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


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## **Peta Hislop's** retirement celebration

# Kaitake Community Board

My, how quickly things can change weatherwise. Let's hope that we do enjoy a warm and sunny summer season right through until Easter, which is very late this year. In fact, it is the first time since 1943 that ANZAC Day falls during Easter and that's something that won't happen again for another 85 years!

The Kaitake Community Board (KCB) awaits with interest the initial feedback from the community recreation survey. All householders within the Oakura Structure Plan boundaries received a maildrop from Visitor Solutions who were engaged by Council to carry out a survey to ascertain the future recreational requirements of the area. There will be further engagement with various groups during this initial step in a forward planning process for our area.

The Community Board is turning its focus to its submission to Council on financial support requirements for the next financial year in the Annual Plan (July 2011–June 2012). We have already identified the need to upgrade the walk and cycleway from the end of the Oakura campground westwards, and more work needs to be done also on the planned community playground development in Okato. While the financial plan is an annual one, we need to consider and identify as many projects as we can that could take place over the next three years so we are seeking feedback from the community on other relevant issues. Please let KCB members know any ideas you have and don't forget individuals or other groups can make their own submissions too.

As with all local body affairs there is a particular process to follow that, to many members of the community, appears particularly long-winded, but those are the rules under which we operate. For example, each Board submission must be approved by the Community Board at a meeting or extraordinary meeting prior to being submitted to Council. Submissions to the Annual Plan open on 31 March and close on 29 April. Hearings and decisions will be in June.

The next Long Term Council Community Plan year (LTCCP) is 2012. The LTCCP is produced every three years while the Annual Plan is produced in years two and three of the cycle. The LTCCP details all of the Council's activities, and how these activities contribute to Community Outcomes. It describes the Council's budget, explaining what the Council plans to spend over the next 10 years, and shows how Council plans to manage its assets over the 10-year period based on each activity's Asset or Activity Management Plan. This allows the Council to take a long-term view of its responsibilities while enabling it to adjust for changing financial factors and keep its budgets up-to-d


Therefore we also need to consult, investigate and identify projects that would be good to get into the plan for the next 10 years. This will not be part of this year's Annual Plan but it can be noted for inclusion in the submission next year. We will be keen to get some of the identified issues from the recreational survey into that LTCCP but there will be others. Please let members know your thoughts sooner rather than later.

Don't forget to check out the KCB's Facebook page so you can keep up with current issues as they unfold. While January figures are not yet in, from 2 December to 31 December 2010 7,423 Facebook aficionados viewed the KCB Facebook Wall.

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## There is no substitute for hard work and savings

Money — we all need it, especially around this time of the year with Christmas and the holidays taking their toll on our bank balances! Having a sense of security and confidence about the future is mostly about money. We want to see our earning increase. In making ends meet I think people favour increasing income rather than decreasing spending. Over the last decade there has been a huge increase in debt in our country. But there is nothing like paying interest to reduce your spending capacity! The Government has encouraged a turn-around in the economy from borrowing and spending, to saving and investing.

Kiwis paid off about \$5 billion of debt in their homes last year. That's a \$12 billion a year turnaround on the \$7 billion New Zealanders borrowed against their homes at the peak of the housing boom in 2007.

This trend towards saving more builds a strong platform for faster long-term economic growth. Growth matters. It creates jobs. It lifts incomes. It boosts living standards and pays for the world-class health and education services that families need.

I think we're waking up to the realisation that we have to do what we really don't want to do, in order to get what we really want to get. That is, that frugality and tenacity lead to true prosperity.

Recently, Statistics New Zealand released information showing that completing a qualification, particularly at degree level, markedly increases a person's post-study earnings and wage growth. Of students who studied at bachelor level and left study in 2004, those who completed their degree earned an average of 18% more than a person who did not complete their degree.

What does this tell us? Certainly a degree means you have attained a high level of understanding about a subject. But it says more. It shows you've set a goal that has been completed. It shows that you have worked hard at attending lectures, researching and writing assignments, and sitting exams. It shows you've applied the different disciplines necessary to achieve at an advanced level. It shows you've learnt how to learn.

This is a lesson New Zealanders are accepting. High income is based on being skilled, disciplined and hardworking as a person. There is no money-tree to sleep under on a sunny day. To have a high wage society, we need a highly skilled work force — and you don't get there without the disciplines of hard work, both in preparation to enter the workforce and applying yourself once there.



