

Winchfest 2012

Taranaki festival-goers will only have to step out their back door to experience New Zealand's latest summer carnival when WinchFest 2012 hits Oakura early next year.

The country's top wakeboarders will head to Taranaki on January 28 to compete at the region's only winch park on Surrey Hill Rd, while internationally recognised bands from Aotearoa and across the ditch will complement the on-water action.

Local girl Jane Symons is the mastermind behind Winch-Fest. She says she has been overwhelmed with the interest the event has attracted so far. "We've got professional rider Brad Smeele coming to MC the winch competition and we've had interest from British and Australian riders who are keen to come and compete as well."

The event has attracted another local-born artist, award-winning drum'n'bass act MC Tali, who will host on the Saturday. Jane has managed to lure some of NZ's top bands to the two-day festival, including Concord Dawn, Katchafire and Cornerstone Roots, but says there are also up and coming Australian bands who won't disappoint. "We've got The Red Eyes from Melbourne, who are currently touring Australia with Salmonella Dub, and also Tijuana Cartel, who are a class act."

Jane has organised food stalls, graffiti walls and other sporting demonstrations, which will add to the experience for WinchFest-goers. She has also come up with the concept of Tent City: 50 pre-erected tents with air mattresses that will be available for hire over the weekend.

Although Friday and Saturday will be R18, Jane says that Sunday will be a relaxed, Kiwi, summer vibe, and families of all ages will be welcome to set up a spot by the river and listen to some good Kiwi music.

She says that the beauty of the venue, combined with the sport, art and music, makes WinchFest unique amongst the New Zealand festivals happening at the moment.

What a busy few months it's been in our district!

Little Blue Penguins

Puke Ariki needs your stories about Taranaki's Little Blue Penguins! Historical information about these birds is very limited but it is essential in helping researchers understand if populations are declining.

As part of 60 Springs Penguin Experience 2011 Puke Ariki and community libraries are appealing for anyone with stories or memories about Little Blue Penguins to send them in. Puke Ariki's 60 Springs educator Nathan Hills says, "I have spoken to people who have fascinating stories to tell about penguins that used to live under the bach when they were kids, or how the noise of the penguins would keep them awake at night when they were on holiday. They remember seeing the penguins, or knowing where a particular couple of penguins would nest. What can seem like just a memory to you can be a goldmine of information to us. Although data records have been kept about penguin numbers and sightings, the more data we have, the better a picture we can build about what is happening to these birds and how they are faring."

Pick up a form from Oakura Library or log on to the Puke Ariki website and record your penguin memories for posterity! The information you provide will be added to the Nga Motu Marine Reserve Society's database on the New Plymouth Kete so researchers and wildlife biologists can use it in their work in conserving penguin populations.

60 Springs is run in partnership by Puke Ariki, Shell NZ and Taranaki Regional Council.



Volunteer to help Become a member

Protecting Our Most Vulnerable

On Saturday, 3 September I went to Marsden Hill in New Plymouth to be part of the 'nark' event there. I was very pleased to support an event that advocates for children who are at risk of abuse. It's interesting to hear how the name 'nark' came about.

It must have taken a great deal of courage for Cherie Kurarangi Sweeney to speak out when baby Serenity Scott-Dinnington died in May this year at the hands of a person or persons unknown.

Cherie's house was tagged with the label "nark" for talking to reporters and police about Serenity's death and in a small town such as Ngaruawahia it doesn't take long to gain notoriety. Cherie turned this label around into the Nation of Advocates for the Rights of Kids and that is a label that she wears proudly. She started a Facebook page to raise awareness of New Zealand's horrifying abuse record, to put an end to the anti-nark culture and highlight what a community can do. Her Facebook page lists 119 children that have died from abuse. In New Zealand children die every year at the hands of the people who are supposed to love them the most. Thousands more are confirmed to be suffering from abuse every year.

Recently the National-led Government passed a bill that further protects vulnerable children from abuse and neglect. The Crimes Amendment Bill (No 2) creates an offence of failing to take reasonable steps to protect a child or vulnerable adult from the risk of death, grievous bodily harm or sexual assault. The offence carries a maximum penalty of 10 years' imprisonment.

The bill will make an example of adults who put their interests before that of the vulnerable especially if they have frequent contact with the victim although they may not live in the household. They must be aware the victim is at risk and have failed to take reasonable steps to protect that victim from injury. The bill also extends to a staff member of a hospital or institution where the victim resides.

While the aim of the act is to prosecute those who abuse or neglect children, it is a traumatic time for the children themselves especially if they are of an age where their testimony can be important when a case is tried in court.

National is introducing reforms to dramatically improve the way child witnesses are treated in the criminal justice system. Research shows that that 30% of children wept while testifying, more than 70% did not understand a question posed by a defence lawyer and, worse still, 65% were accused by the defence of lying. We simply must do better to ensure that the children who give evidence in criminal courts each year — the majority of them complainants in sexual offending cases — are not further brutalised by their participation in the process. Delays in cases coming before the courts and inappropriate questioning of children are reducing the court's ability to elicit reliable and accurate evidence.

