

We've started to feel the chill of winter around the region after what was a warm (if chaotic, weather-wise) autumn.

Oakura has had more than its fair share of dramatic weather over the last three or four years. A reminder of the 2007 tornadoes came with a small twister just outside Oakura in mid-May, which caused some damage and also cut power to 1,500 homes. We can't control the weather, obviously, but we can control how we respond to it. The Oakura community is such a tightknit one that when disaster happens — be it on a large scale, or to a single family — people readily help each other to get back

Here's hoping that we have a guiet weather pattern over winter and can enjoy clear, sunny days during the colder months!

Oakura Sewerage System

Household connections to the reticulation are moving at a very good pace. So far more than 160 connections have been made. At this rate we are on track to have all of the registered homes hooked into the sewerage system by the deadline of January next year. If you haven't contacted a plumber yet to organise your home's connection to the lateral, be sure to get onto it so that the work can be scheduled for completion on time.

Draft Budget 2010/11

By now the Council has heard all of the public submissions on the draft Budget 2010/11 and has deliberated on the final document. I'd like to thank everyone who took the time to read the draft document and make submissions on what they would like to see for the coming year.

This year the Council completed a comprehensive review of the organisation's levels of service across the board, and made significant savings before public consultation even began. Even with this groundwork, however, it is never easy to strike a balance between delivering what people want, and keeping rates as low as possible. Our focus is always on continuing to grow this district at an affordable rate, so that we continue to be the best place to live, love, work and visit in New Zealand.

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kaitake community board

The Kaitake Community Board (KCB) has had a fairly quiet month but there have still been those regular meetings to attend and issues to address. The Board has also completed its three verbal submissions to Council on the New Plymouth District Council Draft Budget. Council received 143 submissions in total on the draft plan, which is a great level of feedback on what is the foundation document of Council activities for the coming year.

Council has invited four contractors to submit tenders to construct the erosion protection works on the Waimoku Stream. The protection will consist of a gabion basket wall and rock riprap lining on the stream banks. It is necessary to prevent further damage to the Oakura Beach Camp building. The stream flow has undermined the building foundations so the concrete pad behind the shop, the fence and lean-to shed will also need to be replaced as part of the project.

As the colder months get closer and storm action becomes more pro-nounced, we continue to monitor the state of sand on the beach foreshore from Timaru Headland to Oakura River. It's heartening to see the size of the current sand buffer between the waves and the dunes. Over the past three years there has

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been extensive planting of spinifex and pingao along this strip. The spinifex grass and pingao sedge are both natives and, as they can tolerate high winds, salt spray and shifting sands, they play an important role in New Zealand's dune ecosystems.

The Blue Flag Stakeholders Committee has held a debriefing exercise. The Committee, consisting of representatives from Taranaki Regional Council, Department of Conservation, Taranaki District Health Board, New Plymouth Old Boys (NPOB) Surf Club, Oakura Boardriders, Oakura School and the KCB met with Council officers recently to discuss issues that had arisen over the summer months, and look at best practice and ways to improve facilities and services for next year.

The next KCB meeting will be held at the NPOB Surf Club on Tuesday 27 July at 4pm.

Letter To The Editor

The Second World War

World War II produced a staggering array of vehicles, aeroplanes and shipping, along with millions of people conscripted to fight each other.

For example, the English came up with the Spitfire and Lancaster, whilst the Americans developed the Flying Fortress, Liberator and the Boeing B29. The Mustang, Thunderbolt and Corsair were complemented by the GMC Deuce-and-a Half, the Jeep, and the Sherman Tank.

The marine equivalent was astounding. Warships and Liberty Boats were produced in their thousands. The record for a keel to launching of the *Robert G Peary* Liberty Boat was 111.5 hours plus three days' fitting out.

Then, in contrast, the Germans produced the Messerschmitt 109, the FW 190, the ME 262 jet fighter and a multitude of bombers. Their tanks and anti-aircraft guns were formidable.

The Japanese produced an enormous array of armaments, which were utilised at Pearl Harbour, Midway, the Coral Sea battle and the infamous Marianas Turkey Shoot.

Then there were Radar, the Norden bombsight, the snorkel, Asdic, mines, torpedoes, the 10-ton bomb and finally, the atomic bomb developed.

The civil engineering of bridges, roads, harbours and airfields throughout the Pacific and Europe was mind-boggling, as was the Berlin Airlift.

In the same timeframe, the Waiwhakaiho Bridge and associated traffic flow has stumped the intelligentsia. The glaringly obvious route of utilising the Smart Road to the Port railway corridor as a city bypass, is ignored. I know what the Marines would have done during the war given the same problem.

