# Oakura to Tijuana – Playground to Poverty

Nine people have recently returned from a life changing experience in the slums of Tijuana, Mexico. Tom and Suzanne Smithers along with seven young people, five of them from Omata/Oakura made the courageous decision to travel to Tijuana to make war on poverty by helping build houses and schools.

Tom and Suzanne are the co-ordinators of a local youth group called Body and Soul Taranaki and this couple devote endless hours supporting young people and helping them reach their potential. So when the group wanted to do something to help people in poverty, a trip to Wellington to Fuse (Youth Group Centre) and meeting the Global Tribe team was the catalyst for doing so. Each young person had to raise \$3,800 to get to Mexico and everyone threw themselves into fundraising, especially Suzanne!

Mereana Hooker, Brooke Moses, Byron, Crystal and Amber Smithers, Courtney Rose and Cerise Janaway-Davis, along with Tom and Suzanne, packed their bags and headed off to Mexico at the end of September for 12 days, little knowing what was ahead of them. Another 36 people travelled to Mexico from Wellington. This was clearly going to be hard work and not a resort holiday. And work hard they did. Suzanne says she is very proud of the way everyone from New Plymouth worked so incredibly hard.

Once the team had unpacked, they spent half a day learning how the houses are put together and how the building teams operate, then it was down to work. Everyone was in a team of ten building a house and Brooke says the houses are only as big as a garage, but the families are so happy and joyful to get a new house with a roof, sides and a floor. The conditions the people live in were a real

eye opener and very sobering for Brooke, who says he would like to go back one day to see how everyone is getting on. Prior to getting their two new houses built for them, the families lived in shelters, cobbled together with whatever materials they could scavenge. Having a new house, albeit a small one, means the family can rent out their old shelter to friends. It also means they can work, because they are no longer scavenging for house materials. They also no longer

Books are our culture and heaven forbid that you could only read *TOM* via the internet.



have a dirt floor, will be healthier, drier in the rainy season and have somewhere to store their meagre possessions. Plus they have a functioning toilet rather than the unhygienic long drop on the edge of a cliff. The families can't afford electricity, but everyone pinches it from the power companies by running wires from the power poles so there are live wires running all over the ground! Tom was impressed by how efficiently Hector the local Global Tribe co-ordinator organised all the building and materials and made the job flow so that each house was well constructed, quite a feat considering most of the volunteers had no building experience.

Brooke couldn't get over how happy all the children were. They had nothing and no hope of getting anything (no welfare system, health system, minimal education), yet they were content. A very profound experience for teenagers who think they need everything to be happy.

The other project was to build another classroom onto the school. This is a school attended by over 1000 students who come to school in shifts morning and afternoon. Schooling costs about \$200 per student a year and the hourly rate of pay is about \$2 so for many families education is too difficult. Byron attended school one day and spoke via an interpreter to the class. All the children love playing soccer,so Byron and Brooke bought a bag full of balls and a pump for the kids and they spent many happy moments playing soccer. Playing soccer with the kids was a highlight for Mereana and she said while they may not be highly educated they certainly know all the soccer rules!

Another aspect of being in Tijuana was visiting the orphanages and detoxification centres. Suzanne was particularly moved by the plight of children abandoned on the streets by drug addicted parents. And the special people who take these children in and care for them. But the highlight for her would be seeing the excitement on the faces of the families when they got their new house and the question they ask "why do you want to help us?"

Amber's highlight would probably be finding the huge tarantula spider under the wood pile!

So far Global Tribe has built about 1400 houses in Tijuana and Brooke says they really stand out. The Global Tribe built houses are all painted pink, blue and yellow and all over the slums there are pretty little houses springing up!

The group stayed in a hotel in Rosarita, outside of Tijuana and enjoyed the comforts most of us take for granted, but each night they were glad to return to their flush toilet, shower and comfy bed. The contrast between the haves and the have-not's couldn't be greater. But tired! Were they ever tired! And sick of tortillas and tacos! Mexican food in Mexico isn't like Mexican food in New Zealand. Nothing grows in the arid landscape, so there are no tomatoes, avocadoes or lettuce, only cucumbers and coriander. Everyone drinks Coca-Cola too, as it kills the bugs in the gut, whereas the water would probably kill you!

Crystal Smithers proves this trip really wasn't a holiday.

All three Smithers children want to go back again next year and Suzanne says it was wonderful doing something like Global Tribe together as a family so who knows, they just might, but they'll get the fundraising underway a bit earlier! Cerise is so keen to go back that she has emailed the local Baja Ministry crew to see if she would be able to live in Tijuana for a while and serve and help the people there. Now that is life-altering.

### kaitake community board

Now that all the local body election commotion has settled down, it is back to business for the Kaitake Community Board.

The Board held its first meeting on Tuesday 13 November at NPOB Surf Clubrooms on the beachfront.

Other than myself, long-serving Keith Plummer continues his membership of the Board and we are joined by new representatives Al Rawlinson and Mike Pillette. Deputy Mayor Alex Matheson is our Council appointee and I know he will continue to work hard for our area, which also encompasses Omata and Okato. It's very important that local folk understand we represent them and we can provide a very useful sounding board and support for issues that concern them.

