

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Update from the Big Red Truck

Greetings from all at the Big Red Truck,

Firstly, an apology to Fire Fighter Tran Lawrence. I forgot to mention his service award, a 5-year service medal, in the last TOM article. Sorry, Tran, and also well done. Five years' service to a volunteer organisation, such as the Oakura Fire Brigade, is fantastic. On behalf of all in the Oakura Fire Brigade I must also say congratulations to Tran, and well done on becoming a Permanent Full Time Fire Fighter based in New Plymouth.

Daylight Savings started on 25 September. It is a good time to make sure you replace the batteries in your smoke detectors and that detectors are all installed and working. Smoke detectors do save lives.

Just a reminder for Guy Fawkes Day on November 5: If you are going to use fireworks, please be considerate of others and act safely. Remember to make sure any unused fireworks are stored safely, away from children.

Surely the BBQ weather is just around the corner...

If your BBQ is ready to come out of hibernation and make an appearance, we have a few safety reminders for you:

Ensure your gas bottle is within test date and does not leak. A simple mixture of dishwashing liquid and water brushed around the valve will show if your gas bottle has a leak. If it does, bubbles will be created.

Follow the manufacturer's instructions when fitting the gas cylinder to the BBQ.

Check condition of hoses and 'O'-ring (if applicable). Check for leaks after connection.

If you have a charcoal BBQ do not burn it indoors or in a confined space.

Always have a fire extinguisher, baking soda and water available to put out a fire.

Light the BBQ as soon as gas is turned on. Never try to light it with the lid down.

Ensure valves are fully open or fully closed.


Prevent grease from dripping onto the hoses or cylinder. Grease build-up could be a potential fire hazard.

Ensure all valves are turned off when BBQ is not in use.

Keeping Young People in Education

National is working hard to help equip young people with the skills they need to succeed.

However we know some young people just don't fit in regular classrooms. Some young people are more comfortable taking an engine apart than studying the classics in English literature. That doesn't mean they don't want to learn. We want to help them gain better skills, better qualifications, and ultimately better job opportunities.

Considering the difficult economic circumstances New Zealand and the world have faced in recent years, good quality qualifications and training have become even more important. That's why we have developed a new approach to keeping young people engaged in education. We have focused on encouraging 16 and 17 year olds to stick with school instead of dropping out, or to return to education.

This year, the National-led Government opened eight Trades Academies around the country. Next year we are going to open 13 more. These include the three providers that had previously been confirmed to open at the start of next year. One of those academies will be the Western Institute of Technology, which will be offering 25 places in engineering, in partnership with Hawera High School and New Plymouth Boys' High School.

The Academies are partnerships between schools, tertiary institutions, industry training organisations and employers. They are aimed at young people in Year 12 and 13 who are ready to move beyond school but who still want to study, learn practical skills and gain workplace experience. These students are still enrolled in school but can study at other sites, thanks to partnerships between schools, tertiary providers, employers, and industry training organisations. Students earn NCEA credits and a tertiary qualification while gaining practical skills in the workplace. The Academies partner with local schools and offer vocational and trade training such as IT, business studies, automotive engineering, building and construction, hospitality, and hairdressing.

The value of the National Government's approach is being recognised in the trade sector. Some Trades Academy graduates will be stepping up to apprenticeships, and employers are keen to take them on. The students who decide to become apprentices will already have practical experience, a clear focus on what they want to achieve, and a sound understanding of where the apprenticeship will take them.


Local economies will also benefit from our Trades Academies, as businesses will now have more young people with better skills ready to enter the workplace. By 2014, 12,500 places will be available for 16 and 17 year olds in Trades Academies, Service Academies, which offer military-style programmes, and the wider Youth Guarantee, which offers vocational training at polytechnics and private training establishments.

We're also working to help develop clear career paths for students. Too many students who don't want to enter tertiary education are finding out too late they haven't studied the right subjects for the industry they want to work in. From next year, schools will be able to give young people a clear map of the subjects and qualifications they need for their chosen career. We're focused on five broad vocational sectors.

National is working hard to give our young people learning opportunities that suit them, the chance to gain worthwhile qualifications, and skills training that will lead to successful careers.

Kaitake Community Board

I always get an extra spring in my step when I begin seeing the whitebaiters out and about again. For me it's my personal harbinger of spring and it is soon followed by another, that public pronouncement to put our clocks forward an hour as daylight saving commences. After our winter weather I, like many others, look forward to the onset of summer. With summer just around the corner though there's a lot on besides digging and planting the vege garden.

Maintenance work is in full swing at the outdoor seasonal pools in preparation for the fast-approaching summer swimming season. Painting and tiling along with a general tidy-up are the main jobs being done. The first outdoor pools to open are at the aquatic centre on Saturday 22 October, followed by the Waitara, Okato and Inglewood pools on Saturday 5 November.