The National-led Government is looking at reforms that will ensure child witnesses consistently benefit from the protection of alternative modes of giving evidence, and that there is a clear expectation on court staff, the judiciary and lawyers that cases involving child witnesses be given priority.

In writing this I am reminded of the lines from the poem by Michelle R Kidwell: "They say it takes a village to raise a child but I say it takes a caring hand and lots of love and even one person can made a difference."

We need to step up and stand up for our children and not turn a blind eye to abuse and neglect. Thanks for caring for our kids!

Linda showed some essential pottery techniques such as wedging, rolling, slip work (water to adhere two surfaces), stamping, texturing, and relief work (two-dimensional additions). The children experimented with these techniques and created fabulous results! Linda has taken the plaques to be fired and all the children will be notified, probably in the second week of school, when they can pick up their finished work.

Thank you so much to Linda and her sons for

giving local children the opportunity to experience pottery; they all loved it! Any adult interested in learning some pottery skills can contact The New Plymouth Potters Inc (phone 06-758 9114). A big thankyou also to Rowan Oldfield who was our impromptu photographer! If anyone involved in the session wants to view the photos taken or have a copy sent just call in and we will forward on to you.

The Kaitake Community Board (KCB) has been as busy as ever since last reporting in TOM. A quick search shows I have attended over 20 Council-related meetings and workshops involving over 500km of driving, have read and replied to numerous email communications, spent a considerable amount of time on the phone, and read Council-related mail, which often swamps our mailbox.

Sometimes I think it was a pity that my parents taught me to be such an inquisitive child. These many years later I haven't lost that early grounding and still like to find out what's going on in our community. And, of course, as an elected representative, I am duty bound to respond on local issues that affect one or many of us. The focus of this column is water related. That is entirely appropriate with summer just around the corner.

Congratulations to Ayla Dunlop-Barrett, from the New Plymouth Old Boys Surf Club (NPOB), on being crowned the BNZ Manawatu—Wellington Sportswoman of the Year by Massey University. Ayla won gold in this year's open women's surf belt race in the Australian championships and the National SLS Championships. She also took out a host of places including securing the New Zealand record in the obstacle relay in the World Rescue Championships in Egypt last year. She is studying a Bachelor of Business Studies and was selected from 59 Blues award recipients representing 20 different sports. Blues recipients are recognised for their performance in representing New Zealand in their chosen sport while successfully progressing in their academic studies.

NPOB is also gearing up for another safe summer period. The community is well served by the high quality and comprehensive life saving service the club provides at Taranaki's most popular beach. It also does a great job encouraging participation by the youth of the New Plymouth region in a wide range of associated recreational activities.

Oakura Beach has retained its Blue Flag accreditation (issued on a annual basis) and the Blue Flag has now been raised. The international Blue Flag status is particularly difficult to obtain and retain. To obtain that annual accreditation there are 28 criteria to be met — no easy task. Local beachgoers can be confident that as well as the life saving service, bathing water quality meets stringent standards,

that an environmental management plan is operating with all information displayed on the notice board on the beachfront, and fresh water, clean toilets, rubbish and recycling bins, and disabled parking are available.

The recent 20 Year Anniversary celebrations by the Oakura Boardriders' Club went off with a bang and were attended by many local surfers and club stalwarts. A number of previous members who have moved to other parts of the country also came and it was nice to have a catch-up with them. And yes, local surfer Paige Hareb did re-qualify for the 2012 prestigious ASP Women's World Tour. We wish her a relaxing, quality, surf-filled summer break and very good luck when the tour recommences next February in Queensland.

Good luck as well to all those students sitting NCEA and Scholarship exams during the next month — our community wishes you well.


The Community Board Emergency Alert Toolkit has now been finalised. The toolkit provides a means to record basic information to community boards that may be vital in a local emergency. In reality it is an interim measure and next year it is hoped Council can develop a Community Response Plan, which is a separate, more comprehensive emergency plan requiring much development and consultation with Civil Defence, Local Authorities, local community groups and residents. Some people may 'pooh pooh' the need for such a plan but the Christchurch earthquake and the Rena stranding indicate the reverse. In a well-prepared community everyone knows what to do.

Woodleigh Prepares for Garden Spectacular

I have driven past the Woodleigh Garden sign many times but have to admit to never actually finding the time to venture into the garden. So I was absolutely stoked when I arranged to meet owner, Glyn, and I got my very own guided tour.

