Oakura would be well served if the proposed McKie 'Paddocks' development was achieved by simply swapping the Kaitake Golf Club land with the similarly sized Mckie land. Housing developed on the current golf course would then fit well with the district plan intent with good linkages to various networks, and connect sensibly to the beach and reserves. The golf fraternity could achieve a contemporary sustainable course with supporting housing on the associated 'Future Urban Design' zoned land.

The golf course placement would conserve the much valued rural aspect between the state highway and the national park. The original 'Paddocks' property owners and their developer would maintain the rural aspect intent of the original subdivision. And, all the parties: Council, community, and developer could achieve the ideal environmental outcomes over a manageable and affordable time line. This comprehensive form of development would require visionary leadership from all the parties..... and every one could win. I have my fingers crossed !

Rotokare is a predator free environment and it takes considerable effort to keep it that way but the results are so worth it. I can hardly

describe the joy of watching and hearing saddle back birds, tomtits, robins, tuis and fantails swoop around the trees and sing as you walk through the bush.

This brings me back to Oakura and the great work the Kaitake Ranges Conservation Trust is doing on the Kaitakes with their trapping of predators. Read an update from them on the next page. 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Kaitake Ranges conservation trust

The Kaitake Ranges Conservation Trust has been very busy over the last year. In collaboration with the Taranaki Mounga Project and the TSB Community trust we have been able to extend our Stoat trapping network considerably. We have now have 278 stoat traps installed as can be seen on the trapping network map. The team of volunteers has grown extensively and the trap lines are starting to take shape as loop walks with a team of 4-6 volunteers or families sharing the role of monitoring their adopted trap line on a weekly basis on some lines and less frequently on the less accessible lines. This means most volunteers are in the bush every 4-6 weeks cleaning out the traps and re-baiting. In the last 10 months we have removed 1092 predators, including 5 ferrets, 24 stoats, 5 weasels and 1044 rats! Thanks to the efforts of the Taranaki Mounga Project, the Oakura community and these volunteers, the reintroduction of species not seen on the Kaitakes for some years, eg KIWI, now may become a reality. We firmly believe we are making a difference.

It has been great to have schools assist us with the installation of traps with groups from New Plymouth Boys High School and also Francis Douglas assisting us on working Bees. The trapping network proposed by the Taranaki Mounga Project is slightly larger than we currently service so if you want to be involved contact us or come to our AGM!

Kaitake Community Board

As I write this column the warm autumn weather (in spite of a few chilly evenings) is still with us. It is quite unusual for it to have lasted so long, and no doubt all the local school kids (and their parents) really enjoyed the recent school holiday weather. However, at some stage, a wintery blast will arrive and put an end to what has been a quite superb summer and autumn season.

On ANZAC Day I attended, along with many others, the Okato Parade and Service. It is always a sobering experience for me, providing space for much personal reflection. Both my father and father-in-law served in World War Two. The service, which was organised and led very well indeed by Graham and Karen Chard, attracted a large crowd of all ages to remember those who had made the ultimate sacrifice for us all. Three different things stood out for me. First, the only World War Two veteran from the community left to recall, and show respect for his friends who never returned was Ray Rook. Many who used to march and attend similar parades have now dwindled away. Second, was the number of young people present. Mums and dads and their kids. What a far cry from the '70's and '80's when the protest movement of the day engaged with the community in such a way that no young folk would bother to turn up if it wasn't to protest. Third, the words spoken during the different addresses given during the service struck a chord with me. There was the obvious connection made between how the soldiers, both those who returned and those that didn't, fought for our freedom. It is worth reflecting that the freedom they actually fought for was the freedom to participate in our society today without fear or



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favour. We must never lose that freedom, and certainly not allow that freedom to disappear through disinterest or neglect. That certainly wasn't the case in Okato where much positive reflection was shared by those present. I do believe ANZAC Day is fully ingrained in our culture and has become (and will remain) a tradition of remembrance for all New Zealanders and all age groups.