We have some interesting statistics in Taranaki around this subject. At 15 years of age and over 30% of people from Taranaki have no formal gualifications, compared to 25% for the rest of the country. The median personal income for New Zealand as a whole is \$24,400, whereas in the New Plymouth District it is \$22,800. So we see the correlation between gualifications and income.

There are two things we need to build our country. Aptitude and attitude — or put in other words, skill and tenacity. Aptitude is your ability; attitude is your willingness to work, to use your ability to the best. Success is more certain when you apply both! All the best for this coming year. May you succeed in all your endeavours as you apply yourself with all diligence.

including of course the Oakura Beach Carnival, which drew a fantastic crowd of around 7,000 in perfect weather.


The TSB Bank Festival of Lights has once again been a wonderful experience, drawing thousands of visitors from the local community and elsewhere around New Zealand.

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# Local eXposure: DOC update

For all you keen outdoor enthusiasts and for those of you who are tempted but haven't ventured beneath the slopes, here is an update on our beautiful mountain walking tracks and marine areas.

The tracks in the northern end of the Egmont National Park are in reasonable condition. Visitors to the Park may find storm debris and snow damage in some areas from recent storms. Last season a kilometre of new boardwalk on the Mangorei Track was completed with the assistance of the Tramping and Alpine Club volunteers and WINZ employment programmes. Last week another 950m of boardwalk were flown on to the Mangorei Track so contractors could continue with that upgrade. Contracts are also being prepared to upgrade the bottom section of the Mangorei Track and the rest of the Wilkies Pools Track at Dawson Falls this summer season. All the serviced huts have had wood and coal supplies replenished and ash drums replaced.

Discussions are continuing with an Okato local who has proposed that a Trust maintains the Okato Walkway and that an alternate option be considered in replacement of the swing bridge that was removed from the Kaihihi Stream due to flood damage. The proposal is looking promising.

The Pouakai Circuit is a good quality two-day trip starting at North Egmont, where you return via Holly Hut and the Pouakai Range. Please make sure you are well equipped with water, food, sunblock and warm clothes (even if it is a sunny day the weather can still change fast.) This track provides amazing views and requires a reasonable level of fitness.

Dogs continue to be a problem where owners persist in walking them in the Egmont National Park. Not only do they pose a threat to our ground-dwelling native species like kiwi and blue duck but they can also pose a problem to our ground-nesting birds on the foreshore. So please leave your dog walks for the beach. People caught with dogs in the Egmont National Park will be prosecuted.

Recent storms have made it necessary for ranger staff to venture into the Tapuae Marine Park to relocate boundary marker buoys so that the correct fishing boundaries are still in place. When venturing out in boats always remember to wear lifejackets, check the forecast, and place your cell phone in a sealed bag for an emergency if you don't have radio contact.


It is encouraging to hear so many youngsters talking knowledgably about what to do if they discover a fire in their home — how to escape and where to meet. Obviously the efforts put into delivering firewise programmes in our school is working well.

Here are our top safety tips for 2011:

- Check those batteries in the smoke alarms (remember you can't smell when you are asleep).
- Talk to your whanau about what to do if a fire emergency happens (and they do happen).
- Please drive safely, keep to your side of the road, don't assume that it's OK just to pull out onto a road without looking, and pay attention to what is happening around you; good driving is not fast driving!

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# The itching dog

Itching dogs are amongst the most common patients seen at the vet clinic. Itching can result in great frustration for dogs, their owners and also the vets! There are a number of causes but one of the most common seen at this clinic is contact allergy.

Dogs with contact allergies react when they come into contact with particular substances. A very common contact allergen is a weed called Wandering Jew, which is common around this district, especially in the Okato Domain. It often grows in damp, shady areas, and has small, flat, smooth, green leaves and small white flowers in spring and summer. The leaves and stems contain a sap that causes the reaction in sensitised animals. Normally this reaction takes 6 – 9hours to develop. The dog's skin will become itchy and inflamed and will possibly develop raised lumps, especially in areas where there is less hair, for instance in the armpits and on the abdomen.

Sensitive animals are best to avoid contact with Wandering Jew. The clinic has some advice on its removal. If you have eliminated it and still suspect your dog has a contact allergy, veterinary advice should be sought.





