Doug Hislop

I am a longtime resident of Oakura.

Peta, my wife, teaches at Oakura School and I am the editor of the national education magazine — Education Today.

I have served two terms on the Kaitake Community Board, originally getting involved because of my concern that there was no long-term strategy for sustainable management of our area's natural and physical resources, putting at real risk the very things that provide such a great lifestyle, and brought us all here in the first place. Forward planning is far wiser than retrospective actions to 'close the stable door after the horse has bolted'.

There are many issues for our community. Population growth, increasing rateable property values, and major changes in the rural/urban interface mean a continuing focus on infrastructure e.g. the roading network, water supply, stormwater and wastewater management, rubbish collection, parks and open spaces, cemeteries, coastal access and protection. We also have a burgeoning number of young families and an expanding older group whose lifestyle needs and choices differ considerably.

To protect and enhance all community values every issue must be considered carefully. Therefore the elected team must demonstrate critical judgement by constantly testing out whether this (or that) is a sensible course of action, or opportunity, for the community (or not). This makes our neighbourhood networks and breadth of local government understanding so important.

I think my representation has been and, if elected, will remain underpinned by my common sense, broad skill-set, community vision and fair-minded approach to all issues.

I have lived in Oakura since 1980 when my wife Lynn and I built our house. Our four children were all educated at Oakura School where I taught for two years during the early 1980s. I have enjoyed a teaching career spanning 33 years during which I have been a classroom teacher, deputy principal and principal. 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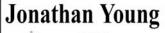
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Meeting the needs of young New Zealanders

Last year I wrote a column in this paper to say that the Nationalled Government was looking in a new way at trade training, with the intention of setting up at least five Trades Academies during the next three years to ensure more students can find what they are good at and turn their talents into a career.

National recognises that many young people are more comfortable taking an engine apart than studying the classics in English literature, and every student deserves an education system that works for them, meets their needs, and helps them realise their potential. The success of our young people, the strength of our communities, and the health of our economy rely on it.

National has announced that nine Trades Academies will open next year to provide trades and technology programmes for more than 800 secondary school students.

These Academies are partnerships between schools, tertiary institutions, industry training organisations, and employers. They are aimed at young people who are ready to move beyond school but who still want to study, learn practical skills and gain workplace experience. In 2011 Taranaki will have a Primary Industries Trade Academy, delivered through Taratahi Training Centre, focussing on delivering National Certificate Level 2 in Agriculture. In 2012 a further Trades Academy is scheduled to open in Taranaki, based around engineering.

Each new Trades Academy will provide 16 and 17 year olds with an opportunity to learn, free of charge, from a range of vocational programmes such as agriculture, mechanics and hospitality. Students will remain enrolled at their secondary school but they may study somewhere else, like a workplace or polytechnic, for some or all of the term.

This is an innovative and flexible approach to education that will keep more young people engaged in learning for longer. It's also another example of National delivering on our promise to help lift the achievement of young people in education and training, through our Youth Guarantee programme.

This year's Budget provided an extra \$48 million to boost Youth Guarantee places from 2000 to 2500.

The Youth Guarantee is just one of the steps we're taking to lift achievement across our education system. Currently, one in five students leaves school without the basic skills they need to succeed in a modern economy. Lifting achievement is vital if we are to turn things around for these teenagers.

National is working hard to help all young New Zealanders get the work experience, training and education they need. Our new Trades Academies will provide a flexible, student-focussed approach and will help more 16 and 17 year olds stay engaged in education, realise their potential, and contribute to the success of their communities.

