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# Kaitake Community Board

The community and visitors have been enjoying the wonderful weather we have been experiencing and the opportunity to get out and about in our magnificent environment. The beach has been particularly inviting and been attracting large numbers of beach users, which will keep the NPOB surf club on their toes to ensure another safe summer season. The club provides a high quality and comprehensive life saving service at Taranaki's most popular beach and this year, due to the amount of sand moving along the beach, there is likely to be more holes and rips than in the past and therefore it is even more imperative to swim between the flags under the watchful gaze of the club members on patrol duties!

The community board has been particularly active, working on a number of projects since the elections in October. The new children's playground in Okato is finished with the initial landscaping, provision of pathways, rubbish bins and bench seats expected to be concluded before Christmas. It is being well used by many enthusiastic youngsters. The adjoining skateboard park is still a work in progress, as is the full landscaping of the site.

Recently asset managers from the Department of Justice held a public meeting on the former primary school site adjacent to the playground to canvas local opinion and share information about what is planned. The site is land-banked and the Department of Justice acts as asset manager for the Office of Treaty Settlements (OTS). Currently the OTS, as interim landholder, is in negotiations with

Taranaki iwi about the site. The site will either be passed onto Taranaki iwi in settlement of Treaty of Waitangi claims or if not taken in settlement will be sold on the open market. The major problem for Taranaki iwi and local residents is prior to the site be passed onto OTS the previous occupiers (Ministry of Education) arranged for a heritage covenant to be placed on a number of buildings on the title by the Historic Places Trust. This covenant severely restricts what can be done with those buildings in regards to demolition, removal or modernising.

Personally I find the covenant quite incomprehensible. There are many similar school buildings scattered throughout Taranaki, many still in use, so I question the historic value of these buildings and wonder who decided otherwise

and why. I also question why, if the Ministry of Education believed the buildings are of such historical importance, they have been allowed to fall into such a terrible state of disrepair over the past seven years since the school closed. It certainly doesn't make sense to me or to all the Taranaki iwi and other local residents that attended the meeting. All it does, unless the covenant is removed, is stymie progress towards getting a final resolution and leaves a terrible (and increasingly dangerous) eyesore at the entrance to Okato. Enough said!

The tidy up of the car park area outside the Oakura Beach Camp is proceeding and will also be completed before Christmas. Once again the final landscaping will need to wait until after the hot summer months have passed. Due to generous donations from members of our community another seat has been erected under the shade of the pohutukawa trees there, and two more seats have been erected along the coastal walkway.

Finally I believe we all should take a moment to reflect on what an excellent job many folk have done on our behalf this year. The various sporting organisations and their never complaining volunteers have done us proud, the fire brigade continue their sterling work, the businesses in the CBD, the beach camp, the hall committee and others in the community have helped keep our wonderful lifestyle intact. A special mention goes to Richie Shearer and his very hard working committee who, at very short notice, are putting together an excellent New Year's Day carnival for the community. I do hope everyone can get in behind the committee and contribute to making the carnival a truly memorable event. Also the best of luck to the recently formed Okato 150th Jubilee Committee working towards that big event in 2015. And no, I didn't forget - the early childhood centres and schools, their staff, boards and volunteers deserve our thanks for another year of service to the younger members of our district. On behalf of the community I acknowledge your immeasurable assistance on behalf of our children and thank you sincerely for it.

On behalf of Keith, Paul, Mike and our appointed councillor Richard I wish all TOM readers a merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year and hope you can spend lots of quality family time and enjoy our great local environment over the coming summer months.

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# Apprentice Numbers Increase

There's a lot more career choice in the world these days, certainly more than there was three decades ago.

We need a responsive training system, one that can adapt and change as industries evolve and develop.

High quality workplace based training produces more highly skilled workers, and is critical for building a more competitive and productive economy – one of our priorities this year.

Here in Taranaki 245 people signed up as apprentices between March and October this year, through the Government's reboot subsidy. The reboot subsidy means the first 10,000 new apprentices enrolled since 6 March 2013 get \$1,000 towards their tools and off-job costs, or \$2,000 if they are in priority trades. Employers receive the same amount for each apprentice they take on.

National introduced the apprenticeship reboot subsidy to help more people into apprenticeships, and to support our local businesses to be able to take apprentices on. From March to October last year, we had 153 apprentices sign up in our region. So having 245 people sign up from March to October this year is an impressive result.

Nationwide, the reboot has resulted in a 67 per cent increase in people starting apprenticeships compared to the same period last year. This reboot will help more people gain a Level 4 apprenticeship qualification, supporting our Better Public Services target of 55 per cent of 25 to 34-year-olds gaining a Level 4 or above qualification in 2017.

The apprenticeship reboot is part of a suite of changes the Government is making to improve industry training. We're establishing New Zealand Apprenticeships, which combine Modern Apprenticeships and other apprenticeship-type training into a premier vocational qualification. We're increasing the performance expectations of industry training organisations, and we're requiring all apprenticeship programmes to have at least 120 credits and result in a Level 4 qualification.

National is supporting New Zealanders into vocational careers that will set them up for their working lives.

We're investing in the potential of our workforce to ensure more Kiwis will be able to meet the needs of businesses now and in the future.

Please come along with blankets, a gold coin donation, smiles and your best singing voices and help make it a night to remember.


The ladies are also keen to hear from any local individuals or groups who may be interested in providing a short performance in the Christmas theme, or who wish to be involved in some other capacity.

