## Local company captures international market

Quietly tucked away in Fitzroy is a local business that has successfully captured the international market for their unique product. QP Sport or Quality Performers Ltd is the only company in the world that specialises solely in the manufacture of chest and breast protection equipment for sports. Whilst their client list is a veritable United Nations (on the day I visited, packages were ready to go to Canada, Germany and Portugal) company owner Richard Shearer says that although they export 99% of their product, they still feel very much part of the Fitzroy/Strandon community.

Max Rutherford set up QP Sport in 1981 and Richard and his wife Rebecca purchased the company in 2005. After some research they realised that they had a special niche market and even though they were often requested to produce other body protection they have decided to stay solely in the breast protection market.

This decision has paid off for them and they have continued to put a large amount of work into research and development of their products. With a large portion of their exports being sent to Europe they have invested in keeping their CE certification and making sure that their products meet the stringent European quality standards for personal protection equipment. Richard went on to explain, "When you make protective gear it is important to get it right. It's not guesswork and we have done a lot of work researching impact forces as well as biomechanics so our products perform more holistically."

The Fitzroy factory is where the range of products are carefully assembled, labelled and packaged for export. Only a small amount of the low density polyethylene is moulded to shape here. Most of this work is done at other factories in Bell Block and Wanganui where they use QP dies to mould the product to shape and send it to the Fitzroy site. The fabric and sewing is done in China, simply because, says Richard, New Zealand has a shortage of skilled machinists and the quality of the product produced in China is very good.

Once ready the products are sent to 120 destinations around the world. Travel is a very important part of running this business and Richard has been to Europe four times this year as well as the US, China and Japan. There are 'rip offs' of their products produced in China and Pakistan but these are poor quality and because QP Sport has been providing quality products for 30 years they have a very good reputation and have a high level of trust worldwide so inferior products are easy to spot. Richard has close involvement with Sports Federations worldwide. Many sportswomen use the products including those participating in football, boxing and baseball but the sports that are the biggest users of the QP line of products are fencing and karate. Karate has a huge following in Europe and is sponsored in many French, German and Dutch schools. Richard and Rebecca attended the World Karate Championships in Serbia this year and he says, "I got quite a buzz knowing that the 600 or so female competitors were all wearing chest protection from our business in back in Fitzroy."

It's great to see and hear about a relatively small local company like Quality Performers Ltd competing so successfully in the huge global market place, Richard and his staff should be justifiably proud of this achievement.

Owners, Shane and Sharon Devlin, have uplifted their business from the Devon St West premises they have occupied for the past seven years and relocated into the former Whopping Big Carrot building, which they have looked at for all that time.

Now Shane says, "Look for us in the old Carrot building." The 100 year old Carrot building has been substantially refurbished for the change. From the outside, Imagine Design's Tony Biesiek has given it a radical renewal with fresh imagery and new joinery, and inside there's been a reworking of the space to create an attractive and efficient working environment.

It's also an environment that's home to the latest colour printing equipment from Fuji Xerox — a Colour 1000 digital press, the only one of its kind in Taranaki and fresh off the boat from Sydney. "We have always had two machines, so we can have a back-up if one breaks down," Shane says. "That way we can ensure our 'Right first time and on time' guarantee."

There's a touch of irony in Shane's business being at the cutting edge of print technology — he began his printing career as one of the last apprentices to be trained in turn-of-thecentury linotype processes.

That's turn of last century, not this century. Linotypes were first invented in the 1880s and used molten lead to form slugs of lettering that were then cramped together to create a page of type for printing. They lasted into the 1970s when they were gradually phased out in favour of newer and more efficient methods of printing.

Shane started his apprenticeship on the Taihape Times twiceweekly newspaper, moved to Taranaki Newspapers' commercial printing division in the 1980s to develop his trade, and then left in November 1995 to set up his own printing business. So this month marks 15 years in business — a happy coincidence with the move into the new premises.

In that time, Shane has experienced and embraced the rapid and continuing development of digital printing processes. The older processes were a benefit, however, he says. "I loved it ... it was a mechanical process that you had to think through. It required a logical train of thought."

Shane appreciated the "really good grounding" in the basics of the printing industry and when the computer industry eventually gained ascendancy in printing, he was in the right frame of mind to run with it.

Sharon and Shane could see opportunities and these prompted the couple to make the move into business for themselves, and consequently into hundreds more businesses and business people through a focus on business cards. They became specialists in that area and built up a loyal clientele.

That loyalty is two way, Shane emphasises. "We believe in doing right by our clients and go out of our way to give them the best product at a reasonable price. Many of our first clients are still with us today."