Budget 2010: Building Towards Recovery

Those of you of a certain age will remember Arnold Nordmeyer's budget of 1958. At a time when the country was experiencing a balance of payments crisis, he brought down what was termed "the Black Budget". It was widely criticised for its puritanical social reforms, with sales tax raised on many items including beer and cigarettes. The fact that Nordmeyer was reported neither to smoke nor drink alcohol made his budget measures all the more unwelcome.

Budgets have always met with varying responses and, depending on their content, often find they have gained a nickname such as "the Chewing Gum Budget" or "the Mother of All Budgets".

Whatever Budget 2010 becomes known as, it is focused squarely on getting the economy growing faster and helping Kiwi families get ahead by setting New Zealand on a path to turn back debt and return to surplus. This Budget builds on our economic recovery and tilts the economy so that faster growth comes in the right places.

Across-the-board personal tax cuts and a package of tax changes will boost economic growth, make the tax rules fairer and help hard-working Kiwis get ahead. The tax reforms will leave a person on the average wage almost \$15 a week better off, and a family on the average household income with two children will be about \$25 per week better off. It gives the vast bulk of Kiwis extra cash in their pockets so they have more choices.

Despite the tight fiscal environment, we are helping families and the most vulnerable by investing hundreds of millions of dollars more in priority social services such as hospitals, schools, and safer communities.

For too long, New Zealand has relied on investment in property speculation, rising debt, and unsustainable increases in government spending. The Budget takes action to encourage investment in the productive parts of the economy, such as exporting, as well as continuing this Government's multi-billion dollar investment in infrastructure, such as high-speed broadband, roads, rail, and schools, and substantial investment in research, science, and technology. Next year, the company tax rate will fall to 28%, ensuring New Zealand is competitive internationally.

The National-led Government is tackling rising debt, and Kiwis will see a return to surplus in the Government accounts three years sooner than forecast last year. We're investing \$321 million over four years in new initiatives in science, research, and technology — a key driver for a faster growing economy.

We are putting an extra \$2.1 billion into frontline healthcare over the next four years, and an extra \$1.4 billion into better schools and early childhood education services.

Across Government departments, we have identified \$1.8 billion of low-priority spending to be freed up for priority areas such as healthcare, education, and keeping New Zealand communities safe.

We owe it to hard-working Kiwi families to provide them with the financial security, opportunities, and higher incomes that allow them to get ahead in this country.

Budget 2010 does these things and sets out a path to build on our economic recovery.

Oakura Pony Club News

After a busy season of show jumping, show hunter, dressage, games and eventing, the pony club season is finally coming to an end. Oakura Pony Club traditionally ends the season with a local gymkhana. In the past few years we have had the privilege of holding our gymkhana at local farms owned by the Rooks, and later the Bolstads, but this year we have fewer farming families so decided to hold it at our own Pony Club. Some bright person decided Mother's Day would be an ideal day to hold the gymkhana, so breakfast in bed, chocolates, and the usual blissful lie-in were put aside to float ponies to the Pony Club. Fortunately, it was another gorgeous autumn day in Oakura, so it wasn't too burdensome sitting watching the kids ride and setting up jumps between classes.

The day started with flat classes. To the untrained eye, this just looks like a bunch of ponies going round in a circle at various speeds. Round and round they go until surely the judges must be dizzy. But to the trained eye (well, in this case the judges — thanks so much Jean Cook and Peita Kensington, our guest judges), there is a certain way that a pony should hold itself, a rider should hold their hands and place their feet, and that they should look together. And of course, they are judged on how clean and well cared for their pony looks, and whether they are wearing correct attire that is clean and correctly fitting. Ribbons are awarded for each category.

Then everyone moved into the arena to jump. The littlies started off jumping at 40cm, then the jumps were raised gradually until 1m for the bigger kids. To finish off, we held a two-fence challenge where the height of the second jump is increased until the rider wants to stop or the horse knocks a pole. This year the challenge winner was Bronte Alder, who retired after jumping a clear 1.20m.

We are sad to see a number of our riders move on this year, some to university, some to other pursuits. We would, of course, like to see the Club grow, and to try and attract new riders or local riders who are not sure about which club to join, we will be holding lessons over winter at the arena. We have a couple

Local lad named in NZ Under-20 Rugby Squad



NPOB Surf Club


Welcome to our New Plymouth Old Boys (NPOB) Surf Club update.

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




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Oakura school news

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
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