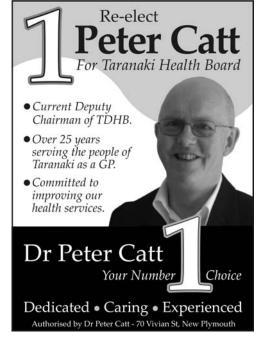

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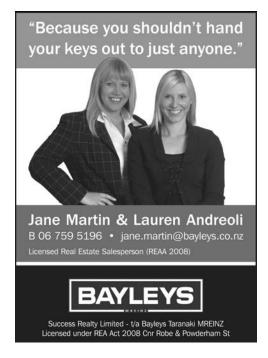
Conscious Living Short Cuts for Families

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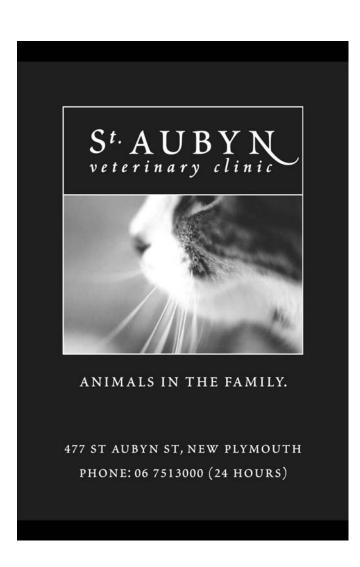

We have had a pretty good year to date; not too many injuries and a lot of hard training.

We have been fortunate to have had three of our members picked to represent our country at the Australasian Championships, held in Perth and Brisbane. Sempei Dominic Cooksley-Gruys (2nd dan), Sempei Connor Anderson (2nd dan), and Sempei Manu Akioka (1st dan) of Oakura Dojo competed in March and July with outstanding results, all returning home with medals and trophies.

Then in August we took a team of students to Turangi for the NZ National Championships with great results. All students from Coastal Karate won or were placed in their events. Sempeis Connor Hoskin, Jurnee Corrigan, Victory Peebles and Rhys Vickers competed in the Black Belt Division for the first time, all placing in the top three. Connor Anderson and Manu Akioka won their divisions.

It is inspiring for the other students to have so many champions to train with and to set goals towards becoming NZ's next champion, and believe me, we have many promising students in the four dojos to do it.

Recently Shihan Takahashi (8th Dan) visited our region for a training/grading seminar. Sensei Takahashi is a professor of physical education at Ayoma University in Japan and head of our organisation, so everyone's nerves were on edge at the seminar. For the senior students it was not such a big thing, many having trained and graded under Shihan Takahashi before, but for the new students the look of fear and nervousness showed in their eyes.

After three and a half hours of training the students were graded, and all passed —what a big relief for me, but I try never to show it for I am more nervous for them than they are for themselves.

After the grading a few of our first time grading students were asked what they thought about the seminar. These are some of their replies:

Matt Hooker (9 years), fourth grading: "It was the first time we have graded in this dojo (Okato). I enjoyed it all."

Morgan K. Tenana (12 years), first grading: "It was scary at first but it got better." Corbyn Sole (9 years): "I was nervous and excited, at the end I felt happy and proud."

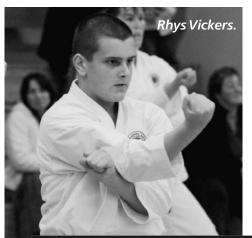

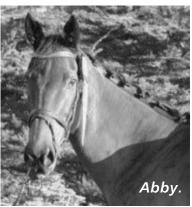
Sexy B is a 15 year old, 15.3hh gelding. Sexy B is a seasoned eventer and is usually so relaxed

World Rankings for the Sarten Sisters

Nicole and Hannah Sarten have once again had a very successful year in their chosen sport of BMX bike racing.

At the end of July the Sarten family headed to Petermartizburg, South Africa to compete in the UCI BMX World Championships and both Nicole and Hannah came home with trophies: Nicole with a first placing in the 24" cruiser class and fourth in the 17–45 year age group for the 20" class. Hannah placed second in the 24" cruiser and seventh in the 14 year girls age group for the 20" class.

These fabulous results top off a top season for the girls with Nicole holding NZ No. 2 in the 17–29 year age group in both the 20" and 24" class and Hannah retaining her NZ No.1 crown for the sixth time in the 14 year girls class. Prior to Nationals Nicole competed at the North Island Champs and finished first in the 20" class and first in the Elite Women Cruiser class. Hannah has finished first in the 14 year girls.

