# Young environmentalists continue involvement with **Peringa Park Wetlands**

The first weekend in spring saw more activity down at our local wetland. In picture perfect weather around 50 people volunteered their time and manpower to plant the 2,500 trees generously donated by Taranaki Tree Trust and Honda with the latter funding the planting of 10 native trees for every new Honda car sold in Taranaki.

I spoke with Tina Christmas from NPDC who said, "It was wonderful to have so many trees donated and to see the community come out and support the planting." Of interest she showed me where the wetlands had 'trapped' a number of plastic bottles washed down in the storm water stopping them from entering our waterways. Even though the wetland has successfully captured the bottles, with the soon to be installed gross pollutant trap this type of rubbish will be stopped before it enters the wetland.

Two days later it was the turn of local St John Bosco school students to do their share of the planting assisted by Pakeke Lions members. This work by the school continues their close relationship with the Wetland project. NPDC project manager Angela James says, "St John Bosco declared its interest in being involved with the wetlands from day one."

Principal Marie Barrett went onto say this was just too good an opportunity to let pass by and it would appear that the students are given every encouragement to make use of this 'living science lab.' A core group is involved to a greater degree but the information is used by the wider school as the basis of their science curriculum studies.

Some of the very young students at the school will have the benefit of being involved over their six years at the school as they study the wetland and will be able to see this wonderful environment develop and get established over time.

Awareness of their natural environment and caring for it is fostered in a variety of ways. On the day I caught up with them at the wetland the students had been out earlier in the day cleaning up our local area. With the help of the Pakeke Lions who were also planting trees with them they had been out in the morning collecting rubbish from the local beach area. I spoke with Mavis Bridgeman from the Pakeke Lions who told me twenty nine students did the Fitzroy beach clean up and a total of 35 bags of rubbish were collected in an area from Hobson St through to Waiwhakaiho.

It's great to see that these local young people with the support of their school and senior members of the community are being encouraged to make a difference to their environment and ultimately benefit us all.

# **Dog obedience classes** in our local area

In last month's TOM I wrote about my visit to the pre school puppy classes at our local vets and how useful they were for puppy owners. I was interested to see that in our local area we also have what is probably the next step after the puppy classes and these too are popular with dog owners.

At the North Taranaki Dog Training Club on Alberta Road, Glen Avon, dog obedience lessons are run each term by the club. I went along to check out the class and as it happened for the puppy classes, I was visiting on their 'Graduation Night'.

Driving down to the club on a fine spring night I was greeted to the awesome sight of a line of about 12 dogs under flood lights in the 'down stay' position watching their owners standing across the other side of the field. Even from a distance you could feel the anticipation of the dogs waiting for their next command.

As part of the graduation night the terms' four 'top dogs' from the obedience class were here to show off their skills. There were four dogs as each terms' class is divided into groups according to size. Displaying their new found skills on the night I visited were a German shepherd, Dalmatian, Border Collie and a Terrier. The other class participants were there without their dogs to cheer their classmates on. I chatted to some of them about their experience over the last term. Kelly and Alex Harvey had attended classes with their dog Mason, a Lab Ridgeback cross who Alex described as disobedient and totally hyperactive before obedience classes. They are really happy with the improvement in their management of him and his behaviour after attending the classes and were keen to see how the top dog of their class, Noodle, a Border collie and his owner Bo got on in tonight's competition.

It was an impressive display by the four 'top dogs' as they were directed by their owners to walk, turn, sit, stay and lie down. It was hard to believe that these dogs were new recruits so to speak, particularly in the case of the winner which was a German shepherd. As well as the 'top dog' competition, club members put on a short display of other disciplines that the dogs can compete in. It was amazing to see the dogs do the 'fly' course where they retrieve a ball at the end of a course that involves the dog running through a tunnel and going over several jumps to a board that they push to release a ball which they then take back to their owner. Fly is certainly what these dogs do and it was incredible to watch, one dog's feet literally barely touched the ground! We were also treated to a display of dog retrieving which involved the dog being sent to retrieve a cloth with a particular person's scent on it; the dog had to collect the right cloth out of six to eight choices.

As a dog owner the whole evening was an inspiring display of what is possible to teach our animals. The best part was that the dogs were obviously having so much fun.

One stand out moment for me was when club member Greg Banks was busy setting up the fly course and he got his dog Reece to sit and stay amongst lots of people and barking dogs. Reece's eyes never left Greg as he moved around setting up the course and he didn't budge an inch with the chaos around him. It was very impressive.

Once the displays were completed we went back to the clubroom where certificates were awarded and it was very apparent that some course participants had come a long way in terms of gaining confidence in controlling their dogs and therefore enjoying their canine friends more. What was also evident was the friendly and encouraging atmosphere of the club members present on the night l attended.

