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From the Editor



This editorial sits above a piece from Johnathan Young about the end to oil and gas exploration in Taranaki - the single biggest change to our local environment since Think Big in the 80's. Many are viewing this change with alarm and I wonder if the price of oil was at an all time high, would this be happening?

We as a province face the challenge of re-inventing how we make our wealth and contribute to the wealth of the nation - I have no inspired answers to this but I have faith in the human spirit to find a way.

Change is afoot in Oakura too with Mike Mckie's urban developement on the south side of the village - how will an extra 10-15 houses a year for the foreseeable future change our present lifestyles? Many are questioning this proposal and want to retain Oakura in it's present state - right or wrong? All I know is we as humans can and do adapt to change. If our founding forefathers hadn't set off from their homelands in the north to find a better life for themselves and their families - adopting change as their road forward, then we wouldn't be here today.

It always amazes me how adaptive villagers are in Oakura - today many are arriving from other lands with their families, they love the lifestyle on offer, they set up innovative businesses and they infuse the local scene (schools, sports clubs, clubs and businesses) with vibrancy. These immigrants have embraced change no doubt with large doses of apprehension but we have all benefited.

So I tell myself not to fear change, not to fight change - humans have always found a way of adapting to new and challenging situations so we can too here in Taranaki - we need to face these challenges to determine what our best way forward is.... and hopefully most of the time we get it right.

The end to oil and gas exploration

There's been considerable discussion about the ramifications of the government's new offshore oil and gas exploration ban. As National's Energy and Resources spokesperson I've said, and continue to say, I support a transfer of knowledge, skills and investment into the greening of the petroleum industry. However, before announcing their decision, I would've suggested the Government engage in some meaningful dialogue with Oil and Gas leaders. Then they might have discovered the industry is developing ultra-low and zero emission fuels from natural gas feedstock, like methanol and hydrogen – something we can't do if we can't extract natural gas.

If Ms Ardern had waited for an independent sector-neutral review from the soon-to-be-appointed Climate Commission, a more joined up plan between all energy sectors could be put in place. We could have ensured that energy security was never compromised. We could've empowered the Emissions Trading Scheme to be the true agnostic mechanism of change. Energy dependent industries across the country could maintain their business confidence and devise investment strategies around transition that are measured and affordable.

Unfortunately the decision to end exploration will not reduce emissions at all, because production will simply move elsewhere in the world. Many overseas countries depend on coal for energy production. Their CO2 emissions would halve if they could switch to natural gas while they transition to renewable energy, so we should be looking for more gas and exporting it. According to the International Energy Agency, one of the key reasons that emission increases stalled in 2014, 2015 and 2016 was because of gas replacing coal. The country that had the greatest reduction in greenhouse gas emissions was the USA - and a significant reason was that they replaced coal with gas for electricity generation.

By stopping New Zealand's new offshore gas exploration we are turning our backs on an opportunity that would help reduce global emissions and provide a major economic return to improve both our standard of living and the environment.

Basement is home to boutique brewery

In the heart of Oakura, below the cozy home life of a family of five, a basement brewery has sprung to life. The brewery is called Three Sisters Brewery and began with a small home brew kit put together by Joe and a couple of friends, Charlie and Ben. The group enjoyed hanging out together with their families and partaking of the latest batch of freshly brewed beer.

The hobby brewery soon blossomed from a "grainfather" 30 litre operation to a 300 litre "bigger than Ben Hur" operation and has taken on a life of its own these days. Joe is always working some sort of wizardry on his ingredients and coming up with new and interesting beers. The small batch production means the beer is always fresh and Joe says "fresh is best" with the flavour profile the sharpest when it is first brewed.

Joe is the master brewer and has meticulously put the new brewing equipment together and his eye for and attention to detail has ensured a spectacular product which is now being sold at Butlers Bottle Store, the 4 Square, Peeking Panda, Black Sands and other outlets in New Plymouth (Liquorland Fitzroy and Motorua Four Square).

The couple have developed an eye-catching set of labels for the five beers they brew and each label reflects the iconic nature of Taranaki/New Plymouth/Oakura. The name Three Sisters Brewery pays homage to the couples three daughters and to the three sisters landmark at Tongaporoutu.

The beers are:

Oakura Blonde: Life should be easy, and so should drinking beer. It doesn't come much easier than this Blonde Ale. Pilsner, Wheat and Toffee Malts; Pacific Jade Hops and California Ale Yeast with water drawn from Oakura's aquifer. Kick back and enjoy!

Medusa, APA: Medusa Hops are a new species of hops, native to Colorado and New Mexico, which produce unique new hop aromas. There are plenty in this APA, along with other rare American varieties El-Dorado and Azacca. Golden Hops and Vienna Malts finish off the flavour profile.

Hot Rod: When Doug Bell from the Hot Rod Show asked to feature the beer on the show, Joe and Sarah had to brew something special. He said his viewers would like something that tasted of burnt rubber, but this Manuka-smoked Lager was the best they could do. Also includes Munich and Vienna Hops and Weihenstephan Lager Yeast, smokin'...