I was personally disappointed, as I know were many other folk, that our previous Chair, Fay Looney was not elected to Council. Fay didn't miss by much, beating a couple of sitting Councillors in the voting, but unfortunately it wasn't to be. Fay decided not to seek a further term on the Kaitake Community Board, but knowing her passion for the district I doubt if her influence and commonsense approach will be completely lost to the local scene.

There are a number of current issues that the Kaitake Board will be keeping a close eye on, with the sewerage scheme implementation the big one. Another one we are working on is the fate of the Phoenix Palms at the eastern end of Hau Lane. Currently these 75-year-old palms are threatened with removal due to the cost of trimming to keep them away from the adjacent power lines. They are on NPDC roadside reserve so technically speaking they belong to the Council, but we believe they are iconic specimens, adding much to the village entranceway and surely commonsense can prevail and the palms can remain. Another idea that is gathering momentum is the setting up of a monthly Farmer's Market down in the Oakura Beach Camp. While this idea is only in a gestation phase at the moment it is certainly one that everyone I have spoken to is enthusiastic about. What do you think?

We have also been working in partnership with the Department of Conservation to revert the last piece of grazing lease land to be returned to the Mt Taranaki National Park. See the article on this elsewhere in *TOM*.

For a number of years I have operated an Oakura email tree. We have found it is the best way to get information quickly disseminated throughout the district. On behalf of Keith, Al and Mike, I wish to reiterate that the Board will carry on the good work of past members and continue to work hard for the whole district and its residents.

#### **November Checklist**

### Vegetables

Continue sowings of beans, lettuce, cucumber, courgette, melons, radish, silverbeet, sweetcorn and tomatoes.

Feed all citrus trees with Botlers citrus Fertiliser.

For continuous harvesting of vegetables, make sowings at three weekly intervals.

Recemany has been harvesting her new potatoes. Inn't it levely rummaging around in the warm soil for the waxy tubers then cooking them with lots of lashings of butter!

Mulch around flower beds to conserve moisture in the soil.

Sow seeds of summer flowers: cosmus, marigold, petunias, portulacas, verbena and

Plant new roses using plenty of compost. Water all roses at least once a week. Rosemary's roses have aphids so do check for the little beasties and spray regularly.

Apply Butlers Lawn Fertiliser when rain is due or water in.

Spray with Turfix for broad leaf weeds and Prickle Weedkiller to control Onehunga weed and stop surrener prickles.

#### Lindauer Blanc de Blanc

'Tis the season to be jolly (well almost, some of us start early!) and what better way to get jolly than with a bottle of the very fine Lindauer Blanc de Blanc. These bubbles are just the ticket to get your festive season off to a fizz.

Lindauer Blanc de Blanc is a not your average cheap plonk. This is classy stuff and I reckon even Patsy would drink it and laugh all the way to the bank. The name Lindauer conjures up images of good cheap bubbly and you'd have to agree that Montana has this market well and truly sown up, with New Zeleanders drinking more Lindauer per capita than any other nation on the earth – at last count more than five million bottles per year.

But can they produce and sell more refined bubbly? I'd say "yes" if it is Blanc de Blanc! (I'll be buying it!)

Blanc de Blanc means 'white of whites' as it's made entirely from chardonnay grapes, making it a delicately flavoured, yeasty, dry wine reminiscent of a good lemony fruit cake. The yeasty overtones dissipate as it sits in the glass waiting to be sipped at. It's definitely not a Kath and Kim wine but more a Pru and Tru tipple. Great as your early evening aperitif, served with glorious seafood and fish - nothing too spicy or rich to overpower it. (I didn't wait for anything as refined as food!) Think strawberries and peaches, pineapple and melon.

Blanc de Blanc has a reputation for aging well so get in now and if you're lucky and it's still in the cupboard at Christmas, it will be well aged (anything over a week is well aged in my cellar!)

Did you know there are over 250 million bubbles in a bottle of methode traditionelle (this being the name for sparkling wine made in the fermented manner outside of the Champagne region, France).

The Four Square is offering this fabulous wine at \$19, usually

Other interesting wine happenings at the Four Square are their wine and food tastings. Tim tells me these are going really well, so pop in when you see the tasting sign out and sample the selection of food and wines on offer.

### **River: The Joni Letters**

Herbie Hancock (Verve/Universal)

River: The Joni Letters serves as an admirable companion piece to Mitchell's own Shine.

Following on from his disappointing celebrity bun-feast that was *Possibilities*, its successor finds Herbie Hancock in magisterial form, playing with the kind of delicacy that is usually only reserved for the works of Bill Evans, Debussy or Satie.

The band is marvellous also, although this is not too surprising, given that it is comprised of Wayne Shorter (soprano and tenor saxophones), bass master Dave Holland, drummer Vinnie Colaiuta and a new African guitar star in Lionel Loueke.

Alternating vocal pieces with instrumentals, *River* is a delight from start to finish, even the normally histrionic Tina Turner delivers a superb, understated version of "Edith And The Kingpin." Other highpoints include a rhapsodic instrumental version of "Both Sides Now," "Tea Leaf Prophecy" featuring Mitchell herself plus "Court and Spark" and "River" (featuring Norah Jones and Corinne Bailey Rae respectively).


Also it has just been announced that the Surfing NZ Nationals are to be held in Gisborne from 12 to 19 January 2008.

The week commencing 8 October was a momentous one for the children of Kaitake Kindy, as on the Thursday they were able to return to their McKellar Street "home".