In 2002, Shane and Sharon purchased the Vision Print business in Hawera to create a Taranaki-wide printing operation, adding Aries Print to the fold six months later. The Taranaki network was boosted several years later in 2008 when they bought Shore Print in Hawera and merged that business with the former Vision Print operation to create Graphix Explosion Hawera. The more conventional offset printing equipment there complements the digital focus in New Plymouth.

"Most offices have copiers that can do something that is of passable quality. But we can take it to another level. The difference is great design and the print finishing — we are trained and skilled in doing what we do, and that counts in terms of the final product."

The new Xerox equipment helps provide that superior finish — in more ways than one. As well as the countless colours it can create, the Xerox can add a clear varnish to the surface of the printed product. "That's truly unique," Shane says. "It can achieve a 3D effect by running it through multiple times and building up the layer of clear lacquer. It has a tactile effect for a greater impact."

### Freeze dried penguin helps out his mates

Little blue penguins head inland at times, perhaps for a kilometre or more. This little one was standing on the centre line near the Rapanui Stream, Tongaporutu, trying to cross State Highway 3 when Linda Paterson and her son were returning to New Plymouth.

"We passed the penguin on the hill," said Linda, "where he was dodging cars and waiting for a chance to nip across. We turned around, went back and ushered him across the road and into a paddock." Linda moved to a safe spot further down the road and phoned the Department of Conservation's hotline to check if she could help the penguin further but that's when the little explorer's luck ran out. He stepped out on the highway again and was hit and killed by a car." "I was so upset," said Linda "and I cried when I phoned DOC back. We lifted him up off the road, took him home and

a ranger picked up the penguin the next morning."

The little blue went into DOC's freezer and every so often he was popped into a chilly bin and taken to a school or kindy where children learnt more about the world's smallest penguins and the dangers they face.

"He did a good job for a frozen penguin," said Mike Tapp, a community relations ranger at DOC Taranaki. "During Seaweek he travelled right around the mountain visiting children at libraries and pre schools along the way. He smelled like a penguin later in the day."

Linda next saw her penguin in a DOC newsletter where a photo showed him visiting the Manaia pre-school with Anne Scott from the Ngamotu Marine Society. She phoned DOC and offered to pay to have the little bird freeze dried so it could be used for education purposes for years to come. Freeze drying is a method of taxidermy where the animal goes through a dehydration process which achieves a very lifelike result. Lepperton's Richard Lee did the job. "The little penguin is already proving useful," said Mike Tapp. "He's even had a photo shoot for a DVD focusing on good dog ownership and control so we're very grateful to Linda. He'll do a lot for his mates in his afterlife.'

## **TOM Garden of the Month**

The TOM garden this month is down a long driveway off busy Mangorei road. On arrival the contrast between the traffic noise and busyness of the street and the quietness of this property was very noticeable. It certainly wasn't silent though, Linda, the gardens owner and I were treated to the beautiful sound of a very busy Tui singing loudly throughout the entire hour I was there.

Linda and her husband Anton have lived at the property for over 20 years and have developed the garden over that time. The property is certainly not your average suburban block. As I mentioned before you go down a long sloping driveway and then the house and surrounding gardens sit on a flat platform but this too slopes away on three sides and rises steeply at the rear. At the very bottom boundary there is a council swamp. Because the property is so big and there are a lot of large trees Linda has a man help with the heavier garden work every 2-3 weeks

This mix of topography has created an interesting base for the garden.

At the front of the house, an expanse of lawn is surrounded by gardens and on one side there is a very large pond full of gold fish and covered in water lilies. Linda's lovely elderly and completely deaf white cat 'Persil' was enjoying the sun on the bridge over the (covered!) ponds when I visited. A large grey spreading conifer was here when the couple first came but that has been removed along with some other conifers and banksias. One flower that Linda has everywhere in the garden are roses of every colour and variety. I asked her if she has a favourite one and she said she loves lots of them but the red Papa Meilland is one she loves. Another favourite flower is the iris and Linda is a member of the Iris Society. Lots of the iris she has growing have come from friends sharing their plants, this type of sharing cuttings and plants with friends is something Linda enjoys doing. At the Iris society meetings each month the group have a competition and members bring along plants. A beautiful one that Linda has growing is an Iris Sibirica called 'Swank' with its delicate dark blue flower.