## Oakura Surfcasting and Kayak Fishing Club

The fishing has improved with the weather. Lots of fish have been landed over January, including tuna, and Port Taranaki has provided lots of gurnard and snapper. The large snapper schools are still out around the 50–60 metre mark, which is great for boats, but not so easy for kayaks. By now

they should have spawned and be spreading out to beaches and reefs close enough for kayaks and surfcasters to target. Kingfish schools have also been seen and should be out on Oakura reef by now. Surfcasting is improving with snapper coming off most beaches in the north of Taranaki, and some good fish around Opunake.



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# **Oakura Pony Club News**

Well, the Pony Club season is in full swing, and locals may have noticed the Pony Club being used most days for training, and rallies approximately every fortnight. What isn't so noticeable is the number of riders who are currently travelling around the country riding at various events. Oakura Pony Club is unique in that the majority of our riders compete on a regular basis, both as individuals and in teams. And they do extremely well. Hardly surprising when you think that some of New Zealand's best riders actually live in Oakura — what a fantastic example for our young riders!

Our riders get to trial for various teams throughout the season, giving them a chance to represent either the North Taranaki Pony Club Association or the Taranaki Area Pony Club Association. The various disciplines (dressage, show jumping, eventing and games) hold trials throughout the season and riders from our Club consistently win places in these teams. Taranaki Area recently sent a team to the Cambridge Show Jumping Champs and Oakura riders Anna Hinton and Georgia Ferris made it into the team of six. Anna (on Sexy B) got fourth and fifth placings in the Individual Intermediate section, and sixth in the team 'jigsaw', which is where each pair of riders (two senior, two intermediate and two junior) jumps six of 12 jumps in the order they think will be the quickest. Georgia (on My Vagabond) got eighth for the jigsaw, teamed with Phillipa Grayling from Okato Pony Club. Next Georgia Ferris and Molly Lumb head to Taupo to represent Taranaki in the North Island Dressage Champs. More on that event next month!

Dressage Taranaki held their North Island Champs in January and two of our riders also did very well there. Catherine West (on Anarocz) won the Reserve Young Rider Champion, and Jordan Giltrap (on Thunder Mountain Little Ben) won Reserve Pony Champion. This event seemed to be dominated by Oakura riders, with past Oakura Pony Club members Abbie Deken and Vanessa Way winning several classes with several different horses.



## Paul Cracroft Wilson – World Champion

Paul Cracroft Wilson is Taranaki's very own World Champion, Beach Flags Champion that is! Toughing it out amongst the world's best athletes in Egypt 2010 hasn't happened over night. Paul has set his standards high with many years of determination, achieving great results. He began as a cadet with New Plymouth Old Boys Surf Life Saving Club in Oakura, and is now with Fitzroy Surf Life Saving Club.

He answers my questions below ...

"When I first started I really hated the water. I was never a great swimmer when I came along but I found that I was naturally a good sprinter on the sand so I had found my little niche. A whole heap of friends were involved and that made it fun. I can't imagine there are many other sports/ organisations around that have the same social element that surf club provided growing up.

I have been a NZ Surf Team member since 2007, lost it in 2008, no international races in 2009 and then regathered it again in 2010."

#### Inspiration?

"Since 2004 I have been aiming for the World Title. I went to the World Titles in Italy unranked and with no real expectations of making a final let alone getting a medal. Here I finished second in the Interclub competitions to Simon Harris from Australia. I thought that if I could achieve that result by only doing part-time sprint training mixed in with board and ski training, then if I actually went away and put all my efforts into training seriously then I might one day be crowned World Champion!"

#### Highs and lows of being a NZ Team member?

"So far most of the experiences have been very positive. Obviously we get to travel to and race in some cool places, such as Australia, Egypt, Germany, and Italy, to name a few of the recent World Championship locations. The most important part is getting to wear the silver fern and knowing that you have been chosen to represent your country. When you win for your country it is just an amazing feeling. Words can't explain how your body is just engulfed in emotion when you are on the dais with the NZ flag and the national anthem begins to play!

There is a fair bit of pressure on our shoulders knowing that if we don't perform to our best then there is a good chance we will be dropped for the next competition. NZ is very strong in beach sprinters and beach flaggers."