Petermaritzburg was an eventful trip for Hannah as she was literally knocked out of the 20" class race and out of medal contention in the opening seconds of the final by a fellow competitor. Much to Hannah's credit she picked herself and her bike up and finished the race. Nicole says she "screwed up" the second jump in her 20" class final and also finished outside the medals.

Nicole says she hasn't mastered the art of jumps yet, and as she has only been competing three years this isn't surprising. What is surprising is that the jumps can be up to 13 metres long and you can reach speeds of up to 85 kilometres an hour (heart attack material, I say!).

The girls practice every night of the week either doing road sprints, track work or gym work. Nicole has a high performance training coach working with her and Hannah has a personal trainer helping with fitness and core strength.

The sisters say they love competing against each other and it seems this happens every time they get on their bikes. Older sister Nicole says she has to keep sharp to keep ahead of Hannah and doesn't plan for Hannah to beat her anytime soon. It seems Nicole is still a tiny bit miffed about the 40 year plus women beating her at the Worlds too so that is something else to work on!

The next World Champs will be held in Copenhagen, Denmark, followed by England in Olympic year 2012, then Auckland in 2013, which will be a first for New Zealand. Nicole hopes to compete in the Elite Women's races and Hannah has set her sights on competing in the Junior Elite Women's races with a further goal of competing in the Olympics in 2016.

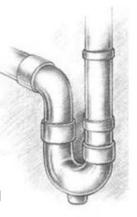

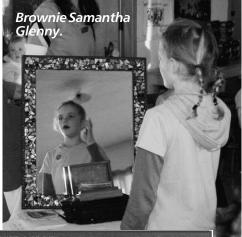

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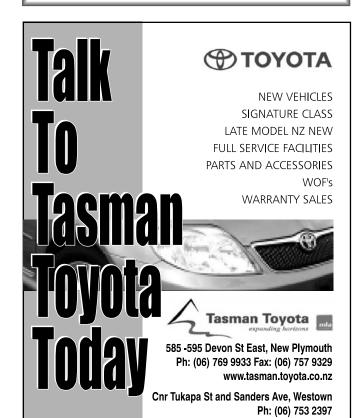

"We have also fundraised 34 laptops (18 of these mini-laptops for the junior school) since 2005. So the children of Oakura School are very lucky to have the support of the Oakura Community."

FOOS doesn't only raise money for technology, last year a Subway lunch on Fridays was available, this year changing to local pizzas with yummy toppings the children can choose from.

FOOS has also donated:

various games, puzzles and craft materials for every classroom (\$2, 514.05)

subsidies for school sunhats (\$179.50... keeping the cost to parents at just \$5 dollars!).

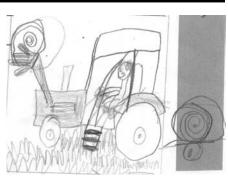

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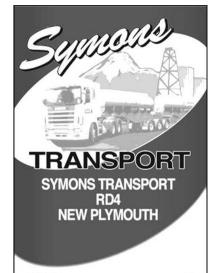

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GARDENING WITH ROSEMARY HERB Your September Checklist

Vegetables:

Sow lettuce, radishes, carrots, beetroot, silver beet and peas. Plant out cabbage and cauliflower seedlings. Prepare to plant tomatoes, cucumber, pumpkin, peppers and sweetcorn next month. Plant main crop potatoes.

Rosemary has successfully raised her first crop of babies – a half tray of buttercrunch lettuce so it will be exciting to plant these out in the garden shortly.

Flowers:

Top dress spring flowering bulbs with bulb food. Sow seeds of most hardy annuals.

Fruit trees:

Plant passionfruit vines in a sheltered site. Apply an allpurpose fertiliser like Thrive to strawberry plants.

Lawns:

Sow new lawns. Re-sow thin or bare patches.