All the slopes at the front are covered in large trees with a mix of natives and exotics. This area has a 'bush like' feel, there is also a large stand of black bamboo that is very striking but does require a little work to keep under control. There are various paths through the bush so even though this area is sloped most of the property can be accessed easily. Wandering through this part of the property there are camellias of every colour, magnolias and a gorgeous Chinese lantern tree. One really pretty camellia was the pink 'Hawaii' which almost resembles a double hibiscus. Down here tucked away Linda is growing potatoes in stacked tyres; an advantage of a property of this size is there is room to put less attractive garden things out of sight. Linda has her vegetables growing in various spots over the garden and she put things where they will grow well, she has peas, beans broccoli, cauliflower, rhubarb growing as well as tomatoes in some new raised beds as well as in a hot spot at the very top of the property. She had great success with her tomatoes last year when many didn't and she says she followed the advice of putting a spoonful of canned dog food and a spoonful of milk powder into the hole where she planted her tomato plants; she's done the same again this year so is hopeful of another bumper crop.

Variety and contrast are two words that best describe this large garden, there's just so many different areas of interest and they all have their special flavour. One part that Linda is particularly fond of is the garden that borders a lime chip path on the northern side of the house. Her late mother helped create that area so it always reminds Linda of her. Along here a healthy Forsythia tree is growing, at the moment it's covered in lush green foliage but when it has its beautiful yellow flowers Linda says it's just stunning. Also along here are two lovely perfumed roses Souvenir de la Maison and Souvenir Mme Leonie Viennot which apparently Napoleons', Josephine had growing in her garden.

Colour is evident everywhere in this garden and Linda plants any shade of flowers, its all balanced with beautiful greenery and in the shady spots, shade lovers like hostas look really healthy. At the bottom of the driveway Linda has some interesting ferns such as a stag horn fern on the side of a large tree. She feeds this a banana skin every now and then by popping it at the back of the plant, also here are a horseshoe fern and some bromeliads. The last area of the garden we walked through was to the south of the property a path leads to a beautiful out look over more bush. Amongst the bush stands a huge cabbage tree covered in flower, there's a banksia along with pongas, puka and many other trees making this an interesting outlook as well as a favourite area with the tui who was still singing as I said my good byes and thanks to Linda for sharing her peaceful and beautiful garden with me.

## Taranaki Training Squad -Hockey Academy

Taranaki has produced three recent 'Black Sticks' - Scott and James are keen to see a higher percentage of current province players achieve this level. "We want more of our talented players from Under 13 representative level go on to achieve Central Districts selection at Under 21 level and ultimately become Black Sticks."

Winning their respective divisions, Sean Kettle and Te Rapai Barbarich-Love almost guided the team to winning the national title but missed out and came second. This was the team's best result and up five places on 2009. Sean and Te Rapi are the first Taranaki Groms to win a Scholastics title since 1994 which demonstrates the value of the High Performance Coaching they had recently received. Isaac Kettle also surfed to a 3rd place in the National Primary School Champs also held in Gisborne. Well done guys.

The seniors are also performing with Jeremy Grainger taking out the 30 plus title at the Maori nationals.

At the end of October we held our AGM which was well attended and our long-serving Auditor, Bruce Richards, was awarded the AGM Cup for the member who has done most for the club. Besides the normal proceedings, the big news imparted to members was the Minister of Conservation's release of the New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement 2010. This section of the Resource Management Act dictates to all Local Authorities on how the coastal environment is to be managed. A new and significant section of the policy is Policy 16 – Surfbreaks of National Significance; which states "protect the surfbreaks of national significance for surfing as listed in Schedule 1 by: (a) ensuring that coastal activities in the coastal environment do not adversely affect the surfbreaks and: (b) avoiding adverse effects of other activities on access to, and use and enjoyment of the surfbreaks." Listed in Schedule 1 are four Taranaki breaks, Stent, Farmhouse Stent, Backdoor Stent (all in South Taranaki) and Fitzroy's Waiwakaiho. The protection also extends to protecting the swell corridors which are further defined in the Glossary. This is a major development in recognising the intrinsic value of surfbreaks not only for recreation but their economic value to the community and reinforces the Taranaki Regional Council's decision to protect 83 surfbreaks on the Taranaki coast from "inappropriate deployment". The NZCPS 2010 comes into force on December 3rd 2010. Representatives from this club and other clubs met with the Taranaki Regional Council to discuss how to implement the new policy, and will in the New Year meet with District Councils to discuss their involvement.

With the advent of an "early summer" surfers have been enjoying some great waves at Fitzroy as a small but consistent ground swell provided great "logging" waves mid November and also drew many swimmers and sun-bathers to enjoy "our" beach. Summer is looking at being long and warm, so the water is likely to be crowded by swimmers, surfers, stand-up paddle-boarders, kite-surfers and other users. So please take care out there and share our beautiful beaches with others so all may enjoy it.