Gail and Glyn Church have lived at Woodleigh for almost 25 years. Although originally a rhododendron nursery, when they arrived the 10-acre section was mainly paddock. Over time they have expertly planted and developed the section to form the most spectacular gardens and woodland landscape. Glyn says their aim was for the garden to look like it had just happened. As we walk around he is able to name (and spell—no easy feat!) the plants and trees. There is such a huge range of species. The evergreen magnolias with their beautiful white blooms were thankfully unscathed by the heavy cold snap, and Glyn says the garden was beautiful in the snow. The early rhododendrons with their vibrant colours are just starting to come into bloom ready for the Taranaki

Garden Spectacular, now in its 24th year. Glyn says they have opened up the gardens for the festival every year since the beginning. It's a week that he thoroughly enjoys, chatting and meeting new people. I ask Glyn if the rhododendrons need any extra care or attention coming up to the festival. He says they tend to look after themselves although he does have to spray for thrip occasionally — a mite that literally sucks the chlorophyll



from the leaves, turning them silver.

Astonishingly Glyn says he's actually a lazy gardener, placing plants that although initially may be high maintenance, in the long term will need little care, such as the mondo grass area now a thick

carpet of green. He considers texture and colour when planting and says he likes to challenge people to look at plants and trees in a different way, such as the phebalium hedge, which makes a spectacular structural edge.

The whole garden is a clever blend of natives, both evergreen and deciduous. As you turn each corner there is something different to surprise you, the amazing lake, the taro wetland and the two streams running through the grounds. Even the pergola is constructed and situated to take in the beautiful deciduous woodland area with the ground covered in a





sea of blue forget-me-nots. It is such a natural habitat that the garden attracts a lot of wildlife. Glyn shows me a pair of kingfishers nesting in a hole they have etched into a ponga stump, and as we talk we hear the tuis joining in!

Glyn also runs a hydrangea mail order service with up to 150 different specimens, and he has 50-60 varieties in his catalogue. After 25 years Glyn and Gail are passing on their mail order service to Quin and Janica Amoore, 300 Mountain Rd, Lepperton.

Woodleigh is an amazing garden to stroll around, and one I wish I had found the time to visit earlier. Gail and Glyn's passion and knowledge for horticulture is inspiring. Thank you, Glyn, for your time — I so enjoyed my tour.

Taranaki Business Provides 'Primo' Wireless

PrimoWireless is a professional telecommunications company that provides high-speed broadband services spanning the hard to reach areas of Taranaki. It started out as a small network linking two friends to play computer games, but it soon morphed into a business.

"I had a friend who lived 10km out of town and we liked to play online games," says founder and managing director, Matthew Harrison, of Inglewood. "We'd be playing and he would get disconnected all the time. It was pretty frustrating, so I started looking into wireless technology, which was quite new then (five years ago). We then went halves in a link between us, which worked quite well. His neighbours then found out and they wanted it too, then other people in the area."

Matt Harrison set up the company four years ago. It's grown to involve a couple of business partners, Matt's wife Jasmine, and two contractors. They're still based in Inglewood and most importantly still local but now have over 20 sites around the mountain beaming wireless Internet to its customers. "We're building a network around the mountain," says Matt. "We've basically put them in areas where Telecom has no infrastructure or no plans to do anything. The sites run off mains electricity if they are close enough to a source. Three sites use solar energy. The system makes fast broadband available to people who may not have even have had dial-up. Satellite broadband is often too slow for these clients, or signals can be blocked by trees and hills near their homes.

The Primo network gives customers up to 5MB of download speed, compared to about $0.5 M \tilde{B}$ with satellite. Kim Ferens from TOM has been using PrimoWireless for a couple of months now and she says it has made a huge difference to her life. Most of the TOM work is done via the Internet so it is extremely important to have a reliable connection. Telecom has never been able to provide a


reliable service with outages occurring for days at a time. PrimoWireless is so much faster — music files, for instance, download in about 10 minutes where previously it was 45 minutes. Another plus is that when you need help you get to talk to real people and quickly, unlike other providers who first put you in a queue then ring you back then put you on hold...!

"It's all done through wireless antennae that link back to our equipment and servers in the Transfield building in the New Plymouth CBD," says Matthew. He says PrimoWireless is the only ISP in Taranaki specialising in wireless technology, although there are others around the country. The company focuses on connecting customers in rural areas, although they provide Internet and phone services to a few businesses in the New Plymouth CBD and Bell Block industrial areas on a case-by-case basis. The company is able to connect people in areas that the big operators class as non-viable.

"The Government is talking about getting rural broadband to people who don't have it, at a speed of 5MB, and that's what we are already providing and it's here now. We're not part of the Government's plan, but we are already building the network."

Gardening with Rosemary Herb November Checklist

Vegetables

Continue sowing beans, lettuce, cucumber, courgette, melons, radish, silverbeet, sweetcorn and tomatoes.

For continuous harvesting of vegetables, make sowings at three weekly intervals.

Feed all citrus trees with Butlers Citrus Fertiliser.

Flowers

Mulch around flowerbeds to conserve moisture in the soil. Sow seeds of summer flowers: cosmos, marigold, petunias, portulacas, verbena and zinnia.

Plant new roses using plenty of compost. Water all roses at least once a week.

Lawns

Apply Butlers Lawn Fertiliser when rain is due or water it in. Spray with Turfix for broad leaf weeds and Prickle Weedkiller to control Onehunga weed and stop summer prickles.
