first place in the Taranaki Primary and Intermediate Ski Championships. Lenny completed the course at a blazing pace of 27.08secs, and gained the fastest time of the day in both Primary and Intermediate sections. The championships involve skiing through gates, the length of a "so called" giant slalom course, where at every given gate you have to turn at the right time and use the skiing technique so you can be as fast as possible through this course. In early August Lenny attended the North Island Champs at Mt Ruapehu, where he came 26th out of 130 primary boys. Another great achievement. Lenny has been exposed to skiing from a very early age as his parents Christina and Lars, both keen skiers themselves, are active members of the Stratford Mountain Club. Lars is on the club committee and Christina is coaching the up and coming skiers and racers of the club. Lenny says he first started skiing at the age of three, taught by his mum who is proficient in ski technique, which has enabled Lenny to be able to further develop his skiing skills each year. He's lucky enough to go and ski in Switzerland every three to four years. So he has excelled with his skiing, with many seasons of practising and refining his technique mainly on the local slopes but also on international ones. Lenny has recently migrated to using a snowboard and loves the new challenge and fun it provides. For kids to learn to ski before they snowboard definitely

helps their balancing skills, says his mum, Christina. Lenny loves the terrain that the Manganui ski area can offer. "The t-bar is an easy terrain to learn on and you can have alot of fun in this area. The top tow terrain is much better and larger as there are lots of natural 'half pipes' that we can ski on and the snow is usually softer, which is better for snowboarding on," says Lenny. He likes the feeling of gaining speed when skiing and also enjoys building jumps and using the natural terrain to jump from. He has just learned to master the use of the top tow nutcracker lift on his own, which gives him a huge amount of freedom to ski around and explore the area so close to the top of Mt Taranaki. Mt Taranaki is a great boon for local skiers, and we are very fortunate as it is handy, less crowded and cheaper than going to the bigger mountains. The club has a very nice day lodge or overnight facilities where you can relax and watch everyone ski and come down the slopes.

Taranaki Fringe Garden Festival

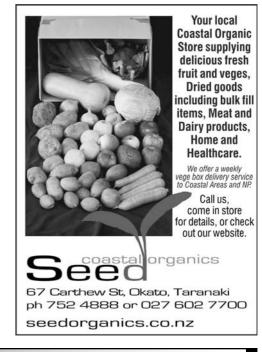

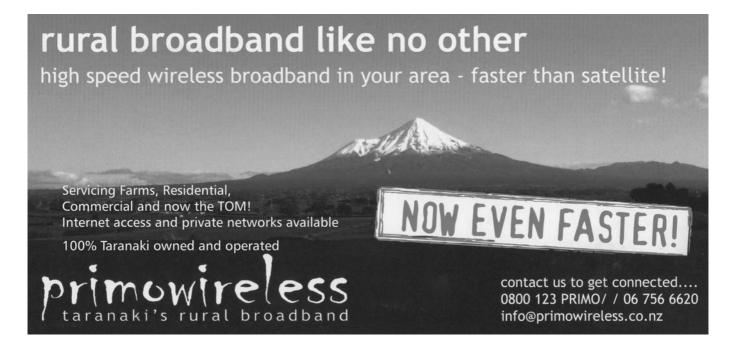
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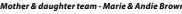

TOM GARDEN -Marjorie Sharpe, In Memoriam

Marjorie Sharpe passed away peacefully at the beginning of the September and she will be sorely missed by so many throughout the coastal community and beyond. Many will remember Marj for her passion for life and, in particular, a passion for gardening.

Marj and Syd were married for 54 years, and with five children, 17 grandchildren and nine (and number 10 on the way!) great-grandchildren they were always busy. Marj and Syd ran a farm on Warea Road between 1964 and 1998, but even on a busy farm and with a young family, Marjorie loved her garden and often disappeared off to stroll around it and pull up the odd weed. They opened up their garden to others to enjoy as

part of the Rhododendron Festival for the first time in 1994 and continued to do so for many years.

In 1998 they moved to Okato where they expertly transformed a ¼ acre paddock into a beautiful expansive garden full of colour and shape. An immaculate lawn was bordered by an abundance of colour, and box hedges were shaped to form separate areas and dells to enjoy. It made a perfect venue for their granddaughter's wedding. Marj loved to have fun and this showed in her garden with a fairy dell for the children to enjoy and garden knick-knacks hidden in amongst the foliage — even a very realistic dovecote with dove statues! Marj loved to mix colours; she didn't like straight lines and liked things to look natural and as Syd says, "messy"! The patio was always covered with pot plants spilling over onto the lawn. She loved roses — their shape and colour and smell.

Marj was always willing to impart knowledge and advice to other gardeners, and inspired so many in the region who came to visit her. In 2000 Marj and Syd founded the Taranaki Coastal Garden and Art Safari, giving the opportunity for people to enjoy gardens around the coast from Manaia to Rahotu. It proved such a success, the first year having 32 gardens open, that they had to alternate the area covered each year... one year Okato to Rahotu and the next Manaia to Rahotu. Proceeds went to local charities, including the Heart Foundation, House for Karen and Hospice. In 2010, after 10 years, Marj and Syd decided to close the Safari.

