Robbie a national winner

Congratulations to Robbie White of New Plymouth Boys' High School and formerly of Oakura School on winning the National Final of the Race Unity Speech Awards.

Year 11 student Robbie won with his eloquent and potent speech about how true leaders bring people together in unity.

The Speech Awards are a platform for senior high school students to express their ideas on how we can improve race relations in Aotearoa. The Hui featured a panel discussion between journalist Lynda Chanwai-Earle, lawyer Kingi Snelgar and communications specialist Mehpara Khan, small group discussions and in-depth workshops with artists and thinkers.

This was followed by the National Final of the Race Unity Speech Awards, featuring the top six speakers from among the 150 who made speeches this year from around the country. Here is a excerpt of Robbie's speech:

"Up, down, out and within, the tui weaves the nest. The nest of 'he tangata', the nest of the people. Humans woven together, united, regardless of where they come from, their individual beliefs or the colour of their skin.

Without the feathers the bird (the Tui) cannot fly."

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MNZM for Fay

Local long time resident, former Kaitake Community Board member and acclaimed photographer Fay Looney recently became a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit at Government House. Fay was presented with her medal by Dame Patsy Reddy Governor General. The MNZM was received for services to art particularly photography.

TOM asked Fay to tell us a bit about herself and what it meant to receive this award.

How long have you lived in Oakura?

I have spent 77 summers and Xmas's in Oakura. We camped for as long as summer lasted often into February and March, originally in Shearers paddock. I remember Mr Press the honey man who lived there. We moved onto campsite No 1 opposite Jans store for a couple of years then up to Mace Terrace. Before it was Mace Terrace it was a hay paddock where dad built the first bach in that area out of refrigeration cases. Subsequently we spent every summer and most weekends at the beach. I married Harry in 1959 and moved to Koru Rd where I am lucky enough to still live albeit sadly without him now. Our family are two children, five grandchildren and two great grand children.

How long have you been a photographer?

Since the mid 70's

Why did you take up a camera?

I applied for a job selling school photography which turned into a career behind the lens.

What do you enjoy about photography?

Everything, particularly the amazing places its taken me and the incredible people I have met through my lens.

What gear do you use?

Nowdays a mirrorless camera.

How many books/prints etc have you published?

I have been published six times with sales of over 60,000 New Zealand landscape books, plus self publishing 6000 copies of "Taranaki Be here be Surprised" in five different volumes.

What is the best photograph you've ever taken?

The next one I would like to think! I have been rewarded a number of times for my works, they all mean something special. **Most difficult?**

Can't honestly think of one that I would call difficult. Maybe now I'm about to turn 80 - the next one!

What does receiving a gong mean to you?

It means I'm incredibly honoured and humbled by the honour.Still very surprised. Will you ever stop being a photographer?

Not likely I see images everyday that I live in this wonderfull landscape.



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Zero Carbon

One of my favourite sights whenever I fly back to Taranaki from Wellington is the lines of greenery you see along so many of our waterways.

They are the result of years of riparian planting by our farmers, facilitated by the Taranaki Regional Council. Five million native plants now line 8,000 kms of streambanks around the Ring Plain and coastal terraces. This year 500,000 more plants will go into the ground. It's been a very successful partnership, resulting in vegetation helping filter runoff into streams, stock access being prevented and water quality improving. I congratulate everyone involved and look forward to seeing even more progress in coming years.

Cooperation is also going on in Parliament, where all parties agree on the need to reduce our environmental footprint. National is supporting the Climate Change Response Act Amendment Bill through its first reading. However we have some serious concerns. We agree with many parts of the Bill including establishing an independent Climate Change Commission, a framework for reducing New Zealand's emissions and a framework for climate change adaptation- those are essential elements for developing robust plans.

On the other hand things like the proposed 24 - 47 per cent reduction in methane are not reflective of scientific advice. A range of scientific reports have suggested agriculture would contribute no further warming with a 10 - 22 per cent reduction, which we feel would be a more reasonable target.

Do we need to transition? Yes. We need to reduce emissions and support global efforts to avoid climate change. But we also need to be open and honest about the potential costs.

We must make sure that we don't take a short-term approach that ends up increasing our emissions, and that we don't push our families to the wall with a spiralling cost of living.

