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Mayor Andrew Judd

Hi everyone.

The Council has now formally adopted the Annual Plan 2016/17. I'm really pleased that our efforts to keep rates rises down is paying off, with the general rates rise of 3.6 per cent being lower than the 4.6 per cent forecast in the Long-Term Plan 2015-2025.

However, for the average residential ratepayer the rise will be just 2.7 per cent – or about \$1 a week more.

For that, we get \$37 million of capital projects across a variety of Council activities, including wastewater treatment, roading, water supply, LED streetlighting, digital customer services and stormwater drainage.

Thank you to everyone who took part in this process by sending in a submission to the draft plan!

Annual NRB survey

Every year we survey residents on how well the Council is delivering its services and facilities, and communicating with the public.

The latest survey has found that 84 per cent of respondents were satisfied with how rates are spent on services and facilities – an improvement on 82 per cent in the 2015 survey and 80 per cent in in 2014.

Sixty-one per cent of respondents said there was something the Council had done well in the past year, up from 57 per cent in the 2015 survey and 52 per cent in 2014.

We've also had a big tick of approval about the improved rubbish and recycling service, and received higher satisfaction ratings than peer local authorities in numerous areas including car parking, sewerage, swimming pools, water supply and roads.

There are some less positive results that we'll need to address but overall the survey suggests people are largely happy with Council services and facilities – something that we intend to build on.

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Helping Kiwi Kids Achieve

The 2015 NCEA final results are the best ever achieved by New Zealand students. I want to congratulate the students, their teachers, their parents, their principals, and all the people who supported them to achieve.

Final roll-based results show Level 1, 2, and 3 NCEA achievement rates rose by between 1.5 and 3.2 percentage points last year to 74.4, 76.4, and 62.7 per cent respectively. Since National took office in 2008, Level 2 achievement rates have risen 16.6 per cent.

Under National, its clear children are starting school better prepared to learn and leaving school better qualified and prepared for higher education or the workforce.

We know we have to keep doing more. So we've created Communities of Learning to keep striving for higher achievement. We want to encourage collaboration between our schools, so they share expertise and work together to raise student achievement.

We are putting Kiwi kids' learning at the centre of what we're doing in education.

For the first time, the Government is investing more than \$11 billion in education.

This year we are targeting the increase in operational funding to schools with students who need the most support.

We know from our Social Investment research that students from long-term welfare-dependent families are at greater risk of educational under-achievement than their peers. So we are investing \$43 million over four years to support around 150,000 students from long-term welfaredependent families.

We want to get the right resources to the rights kids at the right time.

In line with directing extra funding to where it's most needed, we're putting an extra \$42.1 million over the next four years into services for students with special needs.

We also want to make sure we're addressing population and roll growth and providing flexible spaces to support innovative learning environments for Kiwi kids.

This means \$882.5 million is going towards school property, including 480 new classrooms, nine new schools,

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two school expansions, and the relocation and rebuilding of three schools and a kura.

We recently had Minister Nikki Kaye here to announce funding for two new classrooms for Mangorei School and four new classrooms for Te Pi'ipi'inga Kakano Mai Rangiatea. It is great to see the investment in our local schools.

I'm proud to be part of a Government committed to investing in our children's educational futures, to give them their best chance to learn and succeed.

It was a real privilege recently to be present at local Oakura resident Ivor Ellis's investiture with France's highest honour, the Legion D'Honneur by French Ambassador Florence Jeanblanc-Risler in front of more than 100 friends, family, RSA members, New Plymouth District Deputy Mayor Heather Dodunski and Councillors Harry Duynhoven and Richard Handley at the Summerset Mountain View retirement village. Ivor, a World War Two veteran, now 92, took part in August, 1944 on a minesweeper in the Allied invasion of southern France two months after the D Day Normandy landings. His HMML minesweeper swept the way ashore prior to an amphibious assault by elements of the U.S. Seventh Army, landing at first light and under heavy fire. Ivor has played a leading role in the Okato RSA branch for many years

A shout out as well to Elaine Shen Rollins for the tremendous effort she went to in organising the catering at the Oakura and Okato stopovers of the recent Peace March. Elaine was the catalyst to ensure that other local folk became involved, provided food, did kitchen duties, and set up and cleared up the two halls. Winter Warmers

With winter on its way, there is no better time to start

looking at ways of saving on power and at the same time making your winter nest warm and cosy. With the new LED technology getting cheaper all the time, this is a great place to start. Recessed LED lights have, in my mind, "filled a gap"



in the market which has existed since the advent of recessed lighting.