For those out there who see this happen, a photo is a good idea and or a description of the offenders. Get hold of the NPDC or myself and we will follow it up.

As always I have had a number of calls regarding boy and girl racers however with your assistance I have managed to get a couple of vehicles off the road and will continue to do so, but I do need your help. Start with a registration, make and model of vehicle and one thing which can be very handy is a description of the driver or any passengers.

Moving on, some of you may be having difficulty in getting hold of me since the new and improved call centre has been set up - if you get frustrated and it is not urgent try emailing me on [richard.corry@police.govt.nz](mailto:richard.corry@police.govt.nz).

Take caution when using the Lucy's Gully area particularly if you are alone. There have been several reporting's of a car in the area with no number plates and a male acting inappropriately. Do not ride your horse, bike or walk in the area alone and report anything suspicious to me.

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# Horse and Vehicle Rules for Oakura

Between 9am and 6pm during daylight saving, horses and dogs have no place on Oakura Beach. Motor vehicles and motorbikes are prohibited from the beach at all times (with limited exceptions).

We have information signs up and there has been publicity recently about vehicle and horse use on this very popular beach – now we need riders, drivers and dog owners to take responsibility to follow the bylaws for the safety and enjoyment of the wider public.

To be clear, here are the rules:

- Between Weld Road and the Tapuae River mouth, vehicles may be on the beach only to take a boat down for launching or if they are an emergency or lifesaving club vehicle. Vehicles may not be left on the beach.
- Between Ahu Ahu Road and the Oakura River Mouth at Corbett Park, horses are banned between 9am and 6pm.
- Between Wairau Stream and the Oakura Beach Camp gates – an area that includes Corbett Park – dogs are banned between 9am and 6pm.

If you see anyone breaking these rules – such as riding a motorbike or quad bike on the beach, or exercising their horses in an area they shouldn't be – please note the vehicle's registration and get in touch with the Council. Information such as a description of the person, what happened and the day and time it happened will help us identify the person involved.

Horse and vehicle owners who break the bylaw can be prosecuted through the courts, while anyone breaching the Dog Control Bylaw can receive a \$300 instant fine.

However we'd prefer that there are no breaches of the bylaw at all.

We ask everyone to treat the beach and the bylaws with respect so that we can all have an enjoyable summer on Oakura Beach.

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
# Oakura Arts Trail Workshop Weekends





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# The Beautiful Bumblebee

Since the sun has come out the humble bumblebee has been inspiring me. As I sit on my deck enjoying a drink or enjoying the sunshine I hear the very busy bumblebee buzzing amongst the herbs. I thought to myself “what is a bumblebee and where did he come from?”

Unsurprisingly bumblebees are not native to New Zealand and were introduced from the UK to help farmers produce better crops way back in 1885.

The most common bumblebee is the *bombus terrestris*. Seems fitting that a bumblebee should be known as a *bombus* since they look like little bombs!

The *bombus terrestris* has a fluffy white bottom (had never noticed that before) and has a common name of buff-tailed bumblebee and is also the largest of the species. It is the only species to have a black waist.

The first bumblebees to be seen in spring are the queens – the queen is the only bumblebee to hibernate through the winter – the rest die (sorry chaps!). The queen is much bigger than the workers who appear in late spring. As soon as the queen has found some nectar to replenish her energy reserves, she starts looking for a suitable site to build her nest. There are about 200 workers in a mature colony of the large bumblebee *Bombus terrestris*. Nests deplete in late summer and are often destroyed by invading rodents, insects, mites and slaters. The foundress queen dies but new queens leave the old nest and overwinter in small cavities they excavate in the soil.

Three ‘castes’ occur within bumblebee nests, a ‘queen’ (the reproductive female), ‘workers’ (non-reproductive females) and males. All three castes are broadly similar in appearance, but males can be distinguished as they lack stings and have longer antennae than the females – so it is only females and queens who sting (how appropriate!).

Bumblebees have something called ‘pollen baskets’ on their legs. This is a large flat space or hollow on their hind legs surrounded by hairs to make the ‘basket.’ The inside of their legs have lots of hairs that make brushes or combs. After they have climbed around a flower and have lots of pollen stuck to them they run the combs over themselves to pick up the pollen. Then they mix it all together with a bit of nectar to make it sticky and pack it into the pollen basket.

Bumblebees work very hard and long hours, foraging from dawn to dusk in search of nectar and pollen no matter the weather.

Possibly the most distinctive feature of the bumblebee is its buzz, especially the very large queen’s. The buzz allows the bumblebee to ‘buzz pollinate’ the anthers of flowers. The bee rakes up a bunch of anthers, holding them against its body with its legs and buzzes them. The amount of energy transferred from the buzzing bee causes the pollen to explode outward covering the bee in pollen.

Bumblebees can navigate their way back to the nest from a distance of 13 kilometres but generally stick to about a five kilometre radius.

Bumblebees have been commercially reared in New Zealand for about 20 years and are now being exported back to the UK where they are nearly extinct.

In commercial use 150-300 bumblebees can service 15,000 tomato plants or 40 different flowers per bee every hour over 12 hours!

My quest into finding out more about bumblebees has led me to realise I have very few pollen or nectar producing plants in my garden – I shall remedy this. I found bumblebees on my roses, in my herb garden and on my rhododendrons.


I also found them very difficult to photograph as they move so quickly and frequently – I need a macro lens for my camera! Another thing, the Aussies didn’t want bumblebees so you won’t find any in the great red continent.

Watch out for my new friends and take a moment to enjoy their spectacle.