Declining karaka trees are scheduled to be removed at the entrance to Oakura on the south side of the bridge. This will also assist with traffic visibility issues when cars pull out of Victoria Road. This has been a major concern for the folk who live on Victoria Road and Hall Terrace for some time so hopefully this will alleviate some of the traffic issues down at the bridge. A New Zealand Transport Agency traffic management plan will be put in place to carry out the work so there may be some short delays while the work is being done.

Corbett Park too is undergoing some turf maintenance now that winter sports have finished. Rumour has it that a weekly kids' athletic sports event is to start up at the park. If this eventuates it will provide another sports activity to compliment the surf club's popular Nipper's programme and the local board rider's great Learn to Surf scheme. Continuing on that note our congratulations go to Glenn Anderson and Ayla Dunlop-Barret for their recent successes at the Surf Lifesaving New Zealand annual awards. Ayla was named high-performance athlete of the year for her gold medal win in the women's surf race at the 2010 world championships in Egypt and Glenn was named New Zealand coach of the year. And Paige Hareb is well on the way to re-qualify for the 2012 prestigious ASP Women's world surfing tour.

The KCB has been rather busy since last reporting. There is a lot happening, much of it under the radar of many folk. The board has submitted on the fluoride issue as well as the waste management review. There have been a series of foredune plantings of spinifex and pingao in conjunction with the Taranaki Tree Trust, NPDC and the regional council. These plants are great for accumulating and binding sand drifts as a buffer against erosion.

We have been involved also in a planned upgrade of the Oakura CBD feature gardens, the planning of the pedestrian access from Wairau Road through to Donnelley Street behind the school, the upgrade of the walkway from the campground through to AhuAhu Road, the positioning of the public bus stop in the village CBD and Okato rural roading issues. The list is never-ending and coupled with the innumerable meetings and workshops at council it certainly makes for a bust 'retired' lifestyle.

Well that's it for this issue – it's time to walk the dog. The next KCB meeting will be held on Tuesday 25 October in the NPOB clubrooms at $4.30\,\mathrm{pm}$. Ka kite ano.

Matekai Park Has New Friends


Last year I reported on the flourishing birdlife in Matekai Park. This is thanks to a group of dedicated and enthusiastic locals called Friends of Matekai Park, and in particular, Graeme Churchill. Since then the Taranaki Regional Council has listed Matekai Park as a significant wetland, now one of several within the Oakura area but the only one in Oakura village. The Department of Conservation has also identified the area as being of national importance.

Since the early 1980's Matekai Park has undergone extensive planting of the valley and wetland by many local residents and the New Plymouth District Council. Native and introduced bird food source tree species have been the focus of plantings and many of the early plantings are now more than 10m tall. These trees provide a winter food source for native birds such as the tui, bellbird and pigeon. The goldstriped gecko and kokopu are also resident. Upcoming work in the park includes clearing out the invading weeds, of which there are many, including willows, gorse, and jasmine. Since I visited the park a year ago, many new trees have been planted and are doing nicely.

Graeme continues a pest eradication programme and has caught three weasels and dozens of rats over the winter. These pests are caught in stoat and rat traps.

The walking paths around the park are for everyone to enjoy and the area is a wonderful link from the village hub to the seashore. Graeme tells me that lots of people use the park for walking their dogs and he is pleased to see most people use leashes to restrain their dogs in the park.

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Pet Dental Health

Periodontal disease is the leading cause of early tooth loss in dogs and cats, with 80% of dogs over 2 years old being affected. Left untreated, periodontal abscesses can spread bacteria, via the bloodstream, to the major organs.

Predisposing factors are advancing age, soft diets, and pug-nosed and toy dog breeds.

Periodontal disease starts with plaque, which calcifies to form tartar, and the gums become inflamed and infected. Tartar build-up and infection results in receding gums and loss of bone around the tooth roots. Eventually the teeth loosen and fall out.

Affected animals will have bad breath, and may have difficulty eating, loss of appetite and weight loss. Infection may spread to the liver, lungs and kidneys.

Mild tartar build-up may be removed in a co-operative patient during a routine consult but an anaesthetic is required for a thorough dental procedure. Teeth are ultrasonically scaled and polished, and antibiotics are administered. Early treatment is essential to avoid tooth loss and annual follow up is advised.

Prevention includes regular health checks, daily care such as brushing, and dental diets and chews.

If your pet has bad breath, inflamed gums or tartar build-up (observed by raising the top lip on each side of the mouth), then you should seek veterinary advice.

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



It was a very exciting visit and I was really proud of how our young leaders stepped up and had their welcomes learned in Russian, and how our students responded so warmly to our special guests.




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

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Gardening with Rosemary Herb October Checklist

Vegetables:

Plant tomatoes.

Continue planting cabbage, broccoli, lettuce and parsley.

Plant main crop potatoes and kumara.

As weather warms begin sowing beans, cucumber, pumpkins, peppers, eggplants and courgettes or plant out seedlings from Mitre 10.

l awns:

Sow new lawns. Uncoated seed is best. Re-sow thin or bare areas using Easy Grass – a grass seed, mulch and fertiliser all in one.

Flowers:

Sow seed or plant out summer flowering annuals.