Freedom Camping

Freedom campers in the carpark at Corbett Park last summer, highlights the inadequate legislation both at central and local government level -1607 campers were recorded. The Freedom camping act of 2011 brought in by central government prohibits the absolute ban of freedom campers by any local bylaws. Yet at the same time the Camping Grounds Regulations of



1985 states that "no area shall be used as a camp site unless...", and that unless is a list of requirements of things such as water, lights, toilets etc. The recent bylaw restricts non-self-contained freedom campers at Corbett Park to five, however given the numbers camping there, and the number of photos available around the district of freedom campers (mainly non-self-contained) the regulations are unlikely to be adhered to.

Thanks to the Kaitake Community Board for counting and reporting this explosion of freedom campers. A survey undertaken by the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment found Australians to be the biggest group of freedom campers with German tourists being three times more likely to freedom camp than other nationalities. Tourists that freedom camped were more likely to travel outside the normal main tourist destinations, and tended to stay longer, spending more money in the long term, but less on a daily basis. This suggests limited spending in our patch.

Talking to locals both around the beaches and those frequenting the mountain reveals a disturbing impact on the environment. There are inadequate facilities to cope with the numbers. DOC staff spends substantial time and resources on toilet maintenance, taking them away from more meaningful work on the mountain. It is the local council, funded by rate payers that are responsible for the districts toilets and rubbish collections. There is also a cost to the locals as they spend time and energy picking up after the campers to keep their local spots environmentally safe and healthy.

The question to be put is, who is paying for this, could it be the tax payers and locals? And who is benefitting from this, maybe the tourists coming for a free ride? What about the community, and families that live here?

There are many officially registered camp sites around the New Plymouth District that have all the required amenities for safe and hygienic camping that necessitates fair payment. Should campers be allowed to camp in areas that were never designed for tourist camping?

Tourists need to pay for their right to camp on our shores and mountain. The whole reason for attracting tourists to our neck of the woods is for them to help sustain our economy, not bludge on it. Locals can continue to freedom camp, it is our country, we pay taxes and rates, and have a healthy respect for our land, but send the tourists to paid accommodation, whether it be a camp ground, motel, hotel, hostel or B&B. And have it enforced.

Our Hands Are Up

Oh, the opportunities we, the senior children of Oakura School, have been presented with, starting with the recently held, brilliant Marae Day.

It may have been cold but it was a beautiful day and the walk down to our local marae was a great experience, as we got to walk with our junior buddies who had never been before. After putting our bags down, we gathered with the boys on the outside, as this is a customary tradition when being welcomed onto Okorotua Marae. Some students had been welcomed onto the marae before, so that they could learn how to do a powhiri (welcoming ceremony).

We got to hongi with the tangata whenua and sing some waiata as a school. Afterwards, we split into groups and participated in some traditional activities. We learnt a haka called 'Ka Mate', we sang waiata, a lovely song, Tuku Tuku Roimata E, as well as learning actions. We split into separate groups of boys and girls and went to either a poi lesson or rakau lesson. The girls went to the poi and learnt calls, a new song and how to swing a poi correctly. The boys went into the wharenui for a session on rakau, which is a Māori stick game, during this period we paired off with our buddies and each got a pair of sticks (rolled magazines).

It was challenging, but we somehow managed to keep in time with the music, whilst keeping our buddies focused. Soon after, the hangi was lifted by some adult helpers and it was time for lunch. Sadly, we did get a little wet on the way back to school, but we think we can speak for all students when we say we had a really good time.

The very next day, our year 7 and 8 students went, as they do every Friday, to Technicraft at Devon Intermediate School.

Currently our students are going to Metal, Digital, Cooking and Wood Technologies. At the moment the pupils learning Metal are making candle holders, designing the shape themselves and learning how to use different tools and materials effectively and efficiently. Over in the Digital Technology room, the other group of year 8's have been learning with Mrs Brookes about computing and coding. Our first group of year 7's are in cooking technology and they are learning how to bake tasty cakes and have recently done a test during which they could make cakes or muffins of their choice. Last but certainly not least, the students in Wood



are creating wooden boxes. They will probably use these as pencil cases or stationery containers, but before they take them home they must design, build and paint a unique lid to protect and cover the contents of their boxes. By the end of the term we will see some great creations ready to be shared.

All in all this term has had a busy but satisfying beginning. The students are settled in, and we think if we asked anyone they would say that this is only the start. All hands are up to solve the next round of questions and problems. We are all ready to have an outstanding term.