#### 2010 World Titles Experience?

Egypt is a third world country so the conditions we encountered definitely affected everybody's mood. The hygiene was very poor (we had to hand sanitise after touching anything) and the only safe food was food sold through the hotels or the franchise supermarkets. We had to stay away from the food in the markets. Because the food was very different to Western food our bodies reacted differently to it and I know most people had instances of "Egypt belly" as we put it. On our first day of racing I experienced it worst and in the beach flags heats had to shuffle to and from the toilet 6 or 7 times between runs to keep on top of it, not ideal!

Apart from the hygiene and food I thought we had a great

vibe in the team. Everyone bonded really well and being in an environment where everyone is looking after everyone else makes a huge difference.

Now any surf lifesaver knows how intense the Beach Flags Competition is! I guess you can never be certain in beach flags if you're winning or making the top two or three. There are just too many variables that can affect the outcome. At the Worlds I went into the competition knowing that I had a really great chance because I was posting personal best times on the track weeks before I got to Egypt. However it only takes one missed reaction, one stumble, one dropped or missed flag to miss out on the next round. We went through heats, guarters and semis on the first day and then had to come back the next day for a 16-man final where only one person is eliminated at a time. All in all I probably had close to 30 runs, it only takes one of these runs for you to be eliminated so that's why flags is such an exciting event, everyone has to put in 100% each run to make sure of their progression."

#### Who is your biggest rival?

"My two biggest rivals at the moment are Ben Mispelhorn from Australia and Morgan Foster from NZ. Morgan has nine NZ Beach Flags titles and has given me the odd dustup over the odd race each season.

Ben is the new kid on the block. He finished second to me at the World Interclub champs in Egypt and trains with me so we are both pushing each other at every opportunity. " Is there the chance we'll see you back racing in the surf?

"I once raced at national level on paddleboards (knee boards) but decided I had to focus on one aspect of surf sports.

I have actually thought about going back to Nationals and racing in a board or ski race, however I have to bring myself back to reality pretty quickly as its been six years since I trained and raced on these and my body has long been unconditioned to this type of fitness. Realistically it would only be for a laugh or two with my old friends that I used to race with; maybe at next season's Nationals I might make an appearance. South Brighton will be too cold for me this season though."

#### Are you a future IRB racer?

"I did race IRB's for a season or two. I think I broke a couple of bones and got many many strains and bruises. I'll leave that for the petrol heads."

#### Inspirational words for future surf athletes

"Just go out there and give it a good crack. Everyone has the ability to go out and become a World Champion, it just requires a lot of dedication, hard work and professionalism in everything you do."

Tyler Anderson was our only club member competing and he reached the semi-finals in the Open.

OBC club members did not compete in the Hyundai National Surfing Championships held in mid-January in Dunedin. However, Airini Mason, who was once a pupil of Oakura School before moving to Gisborne and then Australia with her family, won the Open Women's Final. She last won the event as a 13 year old in 2004. Airini is now studying at Canterbury University. Another ex-local and one-time member of our club, Greg Page, came second in the Over-55 Men's Final. Taranaki surfer, Jarred Hancox, was the winner of the Over-28 Men's Final, and Kelvin and Murray Weir from Opunake were placed second and third respectively in the Kneeboard Final.

Jay Quinn from Gisborne won the Open Men's Final. I quote from surf.co.nz: "Jay Quinn was unstoppable in the final, posting a near-perfect 18.00 point heat score out of a possible 20 points in a dramatic final filled with world class surfing."

I'm writing this article having just returned from a holiday where Keith and I spent some time in Raglan and a beach nearby called Ruapuke. Luckily we were able to enjoy some uncrowded surf at some of the local breaks. This was not the case, however, for some surfers. 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## Arden Place Christmas Party enjoys a cracker evening




Arden Place welcomes Santa.

# New dance classes in Oakura





# TOM Garden of the Month a natural symphony

Jan and Doug Aiello and their three children have lived in their home on Hurford Road for almost 20 years. When I arrange my visit Jan says, "To find us look out for the keyboard on the mailbox as you drive up the hill." That's because Jan and Doug are lucky enough to have two passions in their lives: gardening and music.

When I arrive Doug is busy in the workshop surrounded by pianos at various stages of restoration, a labour of love and true talent. Jan is busy in the garden. She teaches music in five different schools across Taranaki, that's almost a thousand pupils she says. Her garden is her sanctuary — a place where she can escape for quiet moments of contemplation in harmony with nature. Jan loves to breathe in fresh air, and take time to view the beautiful sea and mountain scenery.