We own a dog - maybe he owns us!. His name is Buster, many of you will know him, some even are his FaceBook friends. We spend a lot of time with Buster on the beach, in Matekai Park and on the various trails in and around the village. So we have first-hand knowledge of a recurring issue being brought to the community board's attention. That is residents' irritation with those dog owners who walk their dogs or allow them to roam around the village streets but fail to clean up after their animal defecates on the beach, the footpath or on a verge in front of someone's house.

We are very lucky to live in such a dog-friendly place. It's a great environment for a family pet and there are some pretty special dogs living here but there are some important responsibilities for owners as well. There is a Council Bylaw covering this particular issue. It states: The owner of any dog that defecates in a public place or on land or premises other than that occupied by the owner shall immediately remove the faeces from that place and dispose of it in a sanitary manner into a suitable receptacle. Bear in mind for those few miscreants who take little notice of this rule and have scant regard for their neighbours the council has the power to levy a \$300 fine and will do so on the identification of the owner of any four-legged transgressor.

As reported last month one of the many projects to protect our natural biodiversity the community board has been involved with from its inception is the Restore Oakura urban biodiversity project. Sam Mortenson is doing a fantastic job in enthusing and mobilising everyone to get involved in the backyard trapping scheme. What is really important as the colder weather arrives and rodents are on the move is to ensure your back yard traps are set and constantly monitored.

Finally, here is an update on this summer's Corbett Park freedom camping numbers. Last summer there were 93 over-night vehicles, this year there have been 1,607 overnighters made up of 1,353 non self-contained vehicles and 254 self-contained ones. The community board has passed this information on to the council.

Rural - the heartland

New Zealand has a unique makeup compared with other nations, with our vast open spaces and small rural communities. These communities are essential to our economy as they are the driving force behind our primary sector, which contributes over \$45b annually in exports and feeds over 40 million people globally. In order for our primary sector to contribute we need our rural communities to be thriving. This means they need access to quality healthcare and other essential services to ensure they are viable as well as desirable places to live.

Since the Labour-led Government has come into power we've seen a prolonged assault on these areas with anti-regional policies making things tough. Rural health is a major concern. It's hard to get people to commit to living in isolated areas if they're not comfortable with the available resources.

As one example, the Government has denied funding for Rural Health Alliance Aotearoa New Zealand (RHAANZ), an organisation that plays a valuable and vital role in addressing mental health needs. Mental health is a significant issue in rural areas as farmers are forced to deal with all kinds of uncertainties around unfavourable weather, cash flow, swings in the prices of New Zealand's exports of farm commodities – let alone the aspersions that are too often cast on their environmental stewardship by people who know nothing of the demands and benefits of farming.

The impact of vocational education reforms on Industry Training Organisations could also see St John's rural ambulance services get the cut, meaning that these areas become even more isolated from quality healthcare.

The roll on effects of all these decisions, as well as other antifarming policies are starting to permeate through our tightknit rural communities, and their local economies are starting to slow. These decisions impact more than just farmers, the local dairy has fewer customers, the local school's roll starts to decrease, and the local pub has fewer patrons as people leave the community. National realises the importance of supporting our small rural communities as well as our big cities. We hold every rural seat in Parliament bar one, and we are proud to represent rural communities.

Oakura Probus Celebrates 25 Years

Oakura Probus recently celebrated their 25 year anniversary. The club held an event with refreshments, speeches and a cake at the Oakura Bowling Club and founding member Norton Moller gave an entertaining and informative speech as presented here: "President Brenda (Ryan) has asked me as a founding member of our club if I would speak for a few minutes on the history of the club. My first reaction was that this will be a severe memory challenge but fortunately I have always been a magpie in keeping records and so this request has turned out to be a rewarding exercise as I have been able to find several papers which have enabled me to recall many happy times as I travelled down memory lane.

Coral and I and our family came to Oakura in the early 1970's. The late Dona and Jo Brash and the late Bill and Dawn Marshall had also settled in Oakura about this time or a little later. We had all known each other before coming to Oakura.

In the years that followed, the six of us would in the winter months often meet together and watch the rugby. As well as the rugby and the inevitable criticism of the referees, we would always solve the world's problems.

At one such get together about August/September 1993 we discussed the number of retired or semi retired people who now lived in the Oakura district and did not have any activity that gave them the opportunity to meet together.