Marj was also a very talented artist. She was able to turn her hand to painting for friends and family, but her garden was never far from her heart and she loved to paint flowers and scenery. She was an active community member attending the Women's Institute in Warea, and indoor and outdoor





bowling clubs, and she coached bowls for the coastal tournament in local primary schools, including Oakura and Okato. She was always there for the family and grandchildren, supporting them at sports events and entertaining.

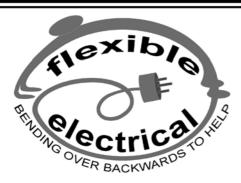
About seven years ago Marj and Syd moved into New Plymouth and, with a smaller garden, spent time travelling Europe, Canada and America, even going on cruise ships.

Pet Dental Health

Periodontal disease is the leading cause of early tooth loss in dogs and cats, with 80% of dogs over 2 years old being affected. Left untreated, periodontal abscesses can spread bacteria, via the bloodstream, to the major organs.

Predisposing factors are advancing age, soft diets, and pug-nosed and toy dog breeds.

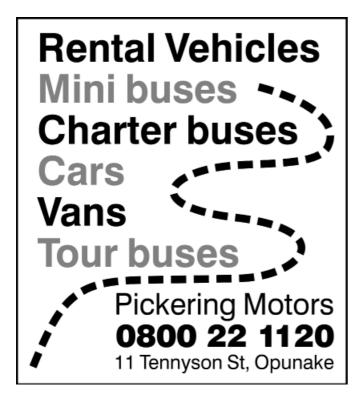
Periodontal disease starts with plaque, which calcifies to form tartar, and the gums become inflamed and infected. Tartar build-up and infection results in receding gums and loss of bone around the tooth roots. Eventually the teeth loosen and fall out.

Affected animals will have bad breath, and may have difficulty eating, loss of appetite and weight loss. Infection may spread to the liver, lungs and kidneys.

Mild tartar build-up may be removed in a co-operative patient during a routine consult but an anaesthetic is required for a thorough dental procedure. Teeth are ultrasonically scaled and polished, and antibiotics are administered. Early treatment is essential to avoid tooth loss and annual follow up is advised.

Prevention includes regular health checks, daily care such as brushing, and dental diets and chews.

If your pet has bad breath, inflamed gums or tartar build-up (observed by raising the top lip on each side of the mouth), then you should seek veterinary advice.

We have been focussing on food for our learning theme this term. What to feed our littlies is often a hot topic amongst parents. We all want to get a variety of healthy foods into our children's diets, and we all want to avoid dinnertime battles. Also, a few children have food allergies or intolerances, which can make food preparation even more challenging.

So this term we have been sharing our collective knowledge of child-friendly food, and our tricks of the trade for getting good food into our children. The best trick of all is, of course, involving children in the preparation of their own food. The kids have had loads of fun peeling veges for vegetable soup and dressing their own pizza with a large selection of healthy toppings. We have also baked cookies and decorated cupcakes. Not surprisingly the kids have loved sampling their own cooking, veges and all! The food theme has been useful for discussing/practising food hygiene with children, and for talking about healthy food and treat food. It has presented lots of opportunity for rich language and numeracy with discussion about food colours, portion sizes, flavours. etc. We easily incorporated Te Reo Maori vocab/phrases and morning tea karakia also. The children have really enjoyed being a part of morning tea preparation and clean-up duties in the kitchen. Never too early to start kids on doing the dishes!

Other food-related activities this term have been looking after our vege garden and planting strawberries. We have also been putting together a cookbook of our children's favourite recipes, which will be published and sold as a fundraiser soon...

The ideal or recommended height before a child can be without a booster or car seat is 148cm.

Infant restraint: birth to at least one year of age (-13kg)

Convertible (baby to child) restraint: birth to approximately four years of age (-18kg)

Front-facing child restraint: about one year to approximately four years of age (9–18kg)

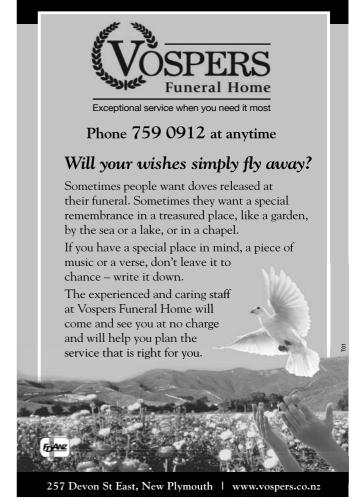
Booster seat: from approximately four to 10 years of age (18–36kg)

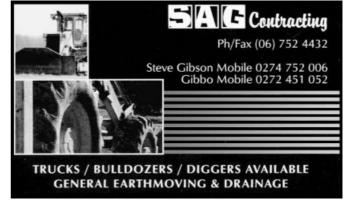
Child safety harness: from approximately four to 10 years of age (18–36kg)