The garden, a third of an acre in area, is set out in secluded sections each edged by a variety of natives, such as cabbage trees, flax and toetoe. On my visit the garden is a symphony of colour from the white blooms of the buddleia cascading like a waterfall, to the electric blue hydrangea. Even the foliage of ornamental grasses and the maple with its elegant red leaves add notes of colour to the green canvas. As I turn each corner a new secret garden opens up, areas with benches and chairs for entertaining and enjoying the tranquillity of the garden; the air full of perfume from the roses and lavender. As I look deeper into the foliage ornamental features appear; the china kingfisher on the ponga stump looking out over the birdbath and the mosaic tiles hidden amongst hostas.

I ask Jan what she is working on at the moment. "Mulching," she says, "lots of it". Her aim is to cut back the weeds and keep in the moisture for the plants. "And of course there's always the veggie garden to tackle," she says. She takes me to an area partitioned by magnificent wrought iron gates and explains that she has let it go a little this year but is keen to attack it again; it's amazing how quickly the weeds can take over!

Thank you, Jan, for your time and allowing me into your sanctuary.

Jan and Doug's passion for music and gardening run hand in hand; a garden being a never-ending composition.

# **Chop chop for the Dragon**

Late last year I visited the garden of Willy and Adrie Klever in Hussey Street to see a jaw-dropping and nose-pinching flower bloom. Willy thought the flower might be a specimen of the Giant Titan Arum but this is an exceedingly rare and difficult plant to grow and I had my doubts.

I have discovered it is a Dracunculus vulgaris or Stink Lily. Willy had several flowering in her garden and the plants have taken six years to bloom, with the first flowering in 2009. Willy had acquired the plant from a friend, Pat Holmes. The flowers are jaw-dropping and nose-pinching because of the size and colour of the spathe and the spadix within the flower, and also the foul smell coming from the

flower. The spathe is a deep purple/maroon/black colour not commonly seen in the garden. The spadix is the butt of many a joke in the Klever household with Willy likening it to a certain appendage belonging to her dear Adrie and she wickedly chuckles about Adrie getting the "chop chop!"

Dracunculus vulgaris belongs to the Araceae family and is related to the well-known Arum. Dracunculus vulgaris is often called Dragon Arum, Voodoo Lily, Dragonwort, or Stink Lily. In Greece it is called Drakondia and the species originates from the island of Crete. Like all Araceae, it prefers fertile moist soil. The foliage is very attractive and distinctive and the stalks (actually pseudostems) have as few as 2-4 large leaves on the top. The plant is a rather robust, solitary (seldom clump-forming) herb, sometimes up to 2m high. The pseudostems are 0.5m to more than 1.5m long, pale to light-grey-green with numerous jagged dark purple to almost black markings, stout and capable of supporting an inflorescence or flower stem of over 1m in length without the need for additional support. But the beauty of the foliage barely hints at what is to come: as the inflorescence unfolds, it reveals a long, black appendage from the centre, known as the spadix, which can reach a total length of 135cm enveloped by a large very deep purpleblack bract (the spathe), which can reach a total length of 125cm. What looks like one flower is in reality an inflorescence of a spadix, bearing numerous flowers. In most plants the inflorescence is not longer than 40 or 50cm still impressive enough!

The actual flowers, both male and female, are hidden deep inside the spathe, which features a bulbous chamber. The striking beauty of this plant can be a little shocking: like many Araceae the mature inflorescence spreads a nasty odour. The nasty smell of rotting meat is designed to attract flies for pollination. Fortunately the smell usually lasts for only one day.

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#### Gardening with Rosemary Herb February Checklist

#### Vegetables:

Continue planting lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, brussel sprouts, carrots, parsnip and leeks. Spray at first sign of caterpillars or whitefly with "Target", a general garden insecticide or "Nature's Way Insect Spray" for organic gardeners.

#### Flowers:

To ensure maximum growth and flowering, deadhead to extend flowering, obviously watering our drought consumed gardens isn't a problem so don't worry about the watering!! Feed with Thrive soluble Fertiliser or Lush Liquid Fertiliser. Water regularly to keep plants growing. Mulching will help conserve water.

#### Fruit Trees:

Summer pruning of stone fruit trees following harvesting of crops reduces the risk of silver leaf disease later in the season.





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