As this issue of the TOM is delivered the last course for 2009 will be underway but I would certainly recommend that any readers wanting to attend dog obedience make enquiries with the club and register their interest for 2010 classes which begin on 1st February. The cost is \$60 per term for 10 sessions. The classes this year were Mondays from 7.30-8.30 pm. Dogs need to have had all their vaccinations before attending. Dog owners wanting to get their dog involved in other disciplines such as agility can also contact the club.

# TOM garden of the month

Isn't it fantastic to see all the spring growth around and the pretty softness that this season brings to our gardens? Blossoms abound and as I write this my lawn is covered in white as the usual October windy weather blows them off our cherry trees and onto the lawn. I don't know how the various festival gardeners handle the stress that October's weather must bring. With only a short period of time before their gardens will be open to the public I'm sure many will be cleaning up the mess that the recent blast of icy weather inflicted. Fortunately I took my photo of this months' garden before the weather did its damage to the lovely wisteria I am featuring!

A neighbour of mine has a gorgeous Blue Sapphire Wisteria in bloom which provoked a friend to comment as we drove past it that she had never seen her wisteria in flower. This is the second person I know that has experienced this problem so I thought I'd try to find out why that was as I want to plant one in my garden.

Both my friends had wisteria with lush foliage and although the plants are healthy and have been in several years they have never flowered. This problem is apparently not uncommon and can occur when the plant is established and has too much fertilizer and water. This encourages excessive growth at the expense of flower production.

When first planting wisterias you need to remember they require soil that is rich in organic matter to hold moisture in summer. The roots can be in a shady spot but the top growth needs the full sun for at least half the day.

After they are established an annual top dress with organic matter and a little lime is sufficient.

Pruning is also important for wisteria. Structural shape pruning should be done straight after flowering and any further pruning should be kept to cutting unwanted shoots back to three leaves and not removing completely.

This lovely plant is a real 'show off' when it's in bloom so I'm looking forward to seeing if I can have some success in getting mine to flower like my neighbour's when I plant it my garden.

# Local teen has work launched at New Zealand Storylines Festival

On the 30th August the Storylines Festival of New Zealand Children's Writers and illustrators held their final family day in Auckland at the Aotea Centre. This huge event featured an impressive list of well known NZ names such as author Margaret Mahy and Richard Taylor from Weta Workshop. Also on the list of names this year was 14 year old illustrator and NPBHS student Brendan Osment. Brendan was at the festival with his mother, children's author Michelle Osment, launching her new children's book 'Ten Tuatara'. Brendan has both illustrations and photographs featured in the book. Ten Tuatara was published by Little Friends Publishing Ltd who are also publishers of the popular Perky the Pukeko series. At the festival there are a myriad of workshops and activities in which the public can participate. Brendan as an illustrator spent the day drawing with children who came along to the festival. With three younger siblings Brendan would have been comfortable in this role sharing his skills and he said that this was a really enjoyable part of the festival.

Ten Tuatara truly is a family project with all four Osment children contributing in some way to the book. There are little details such as tiny korus on beetles backs drawn by preschooler Emilie and the numbers done by Brendan's younger brother Jarrod. It is however the cute tuataras drawn by Brendan that steal the show and that are indeed the focus of the book. Michelle explained that the drawings weren't included simply because they were done by her son. They were included because they were well done. She went onto say that Brendan is extremely patient with his work and will happily repeat drawings until he achieves the right result.

Ten Tuatara is a counting book, with there initially being 10 Tuatara who disappear one by one to find a safe place to hide. On the left page there is a large number and this is filled with a photograph taken by either Brendan or Michelle. Each number has a photo of a different natural environment and part of this photo fills the tuatara outline on the opposite page. This has been put together cleverly by local graphic designer Kim Hills.

One of Brendan's favourite pages features a photo he took of dead pine needles. The photo was taken out of the family car window when they stopped on a road trip. When put into the tuatara outline the effect is very subtle and the pine needles are almost unrecognisable as to what they are. They look in fact like fine scratching on the Tuataras 'skin'. Whilst this is a young children's book this subtlety in illustration makes it visually interesting to all.

Brendan like most 14 year olds leads a busy life and as well as drawing, photography and writing he plays piano and enjoys golf and tennis. Computer animation is another interest that has been fuelled by a course he has taken in the school holidays.

When I asked Brendan what he sees himself doing in the future career wise he and Michelle shared a laugh as they had anticipated the question and suggested my job was most at risk! As well as strength in art which is being wonderfully encouraged by NPBHS art teacher Ces Hill, Brendan really enjoys and has talent in English. A career as an author illustrator is certainly a possibility and as he heads into his first NCEA year at school next year he is already getting good advice on his subject choice.
