



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kaitake community board

By the time you are reading this the hearings on the Long Term Community Plan will have been held, and the deliberations will have started on whether to make any further changes to the Plan before it is signed off and becomes the blueprint for the direction of the community for the next three years. While the plan is a ten-year strategy setting out where the community wants to go, it must be reviewed every three years. The Council's budget relates directly to the Plan.

Meetings and workshops continue unabated. The recent Campground and the Rural Subdivision reviews have taken up a large chunk of time. The submission discussions have been most interesting. There is a strong body of opinion that "one hat does not fit all" when it comes to developing operating rules for the campgrounds. What is very important in one locality may not be viewed as such in another. However one theme running through a large number of submissions is that the community is keen to retain the concept of a Kiwi holiday. The notion that a tent site and basic amenities are the main ingredients for such a holiday should be remembered.

With regards to the rural subdivision submissions, what I found interesting is that a far different cohort of submitters was making its presence felt. Where once upon a time things rural were very much the domain of farmers and their organisations like Federated Farmers, this time many submissions came from that diverse group loosely termed "lifestylers". The nature of the rural countryside is changing quite dramatically. Terms such as "reverse sensitivity", "rural character", and "landscape values", never mentioned even ten years ago, are very much to the fore. Some of the country roads in our patch have no (or very few) farmers still operating farm units there so what does rural mean in those circumstances? There is increased traffic on rural roads too, with major maintenance issues for council as a result. Lifestylers generally want smaller blocks than they currently have, while farmers, in the main, don't want to see good, productive land cut up further (as long as they can still subdivide theirs!). There will be much more debate and discussion on the rural issue during the rest of this year and beyond. For me, I await with interest what the official definitions of "rural character" and "significant landscape value" turn out to be.

Locally there has been a diverse set of issues to deal with. The sewerage project proceeds unabated, and those joining the scheme need to consider applying for the consent from Council to lay pipes from their boundary to the connection point and get the work underway.

There is growing tension between surfers about the number of vehicles accessing the Kumara Patch down the track at the end of Kaihihi Road and along the beach. There are those that are adamant all vehicle access should be stopped and there are those that are just as adamant that vehicle access should continue. There is a statement elsewhere in this issue from the Department of Conservation on this matter. Do you have an opinion on this?

Oakura School students will soon be involved in a further planting of trees on the Kaitake Ranges and will also help with more foreshore planting of marram grass to help stabilise the dune areas to the west of the campground.

A request has been made to Council to replace the Oakura Hall stage curtains, and we are hopeful we will receive a positive response. The old curtains have been there for the past fifty years or so. The Hall Committee is undertaking the painting of the supper room to complement the new interior repaint of the main hall area. Ash Heydon, of Heydon Priest

Garage, has very generously offered to contribute the paint. The Hall Committee intends to have a painting working bee on Sunday 7 June at 10.30am to get the job done. If you can lend a hand then bring a roller or a good paintbrush and come along.



Housebound Service: This is a free service available to people who love to read but aren't able to get to the library. A volunteer will select books based on the patron's tastes and deliver them on a fortnightly or monthly basis anywhere in the Oakura area. Our records ensure that the same book is not selected a second time.

Free Internet Access: This service is available to library patrons and non-patrons as well. Broadband, Skype, a range of Microsoft packages and printing are available. We also have a photocopier and fax machine at a minimal charge.

Preparing New Zealand for the road to recovery

Although New Zealand has clearly not escaped the global downturn, fortunately the impact here has been far less severe than we have seen in parts of the United States and Europe due largely to the stability of our banking and financial systems. Since the election it has become clear that the international economic downturn will be deeper and longer than commentators expected.

This Government came into office with a plan to lift New Zealand's economic performance after a decade of under performance and missed opportunities. The deepening global recession has reinforced the need for us to implement that plan with even more urgency and focus.

It goes without saying that the Budget was prepared against a backdrop of global and domestic economic conditions considered unthinkable – even by the most pessimistic forecasters – just one year ago. Just about every unlikely event has occurred and worst case scenario has become a reality as evidenced by the United States decision to subsidise their export dairy products and the EU also returning to export subsidies.

Despite the tide of global and domestic bad news of recent months, the Government remains optimistic about New Zealand's prospects. One of the reasons is the resilience it is seeing from New Zealanders in businesses and talking to ordinary Kiwis across the country.

