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Elaine Rollins makes art accessible at Govett Brewster

Have you ever wondered why a diving board would be inside in the middle of a room? Or why scaffolding poles are set up when there's no building happening? Or where Len Lye came from and why is he revered?

Oakura residents Elaine Rollins, Ellie Field, and Rosie Moyes are in the team offering answers to these kind of questions about contemporary art at the Govett-Brewster Art Gallery/Len Lye Centre.

Elaine, who moved to Taranaki from San Francisco, is part of the team stationed in the galleries, six days a week giving gallery goers 'ins' to the artworks. Staff have also recently started hosting free, weekly Exhibition Insights on Sundays, 2 – 3pm.

Elaine says the Govett-Brewster team encourages visitors to ask questions to help them engage with the artists' ideas and processes.

"At the gallery we believe art can challenge conventions and our beliefs in society. Contemporary art is a form of critical thinking and may well be challenging to its audiences. We're here to help people interpret the artworks and contemplate the artists' viewpoints," Elaine says.

Entry to the gallery is free, although donations are appreciated. Please note the gallery is closed on Tuesdays, except for WOMAD weekend and ANZAC Day. Earlier opening hours also for WOMAD.

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This year, 543 schools will take part in Fruit in Schools, which sees high quality seasonal fruit and vegetables delivered each week. Over 104,000 students will benefit from the Fruit in Schools programme which will also help teach them how to live a healthy and balanced lifestyle. Here in the New Plymouth electorate we have seven schools taking part in this programme which is fantastic.

Up to 24 different types of fruits and vegetables are on the menu throughout the country and more than 20 million servings of produce will be dished up over the year.

The Government invests about \$8 million into the Fruit in Schools programme each year. This is being supported by the extra \$568 million going into Health for 2016/17.

Fruit in Schools complements the Government's Childhood Obesity Plan. New Zealand is one of the first OECD countries to have a target and a comprehensive plan to tackle childhood obesity.

The Raising Healthy Kids target was introduced in 2016 and aims to ensure that through the B4 School Check, kids and their families are put in touch with primary healthcare professionals who can check for any clinical risk associated with obesity, encourage families to take action and monitor growth

The B4 School Check programme continues to perform well, reaching 92 per cent of all four-year olds for the second year in a row since 2014/15.

In the six months to the end of December 2016, 29,796 four-year-olds were screened, an increase on the 29,612 screened in the same period in 2015.

In 2015/16 uptake of the B4 School Check was also 93 per cent among those living in high deprivation areas.

All families are encouraged to participate in the free health check. B4 School Check providers are working with other services such as early childhood education, and focusing on hard to reach communities to encourage uptake.

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Kaitake Community Board

Well our summer weather (except for a few sunny blips) continues unabated. It has been an entirely forgettable season altogether. Regardless of the weather though your community board has had quite a large range of things that has required attention.

By the time you are reading this I am hopeful that the traffic slowing project at the beach end of AhuAhu Road will have been completed by Fulton Hogan. The number of vehicles and the speed they travel at has increased substantially over the past few years, making the road end particularly dangerous for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders. We have also been chasing up the NZ Transport Agency to do something about the malfunctioning electronic sign in the dip by Oakura Hall. It has been out of action since mid November and the NZTA have told us they will be replacing it. NZTA also told us last year that they had major improvements planned for the Corbett Park-Victoria Road-eastern village entrance area this year. This project came about through the stirring efforts of Sarah Ashworth and others to do something about this particularly dangerous stretch of highway and we will continue to pester away until the project is undertaken.

We have just finished the community engagement exercise in Okato, gathering data to feed into the board's Community Plan. We had over 120 responses to our survey that set out to learn as much as possible about the direction Okato wants to develop over the next 30 years. The Community Plan is a new initiative by Council and the work we have done will enable Okato's vision to be clearly understood by the decision makers. It will provide the opportunity for its goals and objectives to be turned into comprehensive plans, programmes and services to be prioritised in the Council's long term plans and strategies.

We carried out this exercise in Oakura during 2015/16 and plan to do the same in Omata, commencing shortly. The work we have done here and in Okato began as a journey of inquiry but in both instances became an insightful study of both those communities. The success of this project to date is entirely due to the way we went about it. We worked hard at building trust in the project through involving representatives of all sections of the community and always strived to make decisions collaboratively to achieve that end goal. It is a far more rational way of working than the 'top down' approach pursued by Council over so many of the years post 1989 when the new Local Government Act came into force.

It was great to see the Oakura School kids out and about doing their annual street and beach clean-up recently. This is a longstanding and very popular tradition of Oakura School, beginning back in 1972. Applying the concept of 'Think Globally, Act Locally' it was a pleasure to behold this army of determined conservationists marching down the road

to the beach and eagerly hunting for every piece of rubbish they could find. The classes gradually worked their way towards Corbett Park where they deposit their bags of rubbish for the Council to collect. The project was followed by a barbecue lunch, a swim in the river, and some fun and games on the park. The day was rained upon at first but if anything that just added too the great experience of the day for all concerned.

Well that's it for this issue. This year will be another busy one for us. In a diverse and expanding community it is important to stay on top of all developments – they will certainly keep coming at us. Therefore we all need to stay on track and make sure 2017 is a memorable one for us all. Don't forget to check out the KCB's Face Book page so you can keep up with current issues as they unfold.

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
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Oakura Tennis Club



This was in support of the Taranaki Regional Council's plan to 'protect, enhance and promote' Key Native Ecosystems throughout the Taranaki region. The TRC is working with willing private landowners to identify and promote the protection of native biodiversity values. Each year the Council prepares new Biodiversity Plans for areas of ecological significance and targets assistance to landowners willing to actively manage their sites. The Council is happy to receive any enquires about biodiversity values and management and can undertake site assessments to provide landowners with information about the biodiversity values of their site. biodiversity plan. Last year we set up effective pest control with senior students managing and recording the trapping programme. This year it will be the many weed invaders that will be the major focus of the students' attention. While it is only a small pocket of coastal lowland rain forest it contains many mature pukatea and tawa trees. It also provides the school the many varied learning opportunities with a strong conservation focus. Having support from the Taranaki Regional Council has given all this a renewed impetus and being part of wider Taranaki programme make it very real for the students involved.