Bill had been a member of the Inglewood Rotary Club and I had been a member of the NP Rotary Club so we were both aware of the recent introduction and development of Probus Clubs by Rotary Clubs.

At this time Don Brash and I still had work commitments while Bill who was semi retired was prepared to lead the charge for the setting up of a combined Probus Club if we would support him. In the period from August/September 1993 until 18 March 1994 we worked with Stuart Hayton and Don Holyoake of the NP Rotary Club until the Combined Probus Club of Oakura was declared a provisional club on 18 March 1994."

TOM reported on the club's 10 year anniversary 15 years ago as detailed below and this represents what the club has achieved in those 10 years:

The Oakura branch of Probus celebrated 10 years of inauguration recently. A special luncheon was held in the Legends Lounge at Yarrows Stadium. Over 100 members turned out to toast the success of the Club. Personable President Bill Marshall paid tribute to past presidents and especially Stuart Hayton, now 94 years old who founded the Oakura Probus in 1994. Stuart was unable to attend the event, and other members who have died. Bill, one of the founding members was presented with the first life member badge and presidential chain. A cake decorated by Kay Horo also marked the event. Entertainment at the lunch was provided by member Kathy Dobson who played the keyboard. Other members kept the crowd entertained with jokes and witticisms.

The Oakura Probus was the first Probus group to combine men and women in one club. It is largely a social club for retirees. In fact the criteria to join the Oakura Probus is to be retired, over 60 years old and affiliated with Surf Highway 45 (or a coaster!). Stuart Hayton along with other villagers felt there was need for a club were males and females could get together so through the Rotary Club, began the Oakura Probus. The group began with 74 members and today has 120 members with a waiting list. Monthly meetings are held at the Oakura Hall, usually with a guest speaker. "Cameos" or brief talks are given by members on their history are also popular. A mid winter lunch is arranged to perk up the winter blues. This year a four day bus trip to the Waiarapa has proved popular with 42 'probusees' enjoying the experience. The main focus of the club is about providing companionship and camaraderie and it certainly appears to be accomplishing its mission by the number of members it boasts. Other activities Probus is involved in, has been the reading programme at Oakura School.

I think it is a wonderful achievement for the club to be celebrating 25 years and I personally think the club's decision to include women in a combined club has contributed hugely to its success. I'm not sure if I'll still be doing the TOM in another 10 years but I am pretty certain the Probus Club of Oakura will still be around!

Having an extensive native bush area as part of our school grounds is a real asset to the community and for students to take part in authentic learning. Every two years we have a rich topic like this involving our bush environment. Also each class maintains regular contact with the orchard through an on-going sustainability foci where they take responsibility for a particular area of orchard maintenance. Hasn't the orchard matured this year! Hard to believe the whole area was developed from a lawned space only 18 months ago. Well done to our team of parent volunteers and our students in the Garden Club who continue to develop new plantings and help manage what the classes are unable to keep up with. Students have been part of the 'Predator Free Taranaki' programme with Emily Roberts from the Taranaki Regional Council and some of our senior students have been taking part in the 'Impact' programme run by Sustainable Taranaki volunteering their time to help protect our environment.

The annual Omata Triathlon event was brilliant with a large number of spectators and enthusiastic athletes. The 'slide-in' to the finish line is always a highlight. Thanks so much to all the parents and extended whānau who came along to support students as they gave it their all. The swimming season was most successful. We were able to have daily lessons and the community certainly made the most of the balmy evenings and weekends. Thanks so much to Rachael Alford and the team of parents who kept the pool in tip-top condition all season. Beach Ed at Oakura was an extension of the swim and water safety skills that we feel are so important for our students. Winter sports are just around the corner. I urge parents to pass on the message of fair play to their children. We promote competitive play within a supportive atmosphere; where players, spectators and coaches encourage each other to do their very best on the court or field. The children came up with a Fair Play guide for students, coaches and supporters a few years ago. We promote involvement as a positive choice that teaches important lessons; appreciation of differences, dealing with winning and losing, growing confidence, building friendships, self discipline, patience, persistence, teamwork, developing fitness and physical skills to name a few.