For a long time halogen recessed lights were being installed, which on average used 50 watts per lamp. Because of the nature of the lamp being like a spot-light you needed up to 50 lights per dwelling. On this calculation you would have 2500 watts of power running if you were to leave all the lights on (and if you have kids, you know this happens). So this power consumption was equal to the power consumed by a small uneconomical oil heater.

Compare this to the new recessed LED lights on the market which use an average of only 13 watts, you can illuminate the same home for 650 watts which is around 25% consumption compared to the halogen fittings.

Aside from this, the installation of halogen fittings created a fire risk because they heated up so much, this meant you had to leave large holes in the roof insulation. In a large living area you would have up to 14 holes in an open plan, living, kitchen, dining area, letting the hot air rise from your home into the roof space. This would amount to having a 1.26 metre hole in the ceiling, obstructed only by a flimsy light fitting. The new LED fittings are solid airtight units which enable you to place insulation over the top and prevent heat escaping.

You will not regret installing new LED technology, they will pay for themselves in less than two years, no need to



worry about changing lamps for 10 years, plus the heat saving benefits will go on for a life time.

Quite often when we have burglaries and other incidents we ask the public for help to solve these sorts of crimes. A good deal of our incidents are solved with public information and, as I like to say, you are the eyes and ears of the community.

It is highly likely that the offenders parked a vehicle beside the grass verge opposite the Oakura campground toilet and laundry block on Jans Terrace. Ivor Ellis

As many locals will know Ivor Ellis was recently presented with the Legion D'Honneur from the French ambassador here in New Zealand, Florence Jeanblanc-Risler, for his efforts in helping free the French people from the German invasion in World War II.

Ivor is one of only a couple of surviving WWII veterans who are members of the Okato RSA and at 92, age is catching up with Ivor. He now resides in the beautiful Summerset Retirement Village having lived in Oakura some 60 years.

The Legion D'Honneur has been awarded to 25 Kiwi and British veterans and Ivor says it means a lot to him to have been awarded the medal.

Ivor was on board the minesweeper HMML 565 during Operation Dragoon as a gunner firing 22mm tracer when they attacked the Germans at Provence on August 15 1944. In true Ivor style he says he went to war as an 18 year old because he wanted to be an active citizen for his country. Since coming to New Zealand Ivor has indeed been very active in our province with affiliations with tramping clubs, athletics clubs and race walking clubs as well as taking in many marathons, half marathons, fun run/walk events and relays. Part of his life's work involved building tracks and huts within Egmont National Park and building the Motorua Wharf.

Ivor we salute you and are glad you enjoyed your day of glory receiving your Legion D'Honneur. Ivor chuckles and says he made no "faux pas" on the day so he is happy!

Well behaved, caring, takes care of me. When I fell off he came over to me and sniffed me to make sure I was ok.


Favourite place to ride your pony?

"It was a great game, loads of fun and fair," quoted Samuel Salisbury.


"The netball game had loads of pace and had lots of intercepts,"commented Kate Hilliam. The score was 20-1 to Oakura .

In John's words the most important rooms for building relationships were the classroom and the living room, and both need a teacher.



Greetings to the Oakura and Omata community!

As we wind down towards the end of the term at Spotswood College we find ourselves looking to the future and thinking about the next steps in our learning journey at school. We ask our students to think deeply about their progress and start considering the possibilities of career pathways, University education and course selection. As a school we are thinking about what we can do better to improve outcomes for our students; we ask our students the same questions!.

REPORTS: Making Meaning

Tracey Lawrence and Paula Cast, our Year 9 and 10 Student Achievement Facilitators, have thought deeply about how we can better bring reports to life. The Year 9 and 10 reports have just been published and in layman's terms we have just "cut to the chase' and kept reports focussed on feedback (what is going well or not so well) and feed forward (what needs to happen to increase success). These reports give information to parents but the question we have asked ourselves is how do we get students to engage with what has been written?

As part of our whanau time programme we are asking students to write a personal reflection of how they are going. This self-assessment forms an important part in establishing the skills and goals they need to work on to ensure success. Leading from this self-assessment students engage in academic mentoring with whanau teachers where goal setting occurs within timelines and milestones set between the student and the teacher. By allowing students the opportunity to be a part of their decision making and setting their own goals we believe the students become less of a 'passenger' and more of a 'driver' of their own learning.

RECENT VISITS FROM CONTRIBUTING SCHOOLS

We are lucky to have groups of students from contributing schools visit Spotswood College. Most recently we have had Oakura students visit. They took part in a range of lessons including maths where they stretched their brain in an interactive quiz; in science where they performed some experiments with 'dry ice' and in social studies