Taranaki Gold, Pilsner: El Dorado Hops are the main feature of this Pilsner. El Dorado means country of treasure and that is certainly how Joe and Sarah feel about Taranaki. They have also

added Simcoe, Mosaic, Chinook, and Eureka Hops to give a uniquely fruity flavour to this golden brew.

Rain in the Face: This was only the second recipe ever brewed. Picking random hops over a few beers one evening...they seem to work well together, especially against the background of Marris Otter Malt.

Joe is adamant having top quality ingredients in his beer and the unique profile of Oakura's water has helped make the beer the award winning brew it is. Rain in the Face - an American Pale Ale has twice won awards - first at the Homebrew awards then at the Brewers Guild Awards last year. In July Three Sisters Brewery will be representing Taranaki with Venture Taranaki at the Auckland Food Show.

Joe and Sarah's passion and hard work has meant something that started as a hobby has grown into a profitable business with potential to put Taranaki on the craft beer map. Currently Three Sisters Brewery is one of very few breweries in Taranaki and locals and tourists alike are enjoying partaking of a truly homegrown product.

Look out for the distinctively Taranaki labels in the beer fridge and try the range - there's sure to be one that fits the palate of all keen beer drinkers and occasional quaffers alike.

Kaitake Community Board

The last Kaitake Community Board meeting was well attended by many anxious locals. Their concerns centre on the Private Plan Change application to Council by Wairau Estate to remove the covenant on its 58ha site and change the current zoning from rural to residential. This is to allow for around 400 lots to be developed. The majority of the application is for residential lots, with some lifestyle lots on the western edge. Local residents Wayne Looker and Richie Shearer made strong deputations that left no doubt whatsoever about the level of apprehension in the community for such a development.

The agenda item being considered by the KCB was to accept or deny the request to publicly notify the application so submissions could be made. There was a deal of information provided on what that process entailed, including information about Council's statutory obligations under the Resource Management Act. These obligations make it clear that Council has no tangible opportunity to refuse to publicly notify the application. The provided information also clearly indicated that by doing so would in no way indicate Council support or opposition to the proposal. Under those circumstances the KCB voted to accept the plan change application to proceed to public notification.

The application met all the statutory requirements in terms of information provided. Our decision does not predetermine an end-result, as the Resource Management Act processes must bae followed. What it recommends is that the process should continue. That was the only decision KCB made at the meeting. Essentially we are being asked to have faith in a process, a process that has to be followed to the letter of the law. The problem for us, the community, is we don't have the necessary expertise or the money to buy that expertise to fully understand all the ramifications of the proposed development. We have to rely on our Council to provide that support for us so we - the community - can make coherent submissions of substance. Submissions that will be considered closely by the decision-makers.

At the moment I'm re-reading The Hitch Hikers Guide to the Galaxy by Douglas Adams. It is a 50,000 word novel and has a certain similarity to the Wairau Estate application. That too is around 50,000 words long and includes a great deal of technical data. In both instances I have found myself going back and reading over certain sections again until I get the gist of what the words actually mean. I'm a speed reader but it still takes a lot of time to understand the latent nuances in the words, sentences and paragraphs! That is why, at the meeting, the KCB set out to seek clarification from Council on matters of detail about the process. We wanted to know what part the Council is prepared to play in ensuring the community fully understand the application and can submit in a rational way. In fact, getting the full gist of its intentions.

The timeframe leading up to any public notification of a request for submissions and the submission period itself is short. This comes at a time when both Council management and governance teams are fully occupied with the 2018/28 Long Term Plan process. The KCB did ask Council for the agenda item to be withdrawn to a later meeting round. That didn't happen, so we asked for the public notification to be held over until after the Council has concluded its deliberations on the Long Term Plan

(May 28, 29, and 30). The councillors will ultimately be the decision-makers on what happens here, and they need to turn their full attention to all aspects of this issue. I believe that would be very difficult for them to do while the intense detail of the 2018/2028 Long Term Plan is being read, digested, debated and decided upon.

The KCB fully realises that at some stage the hoary old 'nimby' assertion will be levelled at the community. The age-old argument that opposition to the development is just by a bunch of not-in-my-backyard locals trying to use political pressure against the council and councillors to protect their backyards and lifestyles. Often that is spread into the public conscience through social media by those who view large tract developments as temporary job sources and money grabs. However it is palpably untrue and particularly unfair. There is plenty of documented instances where local councils face a real struggle to make their district more efficient and smarter. The KCB has been committed for many years to smart community development. We believe we have contributed a great deal to support the NPDC morph into a more forward-thinking organisation in that regard.

The community needs a Council that can institute policies and procedures that enable it to make data-driven decisions, maintain constant awareness of community activities, and stay connected with all of its constituents. That's why we support the New Plymouth District Blueprint, the high level spatial plan for the district that substantiates and implements the 'Shaping our Future Together' vision. Its outcomes will help guide Council decision-making to deliver more integrated social, economic and environmental outcomes for the community. That's what our community we represent is asking for.

The next meeting of the Kaitake Community Board will be held at the Omata School Hall at 7pm on Monday 21 May.

Well done everyone, you modelled resilience yet again, and your children will take constructive life lessons from the way you coped under stress and showed patience and resilience.

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
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Club Championships
