

Legally Speaking

What does my contract mean?

In many different ways we all come into contact with contracts. It is interesting to consider the rules that apply when the parties disagree over the meaning of their contracts.

Until recent times, if a contract was written, and its terms were straightforward and not ambiguous, they would be enforced by the Courts on the basis that each of the parties must be taken to have meant what they said in the contract.

There are some exceptions to this – most notably in the field of employment law where the nature and principles governing employment contracts are quite different from those principles relevant to standard commercial contracts.

More recently the Courts in England have begun to look at the circumstances surrounding when the contract was agreed as a guide to interpreting the contract and the parties' meaning. This trend has been adopted by our Court of Appeal and now features in most contract interpretation cases.

The principle in brief is that "the meaning of the document is what the parties using those words against the relevant background would reasonably have been understood to mean".

The principle still means that Courts do not easily accept that the parties have made mistakes with their language particularly in formal documents. However, if it is obvious from the background that something has gone wrong, the Courts do not have to interpret the contract in a way which would give the parties an intention they plainly could not have had.

The extent of this principle is still being tested as cases come before the Courts. The types of background circumstances that will be relevant are still being settled. Evidence of each party's behaviour in performing the contract might be relevant but this is still to be definitively resolved. There are some background circumstances excluded e.g. matters of previous negotiation and evidence of each party's subjective intentions.

As well as these issues of interpretation there can be arguments about the necessity to imply terms into the contract. The legal principles behind implied terms are themselves an entirely separate strand of contract law.

Taken as a whole we suggest that increasing amounts of care need to be taken both in the preparation and interpretation



Speaking of Christmas we are off to the Christmas gift trade show next to stock up on lots of nice little goodies for gifts- yes Christmas starts early in the retail world.


Finally my compliments to Tracey Lusk and her team, the Messenger is a great publication, it's really interesting to read all the local news.



Photographs that shocked the nation go on show at New Plymouth's Govett-Brewster Art Gallery on 12 October.

"Mayor shocked by dancing pictures" read 1975 newspaper headlines as a media tempest gathered around young artist Fiona Clark and the exhibition The Active Eye. The exhibition, New Zealand's first major photographic survey, was touring the country to escalating moral outrage over the inclusion of two of Clark's images of transvestites dancing. Public outcry was so strong that the exhibition was not allowed to open in Auckland, and these two images were removed from the exhibition at many venues throughout New Zealand. The images eventually went missing from the exhibition. Both an exhibition and a catalogue, Go Girl revisits this episode, one of the most controversial in New Zealand's photographic history. It presents for the first time Fiona Clark's complete photographic series Dance Party, from which these two images were selected. Go Girl traces the controversial history of the works, the refusals to exhibit them, and the prejudices in the media and public imagination against their subject matter. Go Girl includes a larger group of images from the early 1970s, which focus on the gay, lesbian and transgender community in New Zealand at the time. The artist has brought the series up to date by re-photographing a number of the surviving subjects in a warm and engaging manner. Comparing and contrasting New Zealand of the

1970s with the New Zealand of today, the exhibition tells a story of gender and identity over a 30-year period. The story also provides rare insights into the birth of performance art in New Zealand, and the emergence of photography as a serious art form in New Zealand. Go Girl is a major project for Taranaki based artist Fiona Clark, one of New Zealand's most accomplished photographic artists. The images make up one of the most significant bodies of photographic artwork ever produced in this country. The substantial catalogue will feature all of the images exhibited. Go Girl runs at New Plymouth's Govett-Brewster Art Gallery from 12 October to 1 December 2002.





Studio jeweller and enameller new to Oakura

I am a studio jeweller and enameller which means that I design and create jewellery as an artist may paint pictures. My work is labour intensive and involves many different techniques working in tandem with each other, creating pieces that are usually "one off". I usually work around a theme so that a body of work will hang together, exploring different aspects of an idea. I enjoy brooches for their ability to be like a small painting attached to the body and the challenges of creating a wearable object that is interesting when seen both from near and afar. My work often reveals very fine detail on close inspection, but hopefully also "works" at a different level from a distance – then draws a viewer in for a closer look. Necklaces and earrings are also made, as are rings and other objects that require different design solutions. Enamel plays a less major role in these pieces, though is still present.



Enamel is a vitreous material fused by heat to metal. I use high quality transparent enamels on pure silver and often incorporate pure gold foils and high carat gold and silver wires into pieces. Very thin layers of enamel are built up, each being fired before the next is applied. The enamelled piece then has to be set, as if it were a stone, into a piece of jewellery, which is made separately so each piece is in fact two, which makes such work very labour intensive. There are many different techniques in the art of enamelling and it is the interpretation of such to create the desired piece, which is unique.