The Government is not saying that the rest of 2009 and 2010 will be easy. Conditions will remain difficult. But the vast majority of New Zealanders, who have kept their jobs, have actually got a bit more cash in their pockets than they did six months ago.

They've seen the tax cuts introduced by the previous government last October; another round of tax cuts by this Government on April 1; and many people with a mortgage have already benefited from the sharp fall in interest rates triggered by the Reserve Bank's unprecedented monetary policy easing.

This month's Budget has set out the National-led Government's plan for the future of New Zealand's economy and will put in place steps to take the sharp edges off this recession.

We have several goals in our sights:

1 We'll get our debt under control and turning down

2 We'll help create new jobs to replace those being lost in the current market

3 We'll improve New Zealand's international competitiveness

4 We'll create an environment where businesses thrive and where people want to live and work

5 We'll raise New Zealanders' living standards

6 And we'll create a government sector that provides better services and delivers better value for taxpayers.

The Prime Minister has made clear this Government's aspirations for an economy that values enterprise, rewards people for effort and encourages them to get ahead under their own steam.

In the current environment, that will be challenging – there is a huge degree of uncertainty about how long the recession might continue. But we're up for the challenge.

We have a unique opportunity to improve New Zealand's

standard of living and economic performance relative to other countries.

The National-led Government intends to take that opportunity. The Budget this month will provide the next steps in that plan and set out a credible road to recovery that New Zealand needs and deserves.

Oven Baked Lamb Chops with Onion and Rosemary Sauce

Serves 4 INGREDIENTS

12 lamb loin chops 1 onion, chopped Salt and ground pepper

Sauce

2 onions, chopped fine 1 Tbs rosemary 40g butter 40g plain flour 200ml milk, warmed200m vegetable stock 2 Tbs cream Salt and ground pepper

Place the lamb chops on a shallow roasting tray and surround with the chopped onion. Season and bake on the top shelf of the oven at 180C for 30 minutes.

Begin the sauce. Melt the butter in a saucepan and sweat the onions over low heat for 5 minutes. Add the rosemary and sweat until the onions are soft and have no colour. Stir in the flour with a wooden spoon until smooth. Gradually add the warmed milk and stock, bit-by-bit, stirring vigorously.

Season with salt and pepper and let simmer for 2 minutes while stirring.

Remove from the heat. If desired liquidise to make a smooth sauce or leave and serve chunky.

Serve the lamb chops with the sauce on the side in a jug. Accompanying with minted peas and mashed potatoes makes for a great meal. Enjoy!

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Oakura Tennis - Soffe Cup Team



The one silver lining of Saturday's match is that Hardie-Boys and Mitchell remain undefeated in doubles. 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Pony Club

Following the final trial at Hawera, Anna Hinton, riding Sexy B, was picked to be part of the six-member team to represent Taranaki. The Horse Trials Team Championships were held at Puhinui Reserve near Auckland Airport. The Taranaki team competed well in dressage on the first day of competition, and the combined score from the six riders gave the team first place for the dressage trophy. On the second day a variety of faults in jumping meant the team did not feature in the final overall placings.

The 2010 NZPCA Horse Trials will be held at Hawera next year. This is a great event for horse-loving spectators to have an opportunity to see the best young eventing riders from all over New Zealand compete at one venue.


The Boardriders Longboard comp was held late April with Brian Clarke once again taking honours, 2nd Chris Davies, 3rd Paul Lobb.



Overall most people really enjoyed the day and I'm sure that the majority of students are hoping they will get another chance to do it all again.



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Mini Groovers


If you are a parent of a pre-schooler, why not come and join our weekly Tuesday morning session of music and movement in the Oakura Hall?



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
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Flower garden:

Cut back, lift and divide perennials such as asters, achilleas, dahlias and phlox. There's still time to plant lilies. Plant new roses. Rose pruning can start late this month. Prune deciduous trees in dry weather. Mulch all plants with compost.

Kitchen garden:

Plant strawberry plants.

Plant new trees, citrus, apples, pears, plums, peaches and nectarines. Spray deciduous fruit trees with Champion Copper and Conqueror Oil to protect from pests and diseases.

Plant asparagus crowns into well drained soil.

Plant seedlings of cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, winter lettuce, spinach and silverbeet.
