### Vandals take to McDonald Real Estate window



#### Iconic Taranaki/Pouakai Crossing gets a funding boost

New Zealand is renowned for its stunning landscapes and native wildlife. It draws thousands of visitors to our shores each year. This is great news for our economy, but to help sustain this growth we must invest in the conservation areas that make visiting so appealing.

That is why the Government will invest \$76 million through Budget 2017 on new and upgraded tourism infrastructure for the Department of Conservation (DOC). This funding boost is part of a \$178 million tourism infrastructure package. As part of this funding \$3.4m has been given to develop the Taranaki/Pouakai Crossing, which will bring the much needed infrastructure to this incredible walk which is already seeing an increase in tourist numbers.

With the support of Rob Needs, the initial promoter of the crossing, I have been able to work alongside a project team including the Department of Conservation, New Plymouth District Council, Iwi leaders, Venture Taranaki and other individuals who contributed their personal time to present the business case to the Government. This was the 'Team Taranaki' approach this region is well known for.

The Crossing is especially important as it will ease the pressure of numbers on the Tongariro Crossing. Our crossing on Mt Taranaki will be a sister walk to the Tongariro Crossing, and potentially part of a suite of Great Day walks on offer in central North Island.

Developing new locations will ease pressure on tourism hotspots, shift awareness to paths less well travelled, and better share the regional economic benefits of tourism.

Last year international visitor spending in New Zealand reached \$14.5bn, which is more than 20 per cent of New Zealand's total exports of goods and services. It's also a significant employer, generating around 188,000 jobs directly, and a further 144,000 indirectly.

Taranaki's overnight visitor numbers have increased by 10.3 percent for the year ending September 2016 compared to the previous year and numbers have been up again over this past summer. This is ahead of the national average of a 6.2 per cent annual guest night growth. This comes soon after Lonely Planet awarded Taranaki as the Second Best Region to visit in the World.

# Kaitake Community Board

The Kaitake Community Board has been particularly busy since last reporting. We are currently working our way through our Omata community engagement project. It is the last part of our, now nearly three year long consultation process to find out what the people who live in the Kaitake Ward view as current issues, likely future issues and what their aspirations are for the next thirty years! We will combine those findings into the Community Plan to be mandated by Council as part of it's District Blueprint strategy. There will be regular reviews. Many of the community ideas expressed today will change over time, but nevertheless having a long term strategy is a particularly sensible approach. Planning that is bringing the future into the present so that you can do something about it now.

The community board's key role is to make our neighbourhoods better places to live. The Community Plan is about setting the future direction of the communities in the Kaitake Ward and ensuring assets and resources are suitable for achieving that direction. With the growing demand for our desirable lifestyle location west of the city we need to ensure future development is in sync with community values and the necessary infrastructure is forward planned and in place. In many parts of New Zealand over the years there has been far too much indiscriminate development with little regard for the community that is already there. In such cases the necessary infrastructural upgrades lag far behind, putting pressure on services and causing irritation and angst for residents and ratepayers. There has been little emphasis on sustainable development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

As population pressure grows this strategic planning we are doing will provide a 'road map' for the future by establishing agreement around intended outcomes, setting priorities and focusing resources as required to sustain our changing and growing communities. It has been a long and often tiring journey but we have been heartened by the community interaction and feedback we have received. There were well over 100 submissions during the Oakura part of the journey. More than 100 were collected in Okato too, and to date there have been 60 from the Omata community. In each community it is clear locals are determined to retain their neighbourly cohesion and sense of belonging. That is a big part of the appeal that has, and will continue to attract newcomers to live here.

Okato, Oakura and Omata are all quite different but do have some similar issues. A common one is the problem associated with each being intersected by Highway 45. This obviously will never change, so the situation has to be managed with skilful forward planning insight, and a determination by all parties to address the associated speed, parking, and pedestrian movement circumstances that the highway brings. After all the highway has no meaning in itself. Its meaning derives entirely from the two points which it connects. This is just one example of what our three year long study has been about, there are many others.

The next meeting of the Kaitake Community Board will be at Hampton Hall, Okato at 7pm on June 26. Ka kite ano.