I have recently returned, from attending the 3rd Australian Enamel Conference, to my newly acquired home in Oakura refreshed and buzzing with ideas for my work and aspirations for its development both creatively and economically. For several years Oakura has inspired my work which is a response to the natural world around me. My current series called "Tidelines" is inspired by the transition between bush and sea, providing ideas for form, colour and pattern. Technical exploration of specific jewellery and enamelling techniques results in work that is very "Taranaki". So while someone here in Taranaki may appreciate the colour and form of a brooch as being reminiscent of our beach finds, so an outsider can appreciate it for its colour, shape, form, feel, composition and technical qualities.

I intend to develop my workshop to be able to run short courses in enamelling and jewellery making techniques when I have properly "moved in" to my new house. If you are interested, please write to: Sally Laing, P O Box 5080, Westown, New Plymouth or email sally.laing@xtra.co.nz. My work is sold through Kina and applied Art Galleries in the main centre. I am also available to make work for private commission. Some examples of my work will be on display at Oakura Info+ until the end of November.

Greetings to all households in the Oakura area. I am impressed with the Oakura Messenger, as I am sure you will be. Community newspapers are a great way to bring a community together and I congratulate Tracey and Catherine on their initiative.

One of my first tasks as Associate Minister of Energy was to make a very positive announcement for Taranaki. Oil exploration permits for the first deepwater petroleum bidding round have been tendered.

The Deepwater Taranaki basin was recently surveyed and has revealed potentially valuable geological strata off the West Coast of the North Island covering a total of 42,000 sq. km. This is adjacent to the highly productive Taranaki basin and extends down the continental shelf from about 200 metres of water depth into the head of the New Caledonia basin, in about 1800 metres of water depth.

Large potential oil bearing traps up to at least 150 sq.km in size have been identified within the deepwater basin.

This is the first ever deep water exploration bidding round ever announced in New Zealand. It will provide a very positive outcome for Taranaki and it will see the long-term development of the oil and gas industry in our area.

Oil exploration efforts are continuing on land and we are already seeing substantial benefit from that locally. I am looking forward to being able to positively contribute to the Taranaki economy in my new role, and I am pleased to have been able to sign off this new initiative.


We are keen to gain new members and can cater for people wanting to play socially, through to the competitive player wanting to test their ability against top bowlers throughout the province. Everyone is welcome.

A Bite of History ...

7 March 1988. NONE of the current students at Oakura School was alive when Cyclone Bola hit Oakura. That event didn't exist for them. Do you remember? When Bola hit Taranaki, I was working at the City Library in New Plymouth. The boss couldn't see what all the fuss was about. She insisted on sending the Mobile Library out into the wind with a different driver, one who drove ten-tonners for the army. The staff watched other workers locking up and leaving the central city, and sheets of roofing iron whipping through the sky near our windows. It wasn't long before the driver brought the book bus back, white-faced and told off by Civil Defence for luring people outside. Nationally, the cyclone caused damage of around \$200million and three deaths. The New Plymouth Fire Brigade responded to 1401 calls over the three days of wind and torrential rain. The yearly average was 800. Volunteer brigades like that of Oakura were kept frantically busy responding to lifting roofs, tying tarpaulins over gaping holes in people's homes. The East Coast, around Gisborne, got most of the rain. Three days non-stop. Taranaki got most of the wind -up to 100 kph, and Oakura bore the brunt of the wind damage. Power was off for up to 4 days in some places. Crops, orchards, tunnel houses and hay waiting to be baled were all lost in the wind. Many herds couldn't be milked without power. Roofs were lost, including the town hall's. Trees were fallen like pick-up sticks all around the region. Pukeiti and Ngamamaku gardens were hit hard. Roads were blocked. Debris washed up on the beach for weeks afterwards. I've read two eye-witness accounts from Oakura. They both mention the edgy feeling that persisted for years afterwards, whenever the wind got up a bit. More importantly, they also talked about the way that community spirit gathers when something like this happens. Neighbours checking on each other, sharing meals, mucking in with the clean-up. Don't let it take another Bola for our kids to see that kind of spirit!

I found while researching Bola that there aren't really any photos of the local damage held in places like the Puke Ariki photo collection. If any readers have photos, please call me, 752 7787, and I can arrange to have them digitally scanned by Puke Ariki for posterity, and returned to you.
